Letter to the Editor

Barraba has a secure water supply and still we endure restrictions. Manilla also has a secure water supply.

This could be at RISK!

A "Draft Regional Water Strategy" has been completed by the NSW Government and the "Draft Review" is in its final stages. It states "in consultation with Communities and stakeholders" on the available options.

Once this Document (195 pages) is adopted – Any or all of the "options" can be undertaken including:

- A dam at the Horton River?
- A pipeline from the Namoi River at the "Blue Hole" (an aboriginal sacred site) above Manilla to Split Rock Dam with water then released to Keepit Dam.
- A pipeline from Keepit Dam to the Maules Creek Mines
- A pipeline from Keepit Dam to Tamworth for benefit of "Security, Prosperity and Development for the major centres."

This compromises our water security with half our allocation not being made available to us.

Our SRD water allocation per year is 365 mega litres.

Our usage per year is 156 mega litres.

What could happen with the remaining 209 mega litres? Will it be "on sold" to industries or taken for Tamworth Development?

Tamworth Regional Council holds the licence for our SRD water allocation.

There is confusion and frustration on the lack of true consultation and transparency by Water NSW and Tamworth Regional Council.

A Community awareness meeting is being held at Manilla RSL on Thursday 18th November at 7pm.

Kevin Anderson will be in attendance so this is Barraba and Manilla's opportunity to state how they would like their water to be allocated going forward into the future.



Year 12 HSC Exams commenced this week on Tuesday 9 November with English being the first exam. Our 6 HSC students were eager to complete their first exam although some were a little nervous. We know you have prepared well despite the obstacles and we wish you all the best with your exams over the next 4 weeks. Stay committed, stay focused and please continue to seek support and assistance from secondary staff during the examination period.



Years 3-9 students participated in a reading and numeracy Check-in assessment last week. The Check-in assessment is a NSW Department of Education online reading and numeracy assessment available to support schools to assess and monitor student learning. The assessments can supplement existing school practices to identify how students are performing and to help teachers tailor their teaching more specifically to student needs.

In week 7 students from years 3, 5, 7 & 9 will be completing the school readiness test (SRT) in preparation for NAPLAN Online in 2022. SRT is an opportunity for schools to set up and run simulated tests to become familiar with the online assessment platform and reflect on areas that may need to be addressed ahead of moving online. SRT is not an assessment of student ability. Student test attempts will not be marked and results will not be available. If you have any questions about SRT please contact Mrs Middlemiss for Primary students and Mrs Bell for Secondary students.

Early starters transition Program commenced on Friday 29 October 2021 and will run every Friday till week 9 (3 November) from 9am to 2:50pm. The aim of the program is to help children adjust to new surroundings and to become familiar with Secondary routines. New Kindergarten students will receive a complimentary school shirt and hat at time of enrolment at BCS.

Year 6 to 7 transition has allowed students the opportunity to attend an afternoon session every Wednesday from week 4-8. Students attend a one-hour session each week from 2-3pm, experiencing different taster lessons in a variety of subject areas with Secondary teachers. Year 6 will join Secondary students for sport each Friday afternoon starting from week 7. If you would like to further discuss your child's transition to Secondary please contact the school.

Peter Whitten (Rusted Tin - Contemporary Aboriginal Artist) and Owen Craigie (Ex NRL Player, Grand Final winner from Newcastle Knights) visited BCS on Friday 5 November 2021 to meet with secondary students to discuss a plan for the mural at the Secondary and Primary sites. The morning was spent delivering a talk about mental health, wellbeing, health, fitness, Aboriginal culture and playing the didgeridoo. Secondary students celebrated the event with a BBQ lunch. This was a wonderful opportunity for all students to be immersed in aboriginal culture, art, and education. Indigenous murals are wonderful ways to visibly celebrate Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander (ATSI) culture in our school. Having a mural in our school provides an opportunity for students to be exposed on a daily basis to ATSI art styles; it can also be a great platform on which to introduce our students to both past and contemporary indigenous art. In a broader sense, it can help create a learning environment which champions cultural pride, it can help to deepen awareness and appreciation of indigenous culture. Peter and Owen will return to BCS on Thursday and Friday of week 6 to work with students to start the mural and participate in fitness workshops.



High Def photos help secure power reliability

Essential Energy will soon take to the skies above Barraba, Tamworth, Quirindi and surrounding areas, using specialist high-definition equipment attached to a helicopter to undertake a further assessment on the condition of the electricity network in the aftermath of the devastating fires of late 2019 and early 2020.

Higher quality capture using an autonomous image capture sensor means more images can be taken along a more direct and higher flightpath than in previous years. Previously the helicopter had to fly low and frequently over some powerlines to get the same quality.

Operations Manager Northern Tablelands, Mark Summers, said "The newer technology will not only mean a faster delivery of the images but also lessen the impact on people and livestock in the flight path.

These flights are a crucial part of our broader program to understand the condition of the network so we can identify and repair damaged or deteriorating network assets according to the risk they present."

Our overall Bushfire Risk Management Plan involves this helicopter-led data capture, other aerial inspections, drone and ground-based asset inspections combined with our network analysis, to understand and manage risk to ensure the safety and reliability of the network," Mark said.

If the inspections identify an issue with the Essential Energy network, the network will be repaired according to the risk to network reliability and community safety. Follow Essential Energy on Facebook and Twitter for updates on aerial patrols or

Council meeting update

Here is an overview of outcomes

Tamworth Regional Council Ordinary Meeting on Tuesday 9

November, 2021

- Council's financial reports for the year to June 30, 2021 were presented to councillors tonight. The auditor's report shows that the COVID-19 pandemic resulted in a \$2.3 million decrease in revenue due to significantly reduced airport fees and charges as well as reduced events income due to the unavoidable cancellation of the 2020 Tamworth Country Music Festival and other events.
- The schedule for Council meetings in 2022 was endorsed tonight including two meetings in January. Tamworth Regional Council does not usually meet in January, however the change is necessary due to the 2021 Local Government Elections being on December 4. The first January meeting on Wednesday January 5 is for the election of a Mayor and Deputy Mayor. The meeting schedule is published on Council's website.
- > Ten community representatives have been formally appointed to the Disability Access Working Group for a two-year term. They are Judy Coates, Isla Farr, Amanda Fisher, Fiona Hemmings, Danielle Northey, Ilonka Patkos, Catherine Rae, Geoffrey Talbot Sanderson, Dina Santos and Luke Wakely. The purpose of the group is to guide, monitor and evaluate the development and implementation of the Disability Inclusion Action Plan. History Potes

There is not a lot happening with the society at present but we are hoping to have a Christmas Market in December. We just hope that there are not too many restrictions to contend with! There should be more information after this week's meeting.

Although life seems quiet the research goes on and someone has handed me a piece, originally from Trove, recording a trip from Tamworth to Bingara in the early days of coach travel to this area.

The journey begins at 3am and it seems the route follows near the present day although skirting around hills. Mr Burdekin's run near Attunga is mentioned – he is a relative of the Barraba family.

The old hotel, on the northern side of the river in Manilla, is mentioned as a spot for some breakfast before continuing on to Barraba. The writer was obviously not very taken with our town describing it as an apology for a town. In 1873 there was McKid's shop, two hotels, a post office and a few houses. Apparently Mrs Cameron and her daughter served them a nice lunch.

The trip then moved on to Cobbadah, safely crossing Sheep Station Creek before delivering the mail to Bridger's Hotel and heading north across Cobbadah Creek and on to Oakey Creek where the "mail stables" were – there is still a house there and also the grave of James Pike, who died there when his wagon crushed him while he slept under it in the wet weather.

The writer also mentions, Mr Capel and his lost shepherd. The poor man and his sheep were found unharmed

after 24 hours. Piedmont Woolshed, the home of John Capel and his family, was only a short distance from the Mail Stables.

The coach continued on to Bingara down the Devil's Pinch and into Bingara. This story reminds me of a letter by my great, great, grandmother when she travelled up to Barraba Station from the Hunter Valley 15 years before there was a coach from Tamworth to Warialda and indeed nothing 'permanent' north of the Hunter Valley. This was a big journey for a young lady in those days.

Hopefully I will find Jane's letter before next week and share it with you.

JOEY'S NEWS


The big events at Joey's last week were the performances of "Charlie and the Chocolate Factory" by the students of Year 5/6. The class has been working on the performance for some time starting

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HOME TOWN BOY

Graeme Stanley Barwick

Cradled in the Nandewar's Where the Manilla River wends Below the steep Bell's Mountain And the winding road descends.
