### History Rotes

The back page photo last week started a search of both recipe books and history folders. No I have not heard of anyone visiting the C.W.A. home in Glen Innes — it may have been more for those down on the coast. However, I knew we did have a branch of the C.W.A. in Barraba.

The Barraba and Horton Chronicle dated the 5<sup>th</sup> August, 1926, published a report of the first meeting of the C.W.A. The meeting was held in the Mechanic's Institute (next to the old fire station in Maude Street) and was chaired by the Mayoress, Mrs McArdle.

Mrs Studdy, president of the C.W.A. was in attendance and after some discussion it was decided to form a branch in Barraba. Mrs McArdle was elected president and her committee included, Mesdames Wallace, McIlrick, Pearce, Fiddes, Miss Thompson and Miss C.K.Parker.

It was decided to meet on the second Saturday each month and that the membership fee be four shillings per year or 5 pounds 5 shillings for life membership.

The branch seems to have functioned well through the next ten years or so as the meeting notices and advertisement's for street stall are scattered through the newspapers. Several full reports are published in 1930, 1932, 1935 and make interesting reading as they discussed donations to the hospital, formation of a Baby Health Centre in Manilla, the Annual Blue and Gold Ball which was held annually in Clifton Hall and of course conferences, some of which were held in Barraba, in the Masonic Supper Room.

The C.W.A. seems to have closed down in the 1940's possibly due to the war and the extra activity that was put into the Red Cross at that time. It was revived again later in the 20<sup>th</sup> century – about the time when the asbestos mine was functioning but died out after a short while.

I wonder how many people have a C.W.A. cook book. Early in 1932 the C.W.A. put out several long (28cm x 15cm) with a with a recipe for every day of the year - Luncheon/Tea/ dishes, Biscuits & Cakes, and Puddings - there may have been more. Then there was the Coronation Cookery Book put out in 1937 and a second edition in November, 1938. These early books were much more than recipes with all sorts of remedies for illness, first aid, when babies should start solids etc. My last one is dated 1976 and contains more recipes and less hints. Only Barraba people can answer why we do not have a branch now - not enough people to support all the organizations we have now! Back to the newspapers next week.


## Australian Poetry Month

# Here is an overview of outcomes from the Ordinary Meeting of Tamworth Regional Council on the 27<sup>th</sup> July:

Councillors took an important step towards ensuring a strong future for the Tamworth Country Music Festival beyond its 50th year by approving the formation

of a Tamworth Country Music Advisory Group. They agreed the move would "contribute in a meaningful way to ensure the Festival remains Australia's biggest foremost music festival". Tamworth Region Mayor Col Murray said the new group was a form of "succession planning" for Festival. "There is a core group of people in our community who have helped to grow and develop the Festival but the years have moved on and they won't be around forever it's important we prepare for generational change and this group is a way to help that happen," he said. "The cultural and historic elements which have defined Tamworth as the Country Music Capital must not be lost or allowed to diminish." Councillors decided the new group will have at its core the "Mayor of the day", one other Councillor, the Director of the Festival and other relevant Council staff. The group will appoint and co-opt willing and qualified individuals" "suitably including from organisations such as the Country Music Association of Australia and the local community who "reflect the diversity of the City's country music assets and events". It was agreed the group's charter will be to "advise, comment and make recommendations to Council to protect, preserve and grow the City's country music festival, country music assets and to explore other opportunities to enhance the city's music credentials".

Despite recent rainfall, flowing rivers and dams nearing capacity, Councillors tonight agreed that exploring further avenues to increase water security for the Tamworth, Moonbi and Kootingal water supply is of extreme importance. The next step in this process will entail drilling two test

bores at the Australian Equine and Livestock Events Centre investigative works undertaken by contractor SMEC, as part of Council's Emergency Water Supply Plan, identified parts of the site as having good groundwater potential. The test bores, which will be funded by Council's Water Reserve, will be assessed on water location, quality, flowrates, recharge rates, and aquifer impact. If the test bores are drilled and found to be able to provide a significant flow at suitable quality, then Council would be able to consider this when the draft Drought Management/Water Management Plan is reviewed later this year.

A plan to guide the ongoing maintenance, improvement expansion of the local footpath and shared pathway network, the draft Active Transport Strategy 2021, was tonight adopted by Councillors. A report to Council said the draft plan drew wide support from the community when feedback was sought earlier this year. The draft plan - put together in consultation with the community and discussions with key groups - followed best practices on a national, state and local level. The plan will guide Council staff over the next 10 years in providing a safe, inclusive and connected network for the community. Across the Tamworth region, there are about 36km of shared pathways and 118km of footpaths. Council staff will continue to seek funding from the Federal and State Government programs to undertake works proposed in the strategy. At this stage, with all available current funding, additional 7.7km of shared pathway and 2.2km of footpath will be constructed across the region by 2023.

Councillors have tonight adopted the Northern Inland Centre of Sporting Excellence 2021 Master Plan, a plan to expand and diversify Tamworth's sporting facilities. They also agreed to continue to work with State sporting organisation to ensure the precinct "is developed as the premier sporting hub for North West NSW" and to explore funding sources for proposed works. The precinct centred around Jack Smyth Drive on the southern side of Tamworth currently includes the Australian Equine and Livestock Events Centre (AELEC), Tamworth Sports Dome, Tamworth Regional Entertainment and Conference Centre, Tamworth Regional Hockey Complex, Tamworth Regional Gymnastics Centre. Tamworth Regional Athletics Centre and Tamworth Regional Cycling Centre. The master plan identifies possible future works in three categories: Sport, AELEC and support infrastructure. The possible new facilities may include an aquatics and leisure centre, construction of a new multipurpose oval and grandstand, gymnastics centre extension and establishing a new dressage arena and a polocrosse field at the Australian Equine and Livestock Events Centre. The precinct is recognised as a significant regional sports hub and has successfully secured and has hosted a number of local, state, and national sporting events.

## Future Drought Fund opens grants for \$34.2 million to deliver innovation in drought resilience

- A \$34.2 million (GST exclusive) competitive grants process for innovative projects to manage and prepare for the impacts of drought has opened today.
- The Drought Resilience Innovation Grants are a key element of the Future Drought Fund's Research and Adoption program.

Expressions of interest are invited for projects to manage and prepare for the impacts of drought through the Federal Government's \$5 billion Future Drought Fund (FDF).

Deputy Prime Minister and Member for New England, Barnaby Joyce said the Government is looking to support a range of activities with the grants split into three categories: an ideas grant, a proof-of-concept grant and an innovation grant.

"Ideas grants and proof-of-concept grants are for good ideas that need further development while innovation grants are for more mature ideas," Mr Joyce said.

"Whether you're from an innovation organisation, the private sector, industry, not-for-profit organisation, community group or a consortium – now is the time to get involved."

Mr Joyce said, "If you have a great idea that needs some dollars behind it, then I encourage you to participate in the Future Drought Fund's Drought Resilience Innovation Grants, which has over \$34 million available to support drought resilience innovation projects."

Minister for Agriculture and Northern Australia, David Littleproud said the Drought Resilience Innovation Grants would drive development, extension, adoption and commercialisation of drought resilience practices and technologies.

"If we want our Australian farmers – and the communities and businesses that depend on them – to thrive through future droughts, we need new ideas, practices, technologies and ways of doing business," Mr Littleproud said.

"Innovation is critical to our agriculture sector. We are looking for those bright sparks out there with ideas that could transform agricultural practices, technologies and business models to make Australian farmers and communities more resilient to droughts."



MEMBER for Northern Tablelands and Minister for Agriculture Adam Marshall has today announced the opening of the zinc phosphide rebate program for farmers as part of the NSW Government's \$150 million mice support package. Mr Marshall said primary producers intending to lay defences against a spring surge in mice numbers were encouraged to apply for the 50 per cent rebate, of up to \$10,000.

"These rodents pose a serious threat to the upcoming harvest so we want to ensure farmers have the support they need to bait their paddocks and protect their crops," Mr Marshall said. "We have made \$100 million available for zinc phosphide rebates which means farmers can apply for a one-off rebate of 50 per cent of the cost of purchasing zinc phosphide-based baits, up to \$10,000. We have worked closely with NSW Farmers to ensure the eligibility requirements are fit for purpose and provide support to farmers who need it most."

Mr Marshall said. "I urge farmers to start monitoring mice numbers on their farms right now and start planning how they will manage the impacts as the population increases as we approach harvest."

Eligible zinc phosphide based bait purchased from 1 January 2021 until 17 December 2021 will be eligible for the rebate scheme with final invoices to be submitted by 28 January 2022. ### How rain, wind, heat and other heavy weather can affect your internet connection

When your Netflix stream drops out in the middle of a rainstorm, can you blame the wild weather?

Quite possibly. The weather can affect the performance of your internet connection in a variety of ways.

This can include issues such as physical damage to the network, water getting into electrical connections, and wireless signal interference. Some types of connection are more vulnerable to weather than others.


The behaviour of other humans in response to the weather can also have an effect on your connection.

### How rain can affect your internet connection

Internet connections are much more complicated than the router and cables in our homes. There are many networking devices and cables and connections (of a variety of types and ages) between our homes and the websites we are browsing.

An internet connection may involve different kinds of physical link, including the copper wiring used in the old phone network and more modern fibre optic connections. There may also be wireless connections involved, such as WiFi, microwave and satellite radio.

### Typical path to an Internet service



Rain can cause physical damage to cables, particularly where telecommunication networks are using old infrastructure. ADSL-style connections, which use the old phone network, are particularly vulnerable to this type of interference.

Although many Australians may be connected to the National Broadband Network (NBN), this can still run (in part) through pre-existing copper wires (in the case of "fibre to the node" or "fibre to the cabinet" connections) rather than modern optical fibres ("fibre to the home").

Much of the internet's cabling is underground, so if there is flooding, moisture can get into the cables or their connectors. This can significantly interfere with signals or even block them entirely, by reducing the bandwidth or causing an electrical short-circuit.

But it isn't just your home connection that can be impacted. Wireless signals outside the home or building can be affected by rainfall as water droplets can partially absorb the signal, which may result in a lower level of coverage.

Even once the rain stops, the effects can still be felt. High humidity can continue to affect the strength of wireless signals and may cause slower connection speeds.

### Copper cables and changed behaviour

If you are using ADSL or NBN for your internet connection, it is likely copper phone cables are used for at least some of the journey. These cables were designed to carry voice signals rather than data, and on average they are now more than 35 years old.

Only around 18% of Australian homes have the faster and more reliable optical-fibre connections.

There is also a behaviour factor. When it rains, more people might decide to stay indoors or work from home. This inevitably leads to an increase in the network usage. When a large number of people increase their internet usage, the limited bandwidth available is rapidly consumed, resulting in apparent slowdowns.

This is not only within your home, but is also aggregated further up the network as your traffic is joined by that from other homes and eventually entire cities and countries.

### Heatwaves and high winds

In Australia, extreme cold is not usually a great concern. Heat is perhaps a more common problem. Our networking devices are likely to perform more slowly when exposed to extreme heat. Even cables can suffer physical damage that may affect the connection.

Imagine your computer fan is not running and the device overheats — it will eventually fail. While the device itself may be fine, it is likely the power supply will struggle in extremes. This same issue can affect the networking equipment that controls our internet connection.

Satellite internet services for rural users can be susceptible to extreme weather, as the satellite signals have to travel long distances in the air. Radio signals are not usually affected by wind, but hardware such as satellite dishes can be swayed, vibrated, flexed or moved by the wind.

#### Most of the time, human behaviour is the main cause

For most users, the impact of rain will be slight – unless they are physically affected by a significant issue such as submerged cables, or they are trying to use WiFi outside during a storm.

So, can weather affect your internet connection? Absolutely. **Will most users be affected? Unlikely.** 

So if your favourite Netflix show is running slow during in rainy weather, it's most likely that the behaviour of other humans is to blame — holed up indoors and hitting the internet, just like you.

### RAISIN ROLL.

JULY 2 cups flour, 2 teasp. baking powder, pinch salt, 4 tablesp. butter, 4 tablesp. sugar, a little milk to bind. Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Rub in half the butter and pour in enough milk to mix. Roll out about half an inch thick—keeping it as square as possible. Cover well with seeded raisins and at squeeze of lemon juice, cream sugar and the rest of the butter and dot half of this over the raisins and roll up like a jam roll. Put in baking dish and spread with the rest of the butter and sugar mixture. Pour half cup boiling water into the baking dish and bake in a moderate oven from 30 to 45 minutes. Serve with lemon sauce.
