REMEMBRANCE DAY IN BARRABA

On Thursday 11th November we will pause to remember the end of the First World War – 103 years ago.

This war was the first modern world conflict and had brought about the mobilisation of over 70 million people and left between 9 and 13 million dead with at least one third of these having no known grave.

After the Second World War the name Remembrance Day was instituted as a day to commemorate all those who died in war.

On Thursday a small service will be held at the Town Memorial Clock. Due to covid restrictions and the inability of those conducting service to check on vaccination status numbers will be limited.

Our service will commence at 11.00 am.

Due to these restrictions, we can all observe one (1) minutes silence at 11.00 am to remember those that have fallen and have given service for their country.

It is also appropriate to remember those that survived these conflicts and who are still suffering the effects of these conflicts.

With restrictions effecting our service we ask that the Barraba and District community pause for a moment to remember all those that have served our country.

Friday 29 November 2021 was International World Teachers Day.

The day provides an opportunity for us to think about the positive impact a particular teacher has had in our lives. There are certainly a few teachers I thank for getting me to where I am today. The day also brings with it a feeling of gratitude. As the Relieving Principal at Barraba Central School I am extremely grateful for the calibre, dedication, professionalism and friendship of the Barraba Central staff. If a chance arises, please reach out and thank a teacher, a simple "thankyou" will mean more than you could imagine. Year 3-9 students will participate in a reading and numeracy check-in assessment. The check-in assessment is a NSW Department of Education online reading and numeracy assessment available to support schools to assess and monitor student learning. The assessments can supplement existing school practices to identify how students are performing and to help teachers tailor their teaching more specifically to student needs. The assessment will be scheduled for our Year 3-9 students during Term 4 Week 5. Students with disabilities may receive the same level of support during the assessment that they would normally receive in the classroom. If you have any questions, contact Mrs Middlemiss for Primary students and Mrs Bell for Secondary students.

In week 7 students from years 3, 5, 7 & 9 will be completing the School Readiness Test (SRT) in preparation for NAPLAN Online in 2022. SRT is an opportunity for schools to set up and run simulated tests to become familiar with the online assessment platform and reflect on areas that may need to be addressed ahead of moving online. SRT is not an assessment of student ability. Student test attempts will not be marked, and results will not be available. If you have any questions about SRT please contact Mrs Middlemiss for primary students and Mrs Bell for Secondary students.

Tuesday 2 November 2021 BCS will be celebrating the Melbourne Cup and we encourage students from K-12 to come dressed in your most amazing fascinator and fanciest tie. This is a fundraising event for the K-12 SRC and they will be organising a meal deal, consisting of a sausage sling, a drink and cupcake for \$5.00 at the primary and sausage sling and drink for \$4.00 at the secondary.

Early Starters Transition Program commenced on Friday 29 October 2021 and will run every Friday until week 9, 3rd November 2021 from 9am to 2:50pm. The aim of the program is to help children adjust to new surroundings and to become familiar with big school routines. New Kindergarten students will receive a complimentary school shirt and hat at time of enrolment at BCS.



Due to current restrictions, transition to Secondary School will look different this year. We are doing what is possible within the current regulations and structures. We understand and value the importance of a Transition Program and aim to support your child during this process. We are giving students the opportunity to attend an afternoon session every Wednesday from Week 4-8, started on the 27 October 2021. Students will walk to the Secondary School with their classroom teacher and attend a one-hour session each week from 2pm-3pm. Different subject areas will be covered each week with Secondary teachers. We are currently discussing the options available to possibly have a full day transition during week 9 and 10. This will be advised after Week 6. If you would like to further discuss your child's transition to Secondary School, please contact the school on 67 821 104.

We would really welcome some new volunteers in the school canteen. Our school is lucky enough to have a canteen on both sites that is open a couple of days a week. Our canteen manager organises extraordinary meal deals weekly and each term we need volunteers from the parent community to help the canteen manager. We urgently need volunteers this term to ensure that the canteen can continue to operate. Without volunteers the P&C would have to consider reducing the opening days and/or ceasing the canteen at BCS. You can volunteer for as many or as few shifts as you would like during the term. It's a great way to see the range of food on offer in the canteen and say "hi" to your children at lunchtime. If you would like to help out, please contact the P&C or the school.



School sport activities are allowed to proceed from 1 November 2021 for the rest of Term 4 with specific restrictions to align with NSW Public Health Orders and the Reopening NSW roadmap. Schools may make use of outdoor pools for swimming lessons and recreational purposes. Therefore, Secondary sport will commence swimming for sport starting Friday 5 November. Students aged 16 and older are not required to be fully vaccinated to enter public outdoor pool facilities.

Peter Whitten (Rusted Tin - Contemporary Aboriginal Artist) will be visiting BCS week 5 on Friday 5 November to meet with students to discuss a plan for the mural on the secondary and primary site. This will be an opportunity for all students to be immersed in aboriginal culture, art, and education. Indigenous murals are wonderful ways to visibly celebrate Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander (ATSI) culture in our school. Having a mural in our school provides an opportunity for students to be exposed on a daily basis to ATSI art styles; it can also be a great platform on which to introduce our students to both past and contemporary indigenous art. In a broader sense, it can help create a learning environment which champions cultural pride, it can help to deepen awareness and appreciation of indigenous culture.

The Guidelines for formals and graduation events are now available. Schools can plan for Year 12 formals to be preferably held at an external venue, from 1 December 2021. The guidelines for formal and graduations were developed with NSW Health and will continue to be updated as new information is received. BCS will be contacting Year 12 students and parents and carers via email in the coming week to discuss the possibility of a Year 12 Graduation Dinner for 2021.

To The Editor.

Hi. Through your Community Newspaper I would like to inform your readers that I have re-nominated for a position on Tamworth Regional Council for a further term, and I am seeking the community's support, as I am the only candidate who has nominated on the northern section of the Council area. I hope, with your support, I can continue to be a voice for the smaller communities.

As member of the Annual Donations Committee and the Heritage Assistance Committees, we have seen support for volunteer originations in Barraba along with Manilla, Nundle and the other small centres. As always, with the help of my fellow Councillors, if re-elected, I will continue to speak up for the outer areas.

In the last term (5 years) we have seen a shift to support more re-sheeting of gravel roads. There's more to be done with the hope of not only improving the roads but to also cut down on maintenance.

I believe that the tourist promotion of the region has been city centric, this needs to change. The outer centres are what makes this region. I'm not against Tamworth, but we have so many interesting sites for tourists to see, as an avid 'caravaner' I know the Grey Nomads want to support the smaller centres.

Our Historic Sites need better signage. Only last week I was at Crow Mountain, there is so much history in that area that needs to be tapped and with the Glen Riddle Reserve being so close, it is an ideal stop-over. Horton Falls, the Public Art (murals), the move of the Council Office, Library and Information Centre to the Main Street have all helped to reactivate the Barraba CBD.

As a member of the Urban Tree Committee we have put a Management Plan in place to enhance all the towns in the TRC area. From a historic point of view, Queen Street has kept its charm with the brick kerb and also most of the buildings have been left in their original form.

I would like to commend the community for their work in achieving so much over the last few years. It has been a hard slog with Covid-19 and drought, but you have achieved much by working together. I have been delighted to been able to help in any small way. Thanks again for your support.

COVID-19 virus fragments detected in sewage

The <u>NSW Sewage Surveillance Program</u> tests untreated sewage for fragments of the COVID-19 (SARSCoV- 2) virus at sewage treatment plant locations across NSW. The Barraba and Manilla Sewage Treatment Plants were tested on 1 November; COVID -!9 fragments were detected at both plants. Residents of Barraba and Manilla should monitor for symptoms; if you have even the mildest of symptoms (even if it appears to be a cold), get tested and self-isolate immediately.

Think twice about asbestos – it affects 1 in 3 homes nationwide.

Household Asbestos Testing Kits are available to help residents identify asbestos-containing material and assist with safe management or removal.

Asbestos is still present in millions of homes, as well as public and commercial buildings, across Australia. In homes built before 1990, asbestos can be found under vinyl floor coverings, behind kitchen splashbacks and bathroom tiles, in wall sheeting, corrugated asbestos-cement roofing, eaves, fences and more.

Northern Inland Regional Waste (NIRW) aims to provide residents across the New England North West region, an opportunity to access free Household Asbestos Testing Kits. NIRW aims to help prevent asbestos-related diseases and ensure correct disposal of asbestos-containing materials in the region.

NIRW's Asbestos Management program also supports this year's *National Asbestos Awareness Week* (22-28 November) campaign that asks Australians to *Think Twice About Asbestos*. The campaign challenges complacency by reminding home renovators and tradespeople that the danger of asbestos is far from over.

"For anyone who thinks asbestos-related diseases are a thing of the past, think again. Every year in Australia there are an estimated 4,000 deaths from exposure to asbestos." said Project Officer, Karen Weller, Northern Inland Regional Waste. DIY home renovators and tradespeople are most at risk and are reminded of the dangers of damaged, disturbed or deteriorated asbestos. By preventing exposure to asbestos fibres asbestos-related diseases can be eliminated.

"With more Australians having time for DIY renovations and maintenance during the COVID-19 pandemic, we need to remind people how to be safe around asbestos. Understanding what the dangers are, can ensure residents keep themselves and their families safe." Ms Weller said.

People working on homes built before 1990 can stay safe if they know where asbestos is, if they don't disturb or damage it, and if they seek professional help to locate and manage or remove it.

NIRW have provided 12 local Councils in the region a strictly limited number of Household Asbestos Testing Kits to distribute to residents for free. These kits are used to assist with identification of potentially asbestos-containing material in the home, to ensure safe management or removal.

History Notes



History Notes

A quiet week on the historical this week – no new enquiries to send everyone off to the books and computers. Next week is meeting week as usual and we welcome all members and intending members.

This week I want to make mention of one of our past members who, in the short few years he lived in the district, did a great deal for Barraba. As we all know Russ Watts spent a lot of time organizing the bird routes for the Barraba district and he has recently been honoured for his and Jenny's hard work travelling around finding the best places to view our birds.

While researching the local birds, Russ walked around the village of Woods Reef, and became very interested in its history. He persuaded the society to honour the history by numbering the various places such as the Reading home, the school, the bridge, the butcher shop etc. Russ enlisted the help of several people, members and other interested people and the signs were duly erected and an Opening Day organized – it was then that we found out that there was a 'Walk For Life' also organized for the weekend!! Both events had been notified state wide by then, so we just had to go ahead. We had a small crowd walking around some of the signs and then a most enjoyable picnic lunch in the church grounds with inevitable stories of life in Woods Reef. Thankyou Russ.

Another of Russ's interests was the railway and the idea of making a small park up on the railway line, in line with the main street. He rescued some of the unique telephone posts which followed the line from Tamworth and had several good ideas to make the park a nice place for tourists to visit and take in Queen Street from the southern end.

Once again Russ and the society ran into trouble, this time with government departments. Tests for asbestos had to be taken throughout the railway area – there were twenty two sites and two tested positive for asbestos up on the western end. The site for the lookout up Queen Street had to be abandoned.

Not to be out done the posts and one of the old railway gates were erected just off the railway land as a mark of respect to our World War 1 veterans who left Barraba by train in 1914-18. Unfortunately, the gate urgently needs a new coat of paint and members are aware of this.

There is a remembrance page in the museum which everyone can read as Russ did a great deal for Barraba and I am sure I have missed some things. He did find a rare plant out near the asbestos mine which he fenced in and of course he was responsible for the sign near the Tarpoly railway bridge. Before closing I must mention Maurice Potter who was Russ's right hand man in most of the projects.

Additional support for Australian men battling prostate cancer

From November, Australian men with prostate cancer will have access to a new medication at an affordable price, thanks to the Morrison Joyce Government.

Deputy Prime Minister and Member for New England, Barnaby Joyce said the announcement was a further sign that the Government's commitment to ensuring Australians can access affordable medicines, when they need them, remains rock solid.

"Prostate cancer is the second most common cancer diagnosed in men in Australia and the third most common cause of cancer death," Mr Joyce said.

"One in six men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer by the age of 85. It is more common in older men, with more than 63 per cent of cases diagnosed in men over 65 years of age."

"From November 1, as we mark the Movember, Nubega® start of (darolutamide) will be listed on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) for the first time for patients with non-metastatic castration resistant carcinoma of the prostate." "Without PBS subsidy, around 1,000 patients may pay more than \$40,000 per year for treatment. Instead, they will pay a maximum of \$41.30 per script or \$6.60 with a concession card."

Minister for Health and Aged Care Greg Hunt, echoed the Deputy Prime Minister, saying medication, alongside early detection can save lives and protect lives. "It is estimated that around 18,000 new cases of prostate cancer will be diagnosed in Australia this year alone," Minister Hunt said.

RECREATIONAL FISHING GRANTS NOW AVAILABLE



Member for Northern Tablelands and Minister for Agriculture Adam Marshall has today urged the region's passionate fishers to 'cast' their applications for the latest round of Recreational Fishing Trust grants, in the hope of landing funding for projects to promote fishing across the region's waterways. "Just like catching an elusive Copeton Dam Murray Cod, applying for a Recreational Fishing Trust grants does require work, but when it's hooked it's worth it," Mr Marshall said.

"The grants cover projects for enhancing recreational fishing, new facilities and access to local spots to wet a line, education including fishing workshops, as well as essential recreational research. I expect with COVID-19 restrictions relaxing we will see hundreds of keen anglers out on local dams or walking local rivers and streams, and so what better time to be improving access and facilities than now." Mr Marshall encouraged fishers to get their applications in to the NSW Department of Primary Industries before Friday, 3 December 2021.

"Every year, anglers pay their licence fees which are then reinvested back into projects like this, so if you've got an idea, please get it in as soon as possible," he said. Grants are available for both large projects valued at more than \$10,000 in funding and small projects involving less than \$10,000. Joint saltwater and freshwater projects are also encouraged. RECORD FUNDING BOOST TO SUPPORT STATE'S WAR ON WEEDS

Minister for Agriculture and Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall last week announced a record \$24.2 million funding boost for the war on weeds, which will see cutting-edge technologies, including environmental DNA (eDNA) testing, used by farmers to manage the state's worst weeds. Mr Marshall said the investment would modernise the state's biosecurity systems and give farmers, local councils and weeds authority's the resources they needed to stop weed infestations in their tracks.

"Between 2015 and 2020, a \$166 million investment helped the NSW Government, councils, communities, farmers and other land managers successfully target weeds. "High risk weeds such as parthenium and tropical soda apple continue to put pressure on agriculture, with established weeds such as African lovegrass and serrated tussock being targeted through our weed management programs," Mr Marshall said. "We will increase awareness, management and surveillance, largely through face-to-face support from local councils who provide farmers and other land managers with expert advice, weed identification and management options during property visits."

The new priority projects and NSW Weeds Action Program are key initiatives for the NSW Government's NSW Invasive Species Plan, which aims to reduce the devastating impacts of weeds on agricultural production and the environment.
