The clubhouse is used for so much more than rugby, hosting athletics days, junior rugby, sponsorship evenings and events like the drought relief event held in early 2020.



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## History Notes

This time of year seems to be "tracing family history time". There have been several

requests, some for large families, but unfortunately some return home and then make a request. Hopefully we will see them in the spring.

As I write these notes it is unlikely there will be markets next weekend as everyone seems to be busy with school holidays – we have only 2 stall holders ready to go at this stage which is hardly enough. Be prepared to have a really good market in August on the Saturday before Ag-Quip – in nice spring weather.

Last week's notes on the Cobbadah School created a renewed interest in country schools so I thought perhaps another countryside topic could be of interest.

Plenty of older Barraba residents will remember the names of paddocks and localities which have now largely disappeared. Our country was first settled into four or five big properties and then the smaller settlers selected land to grow enough food for their large families.

The next generation were able to purchase the smaller holdings and make money off the land. The paddocks in these holdings were larger and often held the name of the early settler – Perry's, Cameron's, Duncombe's for example and some paddocks carried their original name before they became part of a bigger holding, Milldam is an example. The Brickiln, where the clay for Barraba's early bricks came from, was part of Barraba Station. Perhaps some of our readers can come up with some more such names such as the School Paddock south of Barraba.

The two requests for family history last Friday – Jones and Carter – have included a few other families along the way. One of these is Duncombe family. Lewis Duncombe was born in NSW and his wife, Vasthi, was born in New Zealand, although she was not registered in either country.

Vashti's parents had come originally from England about 1840, they lived in Sydney for a couple of years, then went to New Zealand and later returned to New South Wales – can you imagine the difficulty in sorting out this Smith family!

Eventually Lewis Winter Duncombe caught up with Vashti Smith and they married in Mr Lanagan's house on Gineroi Station which is north of Bingara. The young couple had eleven children born in half a dozen places and we have marriages for ten of them including the Charles Jones marriage to Selina in 1885. Sometimes these requests take quite a lot of work to sort out!!

## Letter to the Editor

Mrs Bronwyn Clinch Barraba Community News

Dear Bronwyn,

Loved to read the reference to Blackfriars Correspondence School in this week's History Notes. I also heard the discussion on ABC late night program.

I was schooled from 1944 to 1951, when we lived on a large sheep station in the Jerilderie district. In a way, home schooling was a lottery. Your whole education depended on the dedication of your mother. There were families where the children ran wild and never learned to read or write. Alan and I were so fortunate to have a wonderful teacher in our mum, who also cooked for men, who worked on the property, kept the garden watered, washed by hand – no electricity, only a 32 volt lighting plant for electric lights, which came later ( after years of Tilley lamps and kerosene fridges). She had a never ending battle with red dust from a countryside competing with 10,000 sheep and rabbits, for every blade of grass.

Blackfriars was near Broadway, I can't believe I cannot remember the address! On a visit to Sydney mum took me there to meet my teacher, Miss Irma G Herbert, who used to put lovely encouraging messages each week and once composed a very funny poem, in response to my apology for the family cat's footprint on my work page.

As you will gather, the reference to Blackfriars has woken many memories! On the same visit mum also took me to the ABC studios to meet the presenters of the Children's Session, Mac, Joe, Elizabeth and Dan, who were so friendly and kind to a very shy girl from Jerilderie in 1947.



#### **CENTRAL HOTEL BARRABA (now the Playhouse Hotel)**



The Barraba to Bingara Motor Coach ready to leave outside the beautiful old Central Hotel Barraba.

This must have been after 1908 as this coach took passengers off the train on to Bingara I believe. A truly classic image of our history. The vehicle had solid rubber tyres and huge drum brakes on the rear wheels only. It must have been pretty hair-raising going down the Devil's Elbow up Bingara way. Perhaps the passengers got out and walked down. Rear wheel only brakes are not particularly efficient. The vehicle must have had a pretty big motor also to shift all that weight properly over the two mountain ranges between here and Bingara. The ride

had to have been pretty rough but a lot better than the previous cramped stage-coaches. There are 14 people on or against this coach, mostly in waistcoats looking like they are going to a gangster convention in Bingara. There are other copies of this image I believe but my everlasting thanks to the late Ted King for allowing me to copy this.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL PICNIC




The Methodist Sunday School Picnic circa 1908.

### Here is an overview of outcomes from Tamworth Regional Council Ordinary Meeting on Tuesday 28<sup>th</sup> June 2022:

Councillors adopted the 2022/23 Annual Operational Plan which sets out the service delivery, projects and works council will carry out in the coming year along with the schedule of rates, fees and charges. Tamworth Regional Council will spend a total of \$276 million across its general, water and sewerage funds in 2022/23 while collecting \$79.4 million in income from rates and annual charges and delivering a \$128.4 million capital works program to improve local facilities and infrastructure. The overall income from Ordinary Rates will increase by 2 per cent in 2022/23 including the Additional Special Variation of 1.3 per cent approved by the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal.

А revised draft Smoke-Free Environmental Policy will go on public exhibition in the coming weeks to seek community feedback about a proposed one-block extension of the smoke-free zone in Tamworth's CBD and the addition of new smoke-free zones in Kootingal and Nundle. Councillors also endorsed the provision of a recurrent annual \$5,000 budget to fund ongoing promotion and maintenance of Smoke-Free signage and advertising.

Waste facilities at Niangala and Watsons Creek will be converted to small vehicle waste transfer stations and be staffed when they are open.

Three of the region's smaller communities will share in the

benefits of funding through the 2021/22 Facility Improvement Fund. Councillors supported а recommendation to allocate \$10,000 to the Limbri Public Hall and **Recreation Reserve Local Committee** to cover the cost of adding a unisex and disabled access flushing toilet, \$1,996 to Weabonga Hall and **Recreation Reserve Local Committee** to cover the cost of a storage shed and \$4,105 to Woolbrook Hall and Park Committee to buy and install a barbecue in the park.

# **Rugby Union**

The Barraba Rugby Club has been successful in gaining a substantial grant under the NSW

Government's Stronger Country Communities Fund which was pushed by Kevin Anderson after much time and effort by Brianna Mack as the Club Secretary to fill in the requirements for these grants. As anyone who has to fill them in knows it is very time consuming and technical.

The grant is \$678073 and a presentation was made to Club President, Simon Koopman, at the Barraba Show in May. This grant will allow the Club to erect 2 women's changerooms, a room for the referees, a store room and a rumpus room for the younger brigade. A starting date has not been decided upon at this time, but at the conclusion of this year's competition would be suitable for the builders.

As the ground is used by the rugby and the school for the boys under 16s, girls under 14s and the big junior carnival each year which is one of the largest in the north of the state. Schools use the grounds for sports carnivals, cross country runs, while cricket in summer season for seniors and juniors when the parents are found to run the games. When Touch Football was in full swing, games were played under lights as well as some rugby matches as the ground is well lit up. Some functions are held in the Clubhouse when organisations or families wish to hire the facilities for a specific reason.

A mistake in last week's game score against Narrabri reported as 24-7 should have been 24-17, or after a late try by Barraba/Gwydir would have ended in a drawn game. Reports of a hard tussle for a result saw a big improvement in the local team after a 46-0 loss in round one of the comp. Ladies Day on Saturday started with a flop as the Gunnedah girls failed to turn up for the game, but the ladies who showed up for the day seemed to have a good time.

Gunnedah turned up for the men's game and were behind early after a Rafter penalty 3 minutes into the game. It was the only time the locals were in front on the day, as Gunnedah attacked with forwards and backs charging up the field to add 2 converted tries for a 3-14 score. Barraba were having troubles with their lineouts but with some good runs from Mellor, Zac Mallise and Will Robinson got close enough to the line for Sweeney to charge over and Rafter to convert to 10-14. Just before half-time Gunnedah had a penalty shot which hit the posts and failure to gather the ball saw Gunnedah score beside the posts for a further try 10-19 at the break.

The second half saw Gunnedah score early and convert for a 26-10 lead. Barraba replied shortly after with a try to Will Robinson which was converted by Rafter for 17-26. Rafter

was sin-binned for 10 minutes shortly after. Barraba were having trouble at the back of the scrums and rucks with Preston being caught on a number of occasions failing to get the ball away quickly. The service improved when Spencer was moved to the scrumbase, he now needs to turn up for training.

A try each to both teams saw the final score 22-33 to Gunnedah, but they knew they were in a game with Zac and Jack Mallise, Jack McCarthy and Will Robinson making some strong runs to gain metres. They put some starch in defence as well.

Gunnedah are on top of the 1<sup>st</sup> Grade and 3<sup>rd</sup> in Reserve Grade, so not a bad result Barraba are 5<sup>th</sup>.

# How to save \$50 off your food bill and still eat tasty, nutritious meals

Grocery prices have taken a hike upwards for a host of reasons, including the rising costs of petrol, fertiliser and labour. You could "shop around" for cheaper groceries, but that would cost you more in fuel or travel, not to mention time.



Research shows a healthy diet costs low-income households 20 to 30% of their disposable income. But a healthy diet remains cheaper than one dominated by highly processed foods and drinks. Cutting your grocery bill takes planning and flexibility – and knowing your budget.

#### So how do you do it?

Start by checking which vegetables and fruits are in season, and find recipes that include these. Swap some fresh veggies and fruit with canned and frozen varieties, and substitute very expensive items for cheaper alternatives. Have a meatfree meal at least once a week.

Next, create a grocery list. This helps save money by reducing in-store impulse buys. Look at what you already have in the pantry, fridge and freezer, and only buy what you need. This will reduce food waste. Check online catalogues for specials before heading to the shops. Once in store, compare prices and choose brands that are cheaper. This makes nutritious meals more affordable.

#### How much do households spend on groceries?

A 2021 survey found the average supermarket grocery bill was A\$98 per week for a single person, \$145 for two, \$168 for three, \$187 for four and \$255 for five or more people.

An older survey from 2016 found the average household (2.6 people) spent \$269 per week across all food (\$237) and alcohol (\$32) purchases, both at the supermarket and other outlets. About half the money was spent was on "discretionary" items such as meals out or fast food (\$80),

with \$20 spent on lollies, chocolate, savoury snacks and potato crisps, and \$10 on cakes, biscuits and puddings. At the supermarket, \$26 was spent a week on fruit and vegetables.

A 2019 survey found the average person spent \$300 a week for all food and drinks. This included groceries (\$135), eating out (\$52), alcohol (\$31), take-aways (\$22), barista coffee/tea (\$13), food delivery services (\$12), supplements (\$12) and health foods (\$11).

These surveys show it's common to spend more on foods and drinks consumed away from home than on groceries and more on unhealthy items than healthy ones.

#### What about saving \$50?

#### 5 tips to help you save

Putting all this together, here are five key tips to keep in mind when planning food for your household:

#### 1) Have a food budget

Total food budget dollars will be influenced by how many people you need to feed, their age and your household income. A rough rule of thumb is it shouldn't cost more than one-third of your total household disposable income. Allocate target amounts in your budget for both core, nutritious foods and discretionary foods and drinks (softdrinks, chips, biscuits, cakes, lollies, pies, pastries and deli meats) and on foods away from home (coffees, fast food, pubs, clubs, bottle shops and restaurants).

# 2) Make a weekly plan for breakfast, lunch, dinner and snacks

Write a matching grocery list. Check the pantry, fridge and freezer to see what you already have or whether any ingredients can be swapped to save a purchase.

#### 3) Pack your lunch

Buy a lunch box and pack it the night before. Put it in the fridge so you can grab and go in the morning. For ideas, see our \$5 make-at-home lunches. If your mornings are too busy, pack in breakfast foods too.

#### 4) Cook more meals at home

Cooking more meals at home might include cheaper and healthier versions of some of your take-out favourites such as pizza and burgers. A study from the United States found those who cooked more at home spent half the amount of money on food eaten away-from-home than those who cooked infrequently. They also spent 17% less on food overall. Interestingly, both groups spent the same on groceries suggesting that infrequent home cookers either wasted more food, ate more, or both.

#### 5) Cook double batches

Cook greater quantities of meals like curries, soups and casseroles, and either freeze them or have the same meal twice.
