As lockdown is continued at Joey's we are concentrating on taking care of each other's well-being over the next few weeks. Home-learning can be a wonderful experience, but it can also be very challenging. Sometimes if things aren't going well then it's best to leave the school work for the day and go outside and enjoy the sunshine!

This is a temporary situation and learning at school will resume. Our data shows our students' learning was not greatly impacted during last year's lockdown. Our director Chris Smyth put it well in the CSO e-bulletin this week: "The need for parents to just love their children and focus on their wellbeing must be a consistent message. Parents cannot be expected to be teachers to their children, just like teachers cannot be parents to their students".

During home learning K/1 students have been using the seesaw app as our learning platform. Mrs Phillips has been able to set the class tasks and upload videos to support children's learning at home. Seesaw has allowed the class to maintain a somewhat normal learning routine.

2/3/4 students have been completing some incredible work whilst working from home. Book Week was celebrated enthusiastically from home. The class had fun with dress up Zoom classes with students telling everyone about their favourite books. Year %'s Zoom classes have focused on practising the 5/6 play, practising maths questions and engaging in science experiments.

When the extension of lockdown was announced Joey's staff made small care packages for families. It contained a deck of cards and a bouncy ball for games, a Joey's mug with some coffee and tea for mum or dad, and a Joey's glass for cold drinks. There were a few little treats in the box too. There was also a pencil and a rubber because they are always handy. Our bus drivers have been amazing, so they received a coffee mug and some treats as well.

Here is an overview of outcomes from the Ordinary Meeting of Tamworth Regional Council on Tuesday 24th August 2021:

Tamworth Regional Councillors tonight decided to delay making a decision about funding a study into the economic impacts of the recent drought until after a Councillor workshop. At the workshop, Councillors want to discuss how the study may look at water security more broadly and how this is tied to Council's growth objectives of the future.

Two new bus zones will be installed adjacent to Manilla Pre-School in Carinya Avenue following Council's support of a Tamworth Regional Local Traffic Committee recommendation tonight. The Manilla Pre-School's Director asked for the introduction of the zones because local buses have been dropping off and collecting children from the area since the COVID-19 pandemic began. The zones will be active from 8:30am to 9:30am and 2:30pm to 3:30pm, Monday to Friday.

Tonight's meeting heard about plans to locate a restored Vampire Jet in Tamworth's Bicentennial Park. A report from Tamworth Region Art Advisory Committee revealed the Tamworth RSL Sub-Branch strongly supports the aircraft be given a new home in the park once restoration work is completed. The jet was removed from a stanchion in the Hands of Fame Park for repair and restoration by TAFE Aeroskills students. Work is expected to be completed in December 2021 or January 2022. The report said the committee will further consider the matter once Council staff have completed locational designs.

The Tamworth Region Art Advisory Committee report also provided Councillors with an update about plans to create an annual arts festival in Tamworth. Wildspark Rural Arts Vision Community Group, a registered not-forprofit, has been formed to run the festival and form a partnership with Council. Councillors supported a recommendation for Tamworth Regional Gallery and Museums Director, Bridget Guthrie, to represent Council as part of the group.

When life gives you lemons ... 4 Stoic tips for getting through lockdown

Here are four tips from a stoic:

1. Don't worry about things we can't control

If we worry about things we can't change, we are wasting our energies. If we imagine that we can control the past or future — or even pandemics — we are setting ourselves up for disappointment.

But we can think and act, and do our best to respond to situations with courage, justice, and moderation.

Today's citizens in lockdown can't control whether (or when) restrictions are lifted. We can all however wear masks, social distance, get vaccinated as soon as possible, and continue working, exercising and educating our kids as best we can.

2. Prepare for the worst, hope for the best

People are most prone to being disturbed by events which take them by surprise. By premeditating the worst case scenario, and imaginatively working through how we could respond in advance, we can lessen our vulnerability.

While the preparation can be confronting, being grieved or angered by things we have no say over, like a sudden lockdown extension, is far worse. "Premeditated is prepared". If things go better than we prepare for, all the better.

3. Contextualise and 'other-ise'

When we're under duress, we often feel as if what we are experiencing is unprecedented. No one else can understand. But it helps to remember that few experiences, even during a pandemic, are unprecedented.

We are in the second year of COVID. But the world wars lasted four and six years. This is a pandemic, yet other generations have experienced plagues (or the Spanish flu) in which grievous losses were also sustained. Those who survived were able to rebuild. So will we.

It can also help to "step back" and assess our experience as if it was happening to somebody else:

For example, when a friend's child breaks a cup it is easy for us to say, 'That is in the nature of cups and of children.' [But] when you realise that situation is true of you, it is easy for you to say that same thing to yourself when a child breaks your cup ...

So, when we are inclined to despair in difficulties "we ought to remember how we feel when we hear of the same misfortune befalling others". By looking at ourselves as if we were an 'other', we can apply the same support and encouragement to ourselves.

4. Slow down, make sure

In life, we can easily leap between ideas in ways which lead us to false beliefs.

These reasons do not cohere: I am richer than you, therefore I am better than you; I am more eloquent than you, therefore I am better than you.

On the contrary these reasons cohere: I am richer than you, therefore my possessions are greater than yours: I am more eloquent than you, therefore my speech is superior to yours. It's easy to add a lot of avoidable, habitual, evaluative judgements to what we know and experience. Often, these add-ons introduce assumptions which aren't based on adequate information. These lead us to react excessively or poorly.

We should slow our roll and our "judginess" down, especially when it comes to condemning others.

In the age of swarming internet conspiracies on social media, this fourth piece of advice is new again.

When presented with allegations of nefarious or appalling conduct by fellow citizens ask: do I know that that is true? Do I have enough information to be sure?

Such self-examination stops us from becoming enraged on the basis of fictions — let alone spreading misinformation which provokes or enrages others. If enough people do that, we could collectively avoid many future difficulties.

UPDATE OF COVID RESTRICTIONS

Editor's Note: Constant changes to the restrictions are very confusing for all of us. Keep in mind the <u>intention</u> of the "Stay at Home Orders". The only way to limit the spread of the very infectious delta virus is to stop people moving around.

In the last week in our area, the delta virus has been found in Tamworth sewage for a second time. That almost certainly means that someone, probably unknowingly, has the virus in Tamworth. So I guess the lesson for us in Barraba is "don't go to Tamworth" unless it is absolutely necessary.

1. Stay-at-home orders for regional NSW extended

Stay-at-home orders for regional and rural NSW are extended until at least 11:59pm on 10 September, in line with existing orders for the Greater Sydney area.

2. Travel restrictions

Do not travel to Greater Sydney (including the Blue Mountains and Wollongong) without a reasonable excuse.

3. COVID-19 travel registration

From Saturday 28 August 2021, if you live in regional and rural NSW and need to enter a local government area of concern for work, you will need to <u>register for travel</u>. Areas of concern are the local government areas of Bayside, Blacktown, Burwood, Campbelltown, Canterbury-Bankstown, Cumberland, Fairfield, Georges River, Liverpool, Parramatta, Strathfield, and some suburbs of Penrith.

4. Weddings

From 12:01am on Friday, September 3, residents can get married with a group of up to five guests.

The minister or celebrant conducting the wedding, as well as a photographer, would not be included in the five guests.

PERMANENT WATER RESTRICTIONS IN BARRABA

Just a friendly reminder that under Permanent Water Conservation Measures (which all town water supplies in the Tamworth Regional Council area are on at the moment), you should only be using a sprinkler, spray, microspray, or fixed hose between 4pm and 9am.

Here are the restrictions -

Barraba is currently on permanent water conservation measures.

This means:

- Permanent Water Conservation Measures are always in place when there are no actual water restrictions.
- Use of sprinklers, sprays, microsprays and fixed hoses is not allowed during the heat of the day, which means watering must take place between 4pm to 9am Eastern Standard Time and 6pm to 8am Daylight Saving Time.
- Hand-held hoses with trigger nozzles, and buckets or watering cans, may used for watering of lawns, gardens and vehicle-washing at any time.
- Trigger nozzles must be used on all hoses to help conserve supplies and avoid waste.
- No washdown of hard surfaces unless using a highpressure cleaner.
- Access water for any purpose from the water supplies bulk water filling stations using a credit card or Council issued card.

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History Notes

Well the lockdown drags on and we get inquiries about the Markets, Meeting, etc. and there are no answers! This week I have had an enquiry re the Bowling Club which I will need help with from an older member of the club - one who remembers the first rebuilding of the club in the 1950's at a guess. We have photos of the event which need some identifying. The enquirer is the daughter of the president at that time - Jack Thompson, manager of Mayvale. Any help will be gratefully received after we are able to move around again.

Partly because I had time and partly because of the above query I have been turning out boxes of store history. Sometime back we used the first Gazette to remind residents about the "Ironhorse Festival" in 1968. Today I have found Betty Crowley's folders kept from the festival – she was the Historical Society secretary at the time.

In the folder, which is rather thick, I found multiple copies of the Recreation Time (published weekly) with the T.V. programs and sporting news. This publication led to the beginning of The Barraba Gazette which began in January 1969. There were also some school publications obviously written by the children and printed in blue ink on old folio paper. There was a competition for Moustache and Beard growing, as well as a Colonial girl, and a huge list of donations amounting to \$500 but still \$90 short of the cost. There was even a large piece of Mackenzie's wrapping paper - remember when we bought something it was wrapped or put into a paper bag!

The following comes from the children's efforts:

'Three year old Johnnie returned home from a visit to the hairdresser and proudly showed his crew-cut to his baby sister. "You'll get one when you are older" he told her. "But girls don't have crew-cuts, dear" explained his mother. Johnnie looked baffled. "You mean she's going to stay a girl." He exclaimed.' And just one more:

'Mother of quads was sitting up proudly in bed, when her 5 year old son came to visit her. The first question he asked his mother was – "How many are we keeping?

The school principal at the time was Mr Ken Mitchell and he notes in his Report that steps are being taken to secure a site for the new Secondary School and the new steps at the front of the Primary School were nearing completion.

From The Conversation

Hidden women of history: how mother of 8, Mary Anne Allen, made do on the goldfields amid gunshots, rain and sly grog

In February 1852, 46-year-old Mary Anne Allen set off from Melbourne for the Mt Alexander (Castlemaine) diggings with her husband Reverend John Allen and their eight children, the youngest aged five.

Histories of the Victorian gold rushes often overlook women's presence on the goldfields in 1852. Women, children and home, however, were always part of goldfields life.

Mary Anne Allen's diary appears to have been written for publication. In it she observes life on the diggings, not through the lens of masculinity and mateship, but through family and home.

A perilous journey

Englishwoman Mary Anne and her family had arrived in Port Phillip before the gold rushes. They migrated in 1849 to deliver the word of God for Scottish evangelist and colonial enthusiast John Dunmore Lang. Yet two years later the family abandoned their congregation in search of gold, "dreaming of little beyond wealth and competency".

On route to Mt Alexander, the family almost lost their dray over a ravine. Their son Frederick tried to "scotch the wheels" (likely wedging a stone or bar to stop them rolling) but to no avail.

"My little girl came running towards me", wrote Mary Anne in her diary. "She said we expected father would have been killed but Fred's hand was smashed and two of his fingers broken." Disaster was averted, but it would be just the beginning of the family's trials.

Next, four bushrangers bailed up a bullock driver ahead of them. The Allen family continued cautiously forward, one of her sons armed with a gun, the second with a hatchet, a third with a club. Mary Anne's younger children inquired anxiously, "What will they do with you Mamma?" Fortunately, fate spared Mary Anne an answer.

Life in the clearings

Mary Anne found the new goldfields "remarkably picturesque and singularly beautiful". The countryside was already home to miners' mia-mias (based on Aboriginal dwellings) and hundreds of tents, scattered for miles through the still dense bush.

But clean drinking water was impossible to find. A German miner gave Mary Anne's children a cup of water, milky with chalk. Another miner gave Mary Anne a loaded gun to help her protect any water they found. The family moved on to nearby Barker's Creek, where there were fewer tents and more available water.

The Allen's erected their tent and furnished it with handmade "bush bedsteads": saplings driven into the ground and bed cases filled with dried leaves. Their table was topped with bark and the floor carpeted with the same. Mary Anne wrote that the bark decomposed rapidly in wet weather, producing an "exceedingly unpleasant" smell.

Many miners' tents, she wrote, were lined with blankets inside and bullock hides externally to keep out the weather. Her sons built a stone fireplace with bark sides, which they topped with an old sugar cask. They put up a tarpaulin awning so the family could bake damper and roast meat without standing in the rain. Even with these precautions, mould covered everything.

Living with uncertainty

Families lived in fear of the dangers presented by mine shafts. The lesson was brought home for the Allen family as they watched a man trapped down a shaft. Then another man went in after him. The father of one of the men rushed forward and he too fell headlong into the mine. The whole party, Mary Anne noted disapprovingly, was the worse for "the influence of spirits".

Bushfires were a frightening, yet entertaining, reality:

"One small tree burnt through fell at our horses feet. We hastened onwards and when out of danger we sat and admired the grandeur of the scene."

At night, diggings glowed with fires outside every tent and lamps lit by candlewicks made from honeysuckle flowers soaked in oil. One night, as the family sat reading around their table, a gun was fired through their tent. The bullet landed on her son's book: "So uncertain was life at Barker's Creek".

On the diggings, Sunday was not for religion but for domestic duties and domestic quarrels. Sometimes Mary Anne expected that "instant death would ensue from stabbing members of their own families".

Abrupt endings

Living next door to a sly grog tent, Mary Anne reported: "Drunkenness, fighting, profanity and robberies were every day occurrences". Her diary ends abruptly, to cries of murder and an aborted gold robbery.

She did not record whether her family found gold. Historical documents reveal the family only stayed six months on the diggings. John did not return to the church until just before his death in 1861, by which time the couple had bought a number of properties in Melbourne.

My doctoral research is the first time Mary Anne's diary has been written into goldfields history. Her manuscript is entitled Mrs Allen's Trip to the Gold Fields, suggesting she intended it for publication. Now, almost 170 years later, we can read her observations as one of many women on the diggings in early 1852.
