A Mural in the Mall

The Public Art Committee is delighted to announce that another artwork is about to find its way onto the walls of our town adding to the emerging art trail. The Public Art Committee have secured the incredible talent of Scott Nagy and Janne Birkner to bring to life the north-facing wall in the mall area in Queen Street. Situated beside the current library and council offices, this piece of artwork will add to the list of reasons for visitors to stop and spend a while exploring our community and our businesses.

Sydney based artists, Scott and Janne visited Barraba in June 2021 to meet with community members, investigate the space, explore the area and source inspiration for their concept.

"After looking at the space and discovering the wall is on the side of the much-loved library we were inspired to paint a narrative of somebody reading and their imagination spilling into the room they are sitting in. We like to paint colourful and dreamy narratives themed around the local flora and fauna of an area, so we've put lots of local animals into the design. Notably the Regent Honey-eater which we think is a beautiful bird and also critically endangered. The mural will be warm and cosy, especially tucked into the square where the wall is situated", commented Scott.



Committee members are thrilled with the concept put forward, which will show great respect to the history and showcase the importance that our library, and all the wonderful staff who have been part of it, have played in our town.

Committee member Karen said "So many of our community have their own personal stories of experiences in the library, opening up a world of imagination well before we could explore the world as we do now (pre-internet and pre-covid of course). From receiving our very first library card to the electronic nature of book borrowing, from library classes we enjoyed at school to the ever-evolving role that libraries play in our world becoming a place embracing technology without losing the essence of being information providers in so many forms. The Barraba Library is well and truly a community space and the Committee are confident that this latest piece of artwork will pay homage to that."

FLOOD RECOVERY GRANTS TO DELIVER CRUCIAL SUPPORT FOR NEW ENGLAND SMALL BUSINESSES AND NOT-FOR-PROFITS

Small businesses and not-for-profits can now apply for grants of up to \$50,000 to help them recover from recent severe storm and flooding events in the New England regions of NSW.

These grants are now available in 59 local government areas and is being jointly funded by the Commonwealth and New South Wales governments under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA).

The Storm & Flood Small Business Disaster Recovery Grant is designed to help pay for costs of clean-up and reinstatement of a small business or not-for-profit organisation's operations who suffered direct physical damage as a result of the NSW storms and floods during November and December 2021.

Deputy Prime Minister and Member for New England, Barnaby Joyce, said it was vital to provide support to help small business get back to normal as quickly as possible.

"The Australian and NSW Governments are focused on giving small businesses and not-for-profits across the region the support they need to bounce back," the Deputy Prime Minister said.

The new grants of up to \$50,000 complement a raft of existing flood recovery supports including ongoing clean-up and targeted industry support.

Mr Joyce said the Australian and NSW Governments were standing by the people of the regions. "We will continue to support them for as long as it takes to bounce back." These grants are available in the fiftynine (59) local government areas including Gunnedah, Gwydir, Inverell, Narrabri, Tamworth.

Noelene Hyde PSM (outstanding public service to local government in NSW) received the Public Service Medal and **Brian McKenzie AFSM** (outstanding contribution to the NSW Rural Fire Service) is awarded the Australian Fire Service Medal.

Mr Joyce commended this year's Order of Australia recipients.

"To have eight people from the New England recognised in this capacity demonstrates our tremendous dedication to civic service," Mr Joyce said.

"It goes without saying this is a very distinguished honour to be given so I congratulate all award recipients and thank them for the contributions they have made and continue to make in local communities right around the region."

Council meeting update

Here is an overview of outcomes from the Ordinary Meeting **Tuesday 25** January, 2022

Councillors tonight supported a Notice of Motion from Deputy Mayor Mark Rodda asking for consideration to be given to reinstating the biennial bulky waste pick up service for residents. Councillors will now look at options for a new service at a workshop in the next month or so. It will include considering any fees and charges to be paid by the community if the service was to be reinstated along with how recycling opportunities could be maximised. The residents of Tamworth city and some of the smaller towns has a Bulky Household Waste Collection each July and November for a number of years. The service was discontinued last year.

Councillors agreed to extend Council's successful Water Saving Rebate Scheme for another five years. The scheme has run since February 2007 and has been highly effective in increasing the number of water saving products installed in homes and businesses. A report presented to Councillors revealed that since December 2019, Council has paid 22 types of commercial and household rebates for a total of almost 3000 products and services at a cost of \$251,648 and saving more than 13,238 kilolitres or five and a half (5.5) Olympic size swimming pools full of drinking water.

Councillors endorsed a report from Tamworth Regional Local Traffic Committee which included approval of a disability parking space at Westdale Public School. The location will be in the carpark on Gunnedah Road next to the pedestrian entry at the school.

There was an indication tonight about how close a start to work may be for the construction of the new section of Pipeline with the Dungowan Councillors considering a report about interface agreement. an Thev supported a recommendation for the General Manager to sign the Agreement on behalf of Council. The pipeline will be constructed between the Calala Water Treatment Plant and the connection point between the new Chaffey Dam pipeline and the old Pipeline near the Dungowan Dungowan Recreation Ground. Tamworth Region Mayor Russell Webb said the project is an important part of making our community's water supply more secure and it was pleasing to see work move closer to commencement. This work is part of the project to construct a new Dungowan Dam and pipeline being managed by Water Infrastructure NSW and funded jointly by the Australian and NSW Governments. The pipeline from Dungowan Village to the Calala Water Treatment Plan is stage one of the new pipeline and is expected to take 12-18 months to complete.

BUSINESSES REELING FROM CANCELLATIONS FIND SUPPORT The latest NSW Government COVID support package is welcome news for local businesses who have lost income following the postponement of the Tamworth Country Music Festival.

Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson said the \$1 billion package was welcome news to local businesses who have been suffering significant downturn at a time which should have seen long-awaited profits.

"The cancellation of our festival was devastating for local businesses, workers and artists who had spent the past 2 years waiting for the return of the festival," Mr Anderson said.

"Omicron has been tough for businesses here in Tamworth, particularly those is the hospitality industry which is why I it's great news that these support measures are now in place to help them get through this period and bounce back better than ever.

The Small Business Support Program helps businesses with annual turnover of between \$75,000 and \$50 million with a decline in turnover of at least 40 per cent.

Critically, this allows our small businesses to survive through to the revised dates where they can expect a boost in trade.

We're all gearing up for a big festival in April and this support package will give local businesses the confidence to order stock, maintain staffing levels and ensure they are ready for an influx of visitors and new business."

In addition, the existing Small Business Fees, Charges and RAT Rebate will be increased by 50% from the current \$2,000 limit to \$3,000 and employing businesses will be able to use the rebate to obtain RATs.

This will support worker availability by helping reduce costs to small businesses and enabling healthy staff who have been exposed to COVID-19, but test negative, to return to work. For more information please visit

History Notes

To begin with I must acknowledge all the hard work that Jenny has put into the running of the society's markets and congratulations on the Australia Day win. Unfortunately, society members were rather scarce at the function due partly to the virus and the lateness of boosters and not a lot of publicity. Congratulations also to the Lions Club – they do a great job keeping Barraba running.

This week was rather quiet re history queries apart from trying to trace the aboriginal families. Hopefully there will be more information for those trying to trace their ancestry in the coming years. Sometime back it was suggested that attention should be given to some of our noted townsmen who gave so generously with their time and money to help Barraba prosper in the early years of last century.

Dean & Smith bought the Excell & Malcolm store in Barraba in 1900 and in doing so brought two families to live in Barraba for the rest of their lives.

As far as I can ascertain they were not related but their wives were sisters – daughters of Joseph Scholes and his wife, Mary Ellen Jones. The Scholes family were well known in Armidale and had a large family including many daughters.

The fourth daughter, Sarah Scholes, married William Henry Dean and came to Barraba with their daughters circa 1900 to join James Charles Smith and his wife, Eva Scholes, and their family of sons.

Dean & Smith ran a very successful family business in Barraba for 37 years. They extended and rebuilt the building as well as the business and took part in a number of other town ventures. Last year we dealt with the Dean Room, now at the museum but a most useful classroom at the school with thanks to Mr Dean.

After settling into business in Barraba for about ten years several local businessmen formed a company and purchased property in far North Queensland and put it under a manager. The company sold that property and bought another to improve then when that was done sold out.

The proceeds were then used by the partners to build new homes in Barraba. The Dean home was built on the corner of Fitzroy and Savoy Street and the Smith home was built on a block to the west with river views and also facing Savoy Street. Several other partners also built new homes around the same time.

William Dean died in 1935 leaving James Smith to run the store. Early in 1937, several directors from Mackenzie's visited Barraba to open or purchase an outlet to sell farm machinery. On the 1st November, 1937, they purchased the Dean and Smith business and that allowed James Smith to retire. He died ten years alfer in 1947 at the age of 73 years.

Why the volcanic eruption in Tonga was so violent, and what to expect next

The Kingdom of Tonga doesn't often attract global attention, but a violent eruption of an underwater volcano on January 15 has spread shock waves, quite literally, around half the world.

The volcano is usually not much to look at. It consists of two small uninhabited islands, Hunga-Ha'apai and Hunga-Tonga, poking about 100m above sea level 65km north of Tonga's capital Nuku'alofa. But hiding below the waves is a massive volcano, around 1800m high and 20km wide.





The Hunga-Tonga-Hunga-Ha'apai volcano has erupted regularly over the past few decades. During events in 2009 and 2014/15 hot jets of magma and steam exploded through the waves. But these eruptions were small, dwarfed in scale by the January 2022 events.

Our research into these earlier eruptions suggests this is one of the massive explosions the volcano is capable of producing roughly every thousand years.

Why are the volcano's eruptions so highly explosive, given that sea water should cool the magma down?

If magma rises into sea water slowly, even at temperatures of about 1200°C, a thin film of steam forms between the magma

and water. This provides a layer of insulation to allow the outer surface of the magma to cool.

But this process doesn't work when magma is blasted out of the ground full of volcanic gas. When magma enters the water rapidly, any steam layers are quickly disrupted, bringing hot magma in direct contact with cold water.

Volcano researchers call this "fuel-coolant interaction" and it is akin to weapons-grade chemical explosions. Extremely violent blasts tear the magma apart. A chain reaction begins, with new magma fragments exposing fresh hot interior surfaces to water, and the explosions repeat, ultimately jetting out volcanic particles and causing blasts with supersonic speeds.

Two scales of Hunga eruptions

The 2014/15 eruption created a volcanic cone, joining the two old Hunga islands to create a combined island about 5km long. We visited in 2016, and discovered these historical eruptions were merely curtain raisers to the main event.

Mapping the sea floor, we discovered a hidden "caldera" 150m below the waves.

The caldera is a crater-like depression around 5km across. Small eruptions (such as in 2009 and 2014/15) occur mainly at the edge of the caldera, but very big ones come from the caldera itself. These big eruptions are so large the top of the erupting magma collapses inward, deepening the caldera.

Looking at the chemistry of past eruptions, we now think the small eruptions represent the magma system slowly recharging itself to prepare for a big event. We found evidence of two huge past eruptions from the Hunga caldera in deposits on the old islands. We matched these chemically to volcanic ash deposits on the largest inhabited island of Tongatapu, 65km away, and then used radiocarbon dates to show that big caldera eruptions occur about every 1000 years, with the last one at AD1100.

With this knowledge, the eruption on January 15 seems to be right on schedule for a "big one".

What we can expect to happen now?

We're still in the middle of this major eruptive sequence and many aspects remain unclear, partly because the island is currently obscured by ash clouds.

The two earlier eruptions on December 20 2021 and January 13 2022 were of moderate size. They produced clouds of up to 17km elevation and added new land to the 2014/15 combined island.

The latest eruption has stepped up the scale in terms of violence. The ash plume is already about 20km high. Most remarkably, it spread out almost concentrically over a distance of about 130km from the volcano, creating a plume with a 260km diameter, before it was distorted by the wind.

This demonstrates a huge explosive power – one that cannot be explained by magma-water interaction alone. It shows instead that large amounts of fresh, gas-charged magma have erupted from the caldera.

The eruption also produced a tsunami throughout Tonga and neighbouring Fiji and Samoa. Shock waves traversed many thousands of kilometres, were seen from space, and recorded in New Zealand some 2000km away. Soon after the eruption started, the sky was blocked out on Tongatapu, with ash beginning to fall.

All these signs suggest the large Hunga caldera has awoken. Tsunami are generated by coupled atmospheric and ocean shock waves during an explosion, but they are also readily caused by submarine landslides and caldera collapses.

It remains unclear if this is the climax of the eruption. It represents a major magma pressure release, which may settle the system.

A warning, however, lies in geological deposits from the volcano's previous eruptions. These complex sequences show each of the 1000-year major caldera eruption episodes involved many separate explosion events.

Hence, we could be in for several weeks or even years of major volcanic unrest from the Hunga-Tonga-Hunga-Ha'apai volcano. For the sake of the people of Tonga I hope not.



Cottage Pie

Cottage Pie is perfect for a windy, Winter's day. It takes a little time to bring it all together but the smiles

around your family dinner table will be worth it. Comfort food at its best! Did you know Cottage Pie has beef and Shepherd's Pie is made with lamb?

Ingredients:

- 500g Grass Fed Beef Mince
- 1 onion, diced
- 2 medium carrots or 1 large one, diced
- 1 stick celery, diced
- 3 cloves, garlic, mince
- 1 1/2 cups peas
- 2 cups stock or water
- 2 tablespoons plain flour
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- 1 tsp dried rosemary
- 1/2 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tablespoon tomato paste
- 1 tsp sea salt
- 1tsp cracked pepper
- 1kg potatoes
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- Butter for mash
- Milk for mash

Method:

- Fry the diced vegetables (onion, carrot, celery) over medium heat for 3 mins or until slightly softened.
- Add beef mince, garlic, tomato paste and spices, fry until meat has broken down.
- Add 1 1/2 tablespoons flour and cook for a further 1 min. Reserve some flour in case further thickening is required.
- Add stock or water and peas and stir until gravy thickens. Add more flour if required.
- When mince is brown and gravy thickened, add your meat & vegie mixture to the bottom of your baking pan, large pie dish or cast iron pan.
- Boil potatoes until soft, drain, mash with butter and milk and fold through cheese.
- Layer the potato on top of the mince and vegetable mix and use a fork to roughen the surface to aid browning.
- Bake at 180c until the top has browned a little.
- Remove from the oven and allow to stand for 15 mins before serving for best result or just dig in.
