

LOCAL COUNCIL ELECTIONS POSTPONED TO 4 DECEMBER

Yesterday the Local Government Minister Shelley Hancock MP announced that local council elections, scheduled for 4 September, would be postponed and now held on Saturday, 4 December 2021, due to the Covid Delta strain outbreak.

While a great many had hoped that rural and regional council elections could still proceed on 4 September, we understand the statewide postponement was the strong recommendation of the NSW Electoral Commissioner rather than having multiple election days (rural/regional then Greater Sydney).

With the new election date, nominations will open on Monday, 25 October 2021 and close on Wednesday, 3 November 2021.

History Rotes

Lots of rules and regulations at present and so the monthly meeting was a phantom meeting last Wednesday. We have not been opening the museum either but there is usually someone there on Friday mornings if anyone wants to call in. The checks on the old newspapers continues and may do so for some time.

This week I have found another old paper donated to the society many years ago – it is a copy of The Barraba and Horton Chronicle, published on 9th July, 1925 – just short of its 100th birthday and was sold for 6 pence each week.

The front page advertising includes Dean & Smith at Barraba and Upper Horton advising that the Great Winter Sale starts on 18th July. T. Jacobs, Commercial Stores has already started his winter sale.

The rabbit population was rapidly increasing and Winchcombe, Carson Ltd advertised that they were turning rabbits' skins into money – just send them to Sydney!! However, there was some opposition from B.P. Redding & Co. Ltd, who had a shop opposite the Commercial Hotel and were buying skins for export for spot cash. They were also looking for fox skins, fur skins, sheepskins, hides and wool

The paper reports that 'owing to the high price of rabbit skins, trappers will not trap for carcases and as a result the Barraba Works have closed down'.

Motor cars were still relatively new to Barraba but "White & Howes" were associate dealers with Standardised Motors Limited selling Dodge cars in Barraba.

The Local & General column is always interesting in these old papers and it is here that we find that Cliftons Ltd,

have installed a new bowser on the footpath in from of their garage. There is also a note to say that the Cobbadah Bridge is closed to all traffic – thus all traffic through the creek crossing just upstream from the wooden bridge.

"There was an extra severe frost on Wednesday morning. Frozen taps were the order." We can certainly relate to that this winter!

The Northy family had lost their little boy in the bush at Watson's Creek and several Barraba folk went to help with the search.

It is noted that Mrs C.D. McKechnie died on 5th July, aged 62 years and there is also an obituary for Mr J.S. Tyrell, who died aged 61 years from heart failure. He is buried in Manilla. This is only half of this paper so I will continue next week with the rest of the news and advertising – each page is 45 x 30 centimetres – and hard to handle.







Temporary closure of museum

Tamworth Regional Council has taken the difficult decision to temporarily close the Powerstation Museum in the interest of the health and wellbeing of staff and volunteers.

Council's Director Art Gallery & Museums, Bridget Guthrie, said many museums across regional NSW have already closed under the current COVID-19 public health orders, including in Moonbi and Manilla.

"After much consideration we have agreed to temporarily close the museum until further notice," she said.

"The safety and welfare of our staff and volunteers is paramount. Many of our dedicated and hard-working volunteers are older members of our community who are considered by health experts to be among those at increased risk for contracting COVID-19."

Other museums across the region have been closed for weeks, since the public health orders were announced 26 June, 2021.

Volunteers will continue to work behind closed doors at the museum as they continue to perform various documentation and administration tasks. However, the museum will be closed to the public until further notice.

The Visitor Information Centre in Tamworth has now reopened to regular opening hours.

From Adam Marshall MP QUEENSLAND BORDER RESTRICTIONS – GWYDIR SHIRE INCLUDED IN BORDER ZONE

This weekend I've been asked by many people across the region, so just posting this as a reminder for New South Wales/Queensland border residents to familiarise themselves with new restrictions, after the Queensland Government formally closed its border to regional NSW on Friday 23 July 2021 and reestablished a border zone.


The Glen Innes Severn, Gwydir, Inverell and Moree Plains local government areas have thankfully been included in the new border zone, allowing residents to still enter Queensland to conduct essential activities. While ever Queensland deems all of NSW a COVID-19 hotspot, NSW border zone residents cannot travel outside the border zone and then into Queensland. A Queensland Travel Declaration is required for everyone entering the state. You must complete the form in the 3 days before you travel to Queensland.

New South Wales border zone residents can only cross the border to:

- get food or other goods or services for the personal needs of the household or other household purposes, including for pets, and for vulnerable persons
- ✓access medical or health care or get medical supplies
- get a COVID-19 vaccine

- get a COVID-19 test
- work
- volunteer
- provide assistance, care or support to a family member or to fulfil other caring responsibilities
- attend any court or tribunal of Australia or to comply with or give effect to orders of the court or tribunal of Australia
- attend a childcare facility, school, university, or other educational institution
- take a child attending organised sport
- assist with or participate in an investigation or other action by a law enforcement authority
- comply with or give effect to the exercise of a power or function of a government agency or entity under a law
- to continue existing arrangements for contact between, parents, children and siblings who don't live together
- avoid injury or illness
- escape a risk of harm
- escape an emergency situation.

You can stay overnight as needed for one of the above reasons.

Snippets from St Laurence's

Last week two groups of us watched the film "Against the Tide," a documentary showing Dr John Lennox refuting atheist arguments and showing scenes in modern Palestine but relating them to what is recorded in the Bible.

On Saturday, 31st July, there is a working bee. This will see a tidy up before the Bishop's visit and more work on the Parish Hall. I have been remembering the hall as I have seen it over my years in Barraba: nearly 180 young people in the Youth Fellowship (that was pre-youth Centre); a Sunday school room; our first pre-school; a dressing room for BADsoc extras; early meetings of the Senior Citz - the list keeps growing. What do you remember?

The CMS Mission Encounter which was to be held on 6th and 7th August has been cancelled because of COVID

19, but confirmation is still going ahead on 8th and the AGM on 15th.

This week, consider Paul's words to the Ephesians, chapter 2, verses 4 and 5: "Because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions – it is by grace you have been saved."



Rates notices on their way to mailboxes

A total of 28,676 Tamworth Regional Council rates notices – 48 more than last year - will start to be delivered to local mailboxes this week.

Council's total income from rates and charges for 2021-2022 is \$78.257 million and is part of a budget with a total spend of \$251 million.

"It is our biggest ever budget with a total spend of \$251 million due largely to the \$106.4 million capital works program to improve local facilities and infrastructure," said Tamworth Region Mayor Col Murray. "We are particularly pleased to have a small cash surplus of almost \$150,000."

The rates rise for 2021-2022 was applied after Council adopted the 2 per cent rate cap increase to the General Rate income as set by the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) for all NSW councils. Council will increase water, sewerage and trade waste service by 2.0 per cent and waste management charges by 10.0 per cent. Consumption charges for water use will also increase by 2.0 per cent. Residential and business ratepayers will pay \$18 more for sewer availability, \$6 more for water availability for the year and up to \$32 more for waste collection for the year.

In Barraba, the average residential ratepayer will receive a total annual rates bill of \$2,108, which is about \$72 more than last year. Barraba residential ratepayers will provide for a total of \$377,989.

Across TRC the business rates will return \$6.596 million in income from 1,723 businesses and 3,014 rural properties will return farmland rates of \$6.168 million.

Anyone who needs help to understand their rates notice can call Council on 1300 733625. Rates can be paid in full or by instalment. The first rate instalment is due for payment on August 31, 2021.

Any ratepayer having difficulty paying should call Council on 1300 733 625 and ask to discuss entering a special arrangement to pay their rates. Council has a Ratepayers Hardship Policy which can be accessed confidentially by anyone experiencing financial hardship.

Rates facts and figures

- ➤ There are 24,325 notices mailed to Tamworth region postcodes. There are 4,351 notices mailed to postcodes outside the Tamworth region to more than 817 different postcodes, including overseas.
- ➤ A total of 4,567 properties in the Tamworth Region Council area will receive pensioner rebates worth a total of \$1,784,221.82.
- The largest rates bill this year is \$118,053.65 for a Tamworth business property. The smallest notice issued is \$173.32 for a residential block at Kootingal.
- ➤ The average Barraba residential notice (including services) is \$2,108.
- ➤ The average business rate notice in Barraba is \$2,558.
- ➤ A total of 3,014 farmland rate notices are issued and the average notice is \$2,164.

From The Conversation

No, we can't treat COVID-19 like the flu. We have to consider the lasting health problems it causes

Earlier this month, the Australian government announced a four-phase plan to return us to something resembling normality. Under this plan, Prime Minister Scott Morrison said, we will eventually treat COVID-19 "like the flu".

The hope is vaccines will allow us to live with some transmission without many people getting seriously ill or dying.

But death and hospitalisation aren't the only outcomes of COVID-19 we need to prevent. New research shows even young people can be left with chronic health problems after infection.

COVID-19 will always be a very different disease to the flu. We should aim to stamp it out like measles, not let it spread.

A common misconception

Many people think only the elderly are at risk from COVID-19. Looking at the statistics, it's easy to see why that misconception came about.

A study of people who tested positive for COVID-19 during the second wave in the United Kingdom found only around 1% of children and 2-3% of young adults had to be hospitalised. In contrast, more than 10% of those aged over 60 needed to go to hospital.

The risk of dying from COVID-19 follows a similar pattern. Only one in 20,000 children who become infected are likely to die, compared to more than one in 100 adults over 60.

But these figures don't tell the whole story. Many people who have had COVID-19 and survived haven't returned to their previous state of health.

COVID-19 can cause lasting health problems.

A study of people who were hospitalised for COVID-19 during the first wave in the UK found these patients were four times more likely to be readmitted to hospital and eight times more likely to die than a matched control group over an average follow-up period of four to five months.

The researchers found these people were particularly likely to develop diabetes, heart disease and kidney disease.

People can also experience complications after having the flu, but we're seeing this more frequently with COVID-19, and the complications are more serious.

Even people who aren't unwell enough to go to hospital with COVID-19 can experience complications.

A Sydney study found one-third of people with mild-to-moderate COVID-19 were left with persistent symptoms lasting at least two months, including fatigue and shortness of breath. More than 10% had impaired lung function.

This potentially life-altering condition has a name: long COVID.
Long COVID affects young people too.
The UK's Office for National Statistics has calculated about one in seven people who contract COVID-19 will experience persistent symptoms lasting at least 12 weeks.

They estimate nearly one million people are currently living with long COVID in the UK, and 40% of them have been living with the condition for over one year. Two-thirds report being adversely affected in their day-to-day activities as a result of long

COVID, and 18% report they are limited a lot.

While children are very unlikely to die from COVID-19, the Office for National Statistics estimate 7-8% of children and adolescents who get infected will develop long COVID.

They estimate 10,000 children and 16,000 adolescents in the UK have been living with long COVID for at least 12 weeks.

The condition is so common that the UK's National Health Service is opening 15 long COVID clinics for children

What does this mean for Australia?

COVID-19 is a very different disease to influenza, and our reopening plan should ensure it doesn't get a foothold in Australia. The alternative would have huge economic and social costs, owing to the large number of people likely to be left with chronic health problems.

We can work towards reopening safely by first reaching herd immunity through vaccination.

With the emergence of more transmissible variants such as the Delta variant, we'll likely need to vaccinate more than 90% of the population to achieve herd immunity. This is an ambitious goal, but we already achieve it as part of routine vaccination for measles in childhood.

To reach that target, we'll need to offer vaccination to children and adolescents, who also need protection from long COVID.

Some have suggested vaccinating adults may be sufficient to reach herd immunity, but Israel has shown us this isn't the case. New outbreaks linked to schools have forced the country to bring back a mask mandate and step up vaccination in adolescents.

What else do we need to do?

It will take time to achieve herd immunity in Australia. So we'll need to keep a strong quarantine system in place until we've got the job done.

We'll also need to closely watch the situation overseas and be prepared to roll out a third booster dose in response to emerging variants.

We should also be prepared to give people who have received the AstraZeneca vaccine a third booster dose of the Pfizer vaccine, when supplies are available.

While both the AstraZeneca and Pfizer vaccines are more than 90% effective at preventing severe disease, the AstraZeneca vaccine is slightly less effective at preventing infection overall.

We don't know how well either vaccine prevents long COVID, but again, the best defence will be to have a high level of vaccination in the community.

Inevitably, Australia will experience future outbreaks of COVID-19, just as we sometimes do with measles. But we should have a very low tolerance for the degree of transmission we're prepared to accept.

The coronavirus is an airborne virus that's more transmissible than influenza, and causes more severe disease. It's not a flu-like illness and never will be.



BOOSTING MOBILE COVERAGE IN NEW ENGLAND

The New England is to benefit from new and improved mobile coverage thanks to Round 5A of the Australian Government's highly successful Mobile Black Spot Program.

Deputy Prime Minister and Member for New England, Barnaby Joyce welcomed the news that six mobile black spots in New England are set to be addressed under this round of the Program.

"Macrocells will be constructed at Glen Elgin, Mole River Exchange, Tenterfield, Watsons Creek and Woods Reef Exchange with a further Small Cell at Bukkulla, north of Inverell," Mr Joyce said.

"These new installations are in addition to 45 new and upgraded towers which have already been installed in New England, following strong lobbying on your behalf – and I will continue to work hard for improved services across the New England.

The six new sites are set to provide improved mobile coverage for the local community, allowing visitors and locals alike to stay connected, access education services, conduct business and remain in contact with family and friends." Mr Joyce said.

"I look forward to working with Telstra so that building the new infrastructure can get underway and the community can benefit from improved coverage."

Minister for Regionalisation, Regional Communications and Regional Education, Senator Bridget McKenzie, announced the Government has committed \$20.5 million to fund 67 new mobile base stations across Australia.

"This announcement brings the total number of base stations being funded under our Mobile Black Spot Program to over 1,270, representing a total investment of over \$875 million," Senator McKenzie said.

"These base stations will improve coverage in disaster prone areas, along major transport corridors and trial new approaches to delivering coverage.

The 67 base stations funded under Round 5A across regional and remote

Australia will collectively deliver over 12,000 square kilometres of new and improved handheld coverage. The Government is committed to continuing to work with industry, and state and local governments to improve mobile coverage and connectivity across Australia."

Senator McKenzie said a key priority of Round 5A is to test new approaches to supporting improved mobile coverage.

"The Liberals and Nationals Government encourage mobile network operators to deploy shared mobile infrastructure to reduce cost and provide new coverage from more than one carrier," Senator McKenzie said.

"Round 5A includes funding for a trial solution of seven base stations from Thargomindah to Waihora in Queensland, including at East Thargo, Dynevor Downs, Bulloo, Paroo and Eulo that will allow all mobile network operators to provide services.

Access to 21st century communications is an essential service for all Australians no matter where they live", Senator McKenzie said.

The full list of base stations funded under Round 5A of the MBSP is available on the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications website.
