## 'Beyond the Walls' in Barraba

Barraba Public Art committee are pleased to announce that the latest public art project in Barraba is now complete.

Beyond the Walls, by internationally acclaimed artist Jenny McCracken, is an explosion of colour and nature, featuring local landmark Horton Falls in all its rich and glorious beauty.

Committee member Emily Bowman explains that it is hoped this latest art instalment will encourage visitors to the recently completed silo art mural, which sits on the outskirts of town, to also visit the township.

"The committee's vision is to create inspiring public art that will attract visitors to our beautiful town – people who will walk down our streets, meet the locals, shop in our shops and stay over-night in our pubs, hotels and motels.

Horton Falls are a very popular summertime destination with locals, and they hold fond memories for many. After many years of drought, the falls are once again flowing freely, and this is truly something to celebrate.

Jenny McCracken has perfectly captured this emotion, along with the natural beauty and rich diversity of wildlife in the area."

There are 3D elements to the piece, along with numerous local species of birds and other animals depicted. In total there are 8 animals to be spotted by day.

### Extract from Jenny McCracken's Artist Statement:

'Beyond the walls' is an illusory image of breaking through the constructs of civilization to a wonderland of treasured memories and natural beauty. Horton Falls, backdrop of the mural, is a local landmark where generations of Barraba families have enjoyed refreshing afternoons, camping, swimming, picnicking and exploring. The surrounding bush is a haven for wildlife, birds in particular. Five of the more than a dozen different species of parrots found locally are featured, including the rarest, and one of the most common. The little swift parrot, and the galah are the smallest and largest birds depicted, and a king parrot, a red rumped parrot and an eastern rosella, along with a pacific, or white necked heron all appear to be taking flight.



You can imagine whoops and calls of delight have disturbed the peace, as a figure swings out over the deep pool at the base of the falls.

## Across the Desk from the Relieving Principal Kirsty Ebzery

We are unfortunate to be operating in remote-learning mode. The NSW Premier announced that, in addition to Greater Sydney, stay-at-home rules apply to all schools in regional NSW from 5 pm Saturday 14 August to 12.01 am Sunday 22 August. This has now been extended to the 28 August. This replaced any existing orders in regional NSW. Parents and carers in these LGAs must keep children – across primary and secondary school - at home unless they need to be at school. Schools are open for any child that needs it. As a Level 4 school, while in indoor settings in schools, mask or face coverings are required for all staff, and students in year 7 and above. NESA has announced a number of changes to the 2021 HSC timetables. For more information, refer to HSC exam advice. Currently the Trial HSC Exams will be on hold, we are awaiting clarification from DoE and NESA we will provide additional updates as the current situation evolves. On Mondays after 1pm home learning packs will be available for pick up. Primary home learning packs will be available for collection at the Kindergarten gate, there will also be a box to drop off completed home learning. Secondary town home learning packs will be available for collection at the front door of the secondary office, there will also be a box to drop off completed home learning. Bus home learning packs will be sent out on buses, please meet the driver at your normal bus time.

Due to the COVID-19 Lockdown, the school is operating with minimal staff onsite. This means we have two Teaching staff and one SASS staff member on each site per day. All schools in regional NSW were strongly urged to reduce the staff numbers to an absolute minimum needed to meet the immediate needs of the school. Staff are currently following a weekly staff rotation roster in line with the current COVID-19 stay-at-home orders.

Stage 5 and 6 2022 Subject Selections booklets will be sent home with Monday 23 August Home Learning Packs. Included in this will be individual secondary staff DoE email addresses, please feel free to communicate with individual staff via email if you have any questions in regards to 2022 subject choice/selections. We would appreciate it if you could return your completed Subject Selection Sheet on Monday 30 August with your completed learning pack.

During week 5 lockdown, a Sensory Path was constructed on the secondary site in the hall. It was a physically gruelling task that took 5 hours to complete. But once completed was immensely satisfying giving the sensory path a trial run. Sensory paths give students a chance to spend a few minutes

of their school day walking, jumping, bouncing and pushing themselves through their distractions. Experts say sensory paths can also help students develop motor skills, including balance, hand-eye coordination and spatial awareness. The benefits aren't only for students dealing with sensory processing issues. Studies show movement stimulates cognitive activity, which means students learn better when they have been active.

Each year since 1945 the CBCA has brought children and books together across Australia through the CBCA Book Week. During this time schools and public libraries spend one glorious week celebrating books and Australian children's authors and illustrators. Classroom teachers, teacher librarians and public libraries create colourful displays, develop activities, run competitions and tell stories relating to a theme to highlight the importance of reading. You will often see parades with students dressed as their favourite book character. This is the 75th year of celebrating Book Week and the theme for 2021 is 'Old Worlds, New Worlds, Other Worlds'. Barraba Central School is celebrating Book Week during week 7, we would like to encourage all primary and secondary students to get their thinking caps on and create a costume of a favourite book character whilst at home in lockdown. ### LOCAL ORGANISATIONS AND COUNCILS INVITED TO TAKE PART IN 2022 SENIORS FESTIVAL

Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson has encouraged local organisations and councils to apply for grant funding for activities for local seniors during the 2022 NSW Seniors Festival.

Mr Anderson said "The \$200,000 NSW Seniors Festival Grants Program supports initiatives that encourage people aged 60 and over to stay healthy, engaged and active.

Local events have been hugely popular and beneficial in the past including the Aussie Bush Bash in Walcha or Gunnedah's Mackellar Care's 2-18 'Enrichment week' which ran exercise classes, run in conjunction with community restaurants to improve physical and mental health."

Local councils, community groups and not-for-profit organisations are among those who can apply for grants of up to \$10,000.

The NSW Seniors Festival is the largest event of its kind in the Southern Hemisphere and has been running for more than 63 years.

Minister for Seniors Natalie Ward said the program reinforces the NSW Government's dedication to older people, outlines in the Ageing Well in NSW: Seniors Strategy 2021-2031

The Seniors Festival will be run from 25 March to 3 April 2022. Applications for grants are now open and close on 30 August.

A little bit about Zola. She was born and raised in Barraba and had one sister, Ruth Jenner. On completion of the Intermediate Certificate at the local school, Zola worked in the Accounts Section of McKenzie's Store. At the age of 18 she decided to move to Sydney where she met George Robertson who had come out from Scotland. There were 2 children from the marriage, Gary and Narelle, both of whom spent time visiting Barraba when they were young as did our children.

Zola never forgot her Barraba roots and on several occasions we took her up to the Barraba Festival which we all enjoyed. Other trips were made to catch up with relatives – Pam Reed is Gary's cousin. Before he passed away, we would also stop at Tamworth to visit Terry Jenner (Ruth's son). Terry worked at the Barraba News for many years.

Zola stayed in her home until 4 months before her death when she moved to Brisbane to be with her daughter. ### **STAY AT HOME RULES**

The Stay at Home Rules as we published last week remain in place until at least 28 August. Visiting other homes is not permitted.

The exercise rules and face mask rules have been tightened; you MUST wear a face mask whenever you leave home, unless you are exercising on your own or with one other person.

### Reasonable excuse to leave home

A reasonable excuse is if you need to

- obtain food or other goods and services locally
- leave home to go to work if
  - you cannot reasonably <u>work from</u> <u>home</u> and
  - o the business is allowed to be open
- leave home for education if it is not possible to do it at home
- exercise and take outdoor recreation within your local government area or, if you need to cross into another local government area, stay within 5km of your home
- go out for medical or caring reasons, including obtaining a COVID-19 vaccination.

#### Face masks

In local government areas where the stay at home rules apply, when you leave home you must carry a face mask with you at all times.

You must wear a face mask

- in all indoor areas of non-residential premises or outdoor areas other than a place of residence
- if you are on public transport or in a public transport waiting area
- if you are working in a hospitality venue
- in indoor and outdoor areas of construction sites, except when an exemption applies such as when
  - wearing a face mask creates a safety issue or
  - o there is a worksite emergency
- when working in an outdoor area.

Face masks must be worn at indoor or outdoor areas of a fresh food market, and outdoors next to or near food, drink and retail premises including

- queuing outside a cafe or shop to collect take away food or drink
- walking on a street near shop fronts.

### Visitors to a residence

Generally, visiting another person is not a reasonable excuse to leave your home.

You must not allow a person to visit your home, except if it is

- for permitted work
- for childcare
- to give effect to arrangements between parents and children under 18 or their siblings
- to assist a person to move places of residence
- to avoid an injury or serious risk of harm
- because of an emergency
- to view or inspect property to lease or purchase it.

Socialising isn't a reasonable excuse to have visitors or leave home unless you live on your own. If you do live on your own, your nominated visitor can visit you.

Service NSW is offering a personalised "check-in card" to anyone who needs one.

The card operates in the same way as a Dine & Discover NSW voucher but is used to check in when entering a shop or business.

## UPPER HORTON, NORTH STAR, COOLATAI AND BOOMI SHARE DROUGHT RELIEF FUNDING

The Australian Government is continuing to back droughtaffected communities, with projects across the nation to receive a share of more than \$1 million under the Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal's award-winning Tackling Tough Times Together program.

The Northern Slopes Landcare Association will receive \$16,975 for its delivery of the Rural Women's Catch-up events in drought affected communities of Upper Horton, North Star, Coolatai and Boomi.

Deputy Prime Minister and Member for New England, Barnaby Joyce said the project aims to encourage more local involvement in the community by delivering a series of workshops in the Gwydir and Moree Plains areas, to help reduce social isolation.

"The Coalition is pleased to support the Foundation's critical work of supporting drought-affected communities, as the

regions continue their recovery from the impacts of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and effects of natural disasters," Mr Joyce said.

"The Tackling Tough Times Together program has a range of benefits, including facilitating strong social cohesion, reducing volunteer fatigue and stimulating the local economy, which in-turn create capable communities and skilful leaders within our regions."

"This funding is being delivered directly to grassroots, community-led initiatives to benefit local communities that have been hardest-hit, providing immediate support as we continue to weather the impacts of the pandemic," Mr Joyce said.

"The Australian Government's \$15 million commitment to the Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal's Tackling Tough Times Together Program is already supporting hundreds of projects run by local groups."

Mr Joyce said, "While we've seen good rainfall in some parts of Australia, the impacts of drought are long-term and farreaching, which is why it is vital the Government continues to back our regions to support a more secure and resilient Australia."

Minister for Agriculture and Northern Australia, David Littleproud said a number of projects would deliver outcomes that boost community identity and sense of place, which is crucial for the wellbeing of Australia's rural and remote communities.

"The Tackling Tough Times Together program is a rolling grants program and I encourage drought-affected communities to apply for the next open round of funding."

### Council's Annual Donation Program now open

Tamworth Regional Council's Annual Donation Program 2021-22 is now open for applications. The program is designed to help small to medium organisations and community groups who do significant work in the community with funding to help their operations.

There is \$61,000 available for the Tamworth region, including the townships of Nundle, Manilla and Barraba.

Councillor Helen Tickle said it is a great program that assist with the operations of essential community groups.

"Receiving a small donation can make a big difference to these organisations and represent a real benefit to the community. Funds can be used to pay for essential maintenance, build a website or pay for supplies and keep small organisations going during what are already difficult times."

In 2020-21 the program provided much needed funds across the region to a range of organisations. Among the successful applications last year were the Nandewar Historical Society Inc. who was successful in its donation application of \$4,997 to install airconditioning in its museum, the Manilla Men's Shed who used its \$802.14 donation to buy materials for six fire pits, the Lions Club of Barraba received \$5,000 to buy maintenance materials and eight community groups in Tamworth received funding as part of the program.

Applications are invited from not-forprofit organisations, charities, community groups and organisations located within the Tamworth Regional Council local government area, that provides a service to the Tamworth regional community which may be of a unique nature. Recipients of donations funding in previous years are welcome to reapply. Organisations are eligible for only one donation per financial year, that is 1 July to 30 June.

Successful applicants will be determined by a panel of three Councillors, Cr Helen Tickle, Cr Juanita Wilson and Cr Jim Maxwell.

It is critical that risks to supply are minimised, particularly to facilities involved in the response to COVID-19," Amalie said.

Amalie also asked people to consider Essential Energy's employees.

"Please remember our employees are also living in impacted areas and as essential workers, they're all working to provide safe and reliable electricity, while responding to many of the additional pressures affecting wider community. ## Celebrating Science & Technology

National Science Week is Australia's annual celebration of science and technology. Running each year in August, it features more than 1000 events around Australia, including those delivered by universities, schools, research institutions. libraries. museums and science centres. Over making sour dough bread and pasta during lockdown? Here's a simple (and useful) experiment you can do at home with the kids while they 'stay at home'.

### **Ricotta Cheese**

This recipe makes around 140g. Ricotta is a simple cheese to make and one you can eat with pasta, salad, on toast or add to other recipes like spinach and ricotta rolls **Time required: 20 minutes Recipe difficulty: Easy** 

### Ingredients

750m full cream milk 35 mL white vinegar or lemon juice ¼ tsp salt

### Equipment

Large saucepan Large bowl Measuring spoons Measuring cups Stove Spoon Colander Muslin cloth/ cheese cloth / new chux cloth Food thermometer

### Method

1. Pour the milk into saucepan, add salt and place over a medium heat.

2. Heat the milk slowly, stirring from time to time.

3. When it is almost at boiling point, (82-85°C) remove from the heat, and add the vinegar or lemon and stir gently.

4. Curds will start to form.

5. Stir for around one minute.

6. Let pan sit for around 10 minutes while the curds form.
7. Line a colander with a large piece of dampened muslin/clean chux and place over a larger bowl (if you wish to keep the whey – the pale yellow/green clear liquid).

8. Gently pour the ricotta into the colander. For safety reasons make sure you don't pour while the liquid is hot.

9. Allow to drain for 10 minutes. If you prefer drier cheese, twist the cheese in the cloth to squeeze out extra liquid.

10. The ricotta is now ready for your next recipe adventure.

11. Store in clean, airtight container for up to seven days.

### What's going on?

This is a simple cheese made using an acid (lemon juice/vinegar). This causes the proteins to coagulate and curdle or clump together and make the cheese. The lumps or solids are the curds while the clear. coloured liauid is referred to as whey. "Traditional" ricotta is usually made with whey, not milk. Ricotta is made differently than harder cheeses like cheddar. The ricotta curds are guite soft and weak. They hold more moisture and unlike cheddar cheese, ricotta doesn't melt.

### Tips

• When making ricotta never use UHT milk. For best results use full cream milk.

• If your milk doesn't develop curds when you add the acid (vinegar or lemon juice)

then you may need to add a little more vinegar/lemon juice.

• If using fresh lemon juice, don't use Meyer lemons they are not acidic enough.

• There are some recipes that suggest also adding cream. Try these for a richer result.

### Did you know?

Eating cheese slows tooth decay! When eaten at the end of a meal the cheese can help reduce acid in your mouth which in turn can slow tooth decay
