# Stuart Peake Memorial Cancer Research Trust Donates to Garvan Institute of Medical Research

Nick & Kim Peake (of Bowen Stud Cattle) travelled to Sydney on Friday to Donate \$14000 Dollars on behalf of the Stuart Peake Memorial Cancer Research to the Garvan Institute of Medical Research. Since 2003 the trust has donated approximately \$54000 to cancer research.

Nick & Kim got to tour the Garvan Institute and the Kinghorn Cancer Centre organised by Melissa Chungue. Associate Professor Christine Chaffer gave them a tour of her labs and explained Research that is currently being undertaken at the Kinghorn Cancer Centre. One of the topics discussed was Cancer Cell Plasticity where their work focuses on the ability of cancer cells to change their physiological characteristics: cancer cell plasticity. This feature of cancer cells is central to their potential to create and spread tumours around the body, to resist current therapies, and to recur posttreatment. By establishing the mechanisms underlying cancer cell plasticity, we will enable the design of novel therapies that target advanced-stage cancers, and ultimately improve patient survival.

# BARRABA TIP OPENING HOURS REDUCED

In their meeting on 14 June 2022, Tamworth Councillors agreed to amend the opening hours schedule across all waste facilities. Changes include standardising the number of opening hours across facilities by size category, the optimisation of start and finish times to assist with staffing requirements, and ensuring that all facilities have at least one weekday and one weekend opening. This means for Barraba, the tip will now be closed on Thursdays, and not open on Sunday morning. The new hours are:

# Tax Changes that may affect you

### **DIESEL FUEL REBATE**

For farmers and others that use heavy vehicles on the road there have been changes to the amount that you can claim for diesel fuel used in farm vehicles and other vehicles for both on-road and off-road use.

These changes have been brought about by the reduction in the fuel excise of twenty two (22) cents per litre which was implemented to reduce the cost of fuel.

For the period  $30^{TH}$  MARCH 2022 TO 30 JUNE 2022 THE FOLLOWING RATES WILL APPLY:

For off-road use 22.1 cents per litre

For eligible on-road use the rate is Nil.

These rates will need to be used for the calculation of your fuel tax credit for the June 2022 quarter.

These rates have been reduced from 44.2 and 17.8 cents per litre respectively.

For anyone who reports and claims the fuel tax credit on a monthly basis these rates will apply for the month of July.

## SUPERANNUATION

As of the 1<sup>st</sup> July the amount of superannuation that you, as an employer, need to remit on behalf of your employees increases to 10.5%. (Previously 10.0%).

A further change is that superannuation at the rate of 10.5% will need to be remitted on all wages paid.

Previously employers were not required to remit superannuation where the wages paid were less than \$450.00 per month. This threshold has now been removed.

Note that any amount paid for wages will attract the 10.5% superannuation guarantee charge.

Hans taught at the University of New England in the early 1980s and was a tutor in Robb College. In 1984 he joined State Bank NSW and by 2001, Hans was chief economist at Colonial First State, one of Australia's largest fund and superannuation managers.

Hans retired from Colonial First State in 2008 but by 2009 his wife had encouraged him to 'get a job'! He was chief economist at St. George Bank for a few years before attempting to retire again. So far so good, but he still works casually in the finance sector.

Hans is married to Suzanne and they have three adult children. Hans attends Glenhaven Anglican church in Sydney and has been involved in mentoring refugees. He enjoys a good book and collects coins from time to time. He also supports South Sydney in the NRL - having married into that particular tribe!

# History Rotes

Another busy week with requests for help with family history. There has been a correction in family history over one hundred years ago but it turns out that the records are correct but the person concerned did not wish to use the correct name on official records! It all adds to the

interest in family history.

Does anyone know where Cohen's shop was in Barraba in the 1950's? The person making the enquiry says that it was an electrical shop and it was not here for very long. I am wondering if it had anything to do with the power lines being built throughout the district but that does not help with the position in the main street.

On Sunday we had a visit from a descendant of Bernard Hagan's who lived in Narrabri. This family included the McGovern family from the Horton Valley and we learnt a bit about the family as well as our visitors. They are now travelling through the Horton village to Rocky Creek and on to Narrabri.

Another request for information has come in this week for the Potter family. This fellow wants to come down when he returns from his holiday in Queensland so we have a bit of time to get ready – fortunately this is a family we already have on file so there will not need to be much research there, apart from one elusive ancestor who doesn't seem to have any parentage or date of birth. We know she married in 1863 and that she was buried in Barraba in 1909 with no age given. There were nine children in the family and most of them were born on Connor's Creek.

Actually, it was one of the Potter daughters worked at the Victoria Hotel when it was the Commercial Bank. One night in 1894 she saw a ghost roaming around the premises and she was so frightened that she left the next day. A few days after that, the fatal bank robbery took place.

There is plenty of interest in Maurie Conway's book and it looks like being a while before it comes together as new information keeps coming in both from the original author and those who are proof reading and adding pieces.



# THE CHEMIST SHOP AND SOME HISTORY OF COOTES PHARMACY IN BARRABA

This very old photo of Harry Blackall's Chemist shop on the southeastern corner of Queen & Alice St.

Harry was an old man by the 1940s and he had been the sole chemist in town for decades. The Mallam brothers, chemists in Armidale &

Inverell for some reason decided to open a business in competition to Harry and hired dad in the beginning of 1929 to run it. Dad had completed his apprenticeship and Sydney Uni by 1929 but had to wait until Oct when he turned 21 to be officially a registered chemist. Dad worked for Mallams in Inverell until then.

We kids always went into Harry's to weigh ourselves as his scales were free and dad's cost a penny. Harry also had a pair of marvellous Apothecary flagons 3 or 4 feet high on either side of the front door. One was full of blue water and the other of red. Of very thin glass they were already worth a fortune in the 40s and by the time Ken Stanton smashed them in the late 50s it was almost impossible to guess how much they were worth. We have all dad's Dispensary books and some days he did no prescriptions and on another day a solitary one. So, it was a real struggle to begin with. He bought the business from Mallams before it became successful. Harry Blackall's shop was later the town library, run by Aggie Anderson and the residence was owned by Pat Byrnes.

# Council's Heritage Assistance Fund applications now open

Applications are open for funding assistance to the maintenance and repairs of the region's historic buildings under Tamworth Regional Council's Heritage Assistance Fund. Tamworth Regional Council Heritage Working Group chair, Councillor Helen Tickle said there is \$50,000 available through the fund in the 2022-2023 year to owners of heritage buildings wishing to improve the physical appearance of their buildings. All grants provided are on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

"The Heritage Assistance Fund is a Council initiative to assist owners of historically significant properties to improvements to their make buildings. Funding covers works such as external paint, repairs and replacement of certain features like verandahs, roofs and fences, in residential and commercial buildings. I would like to especially encourage owners of properties in commercial precincts across our region to consider seeking funding this year." Applications will be assessed by Council's Heritage Working Group and successful applicants will be notified by mid-October 2022. Previous recipients include the Bendemeer Hotel for repairs and restoration of paint-work on the western side of the building and 'The Strand' on the corner of Peel and Fitzroy Streets for maintaining the heritage façade.

# Immersive multimedia installation *Walking through a Songline* opens in Tamworth

A dramatic digital experience based on a component of the National Museum of Australia's internationally acclaimed exhibition *Songlines: Tracking the Seven Sisters* will open at Tamworth Regional Gallery on 9 July – 28 August 2022.

It is an Aboriginal-led exhibition developed in 2017 which takes visitors on a journey along the epic Seven Sisters Dreaming tracks, through art, Indigenous voices, innovative multimedia and other immersive displays.

While the original *Songlines* exhibition tours Europe, including in Germany and France, a pop-up technical iteration is undertaking a national tour of Australia.

Margo Neale, Senior Indigenous Head of Indigenous Curator. Knowledges and advisor to the Director, at the National Museum, said "We need to remind all Australians, that although this story has ancient origins, it has critical contemporary relevance and uses contemporary technology as well as more conventional art forms. If you want to call yourself Australian and share this continent with us, you need to know your story about the creation of this continent and its history beyond 240 years," Adj. Professor Neale said.

Bridget Guthrie, Tamworth Regional Council Director Art Gallery and Museums said "It's free at the Tamworth Regional Gallery, this immersive digital exhibition will appeal to the whole family", she said. "Artwork from local First Nations artist Kaleb Waters will also be on display so participants can explore songlines from the Tamworth region."

Walking through a Songline will open at Tamworth Regional Gallery on Saturday 9 July 2022.

# Australia is heading for its third Omicron wave. Here's what to expect from BA.4 and BA.5

Adrian Esterman, Professor of Biostatistics and Epidemiology, University of South Australia

Australia is heading for its third Omicron wave in the coming weeks, as BA.4 and BA.5 become the dominant COVID strains.

BA.4 and BA.5 are more infectious than previous COVID variants and subvariants, and are better able to evade immunity from vaccines and previous infections. So we're likely to see a rise in case numbers.

So what are BA.4 and BA.5? And what can we expect in this next phase of the pandemic?

### How did it start? BA.1, BA.2 and BA.3

Omicron started off as three subvariants (that is, a group of viruses from the same parent virus), all appearing in late November 2021 in South Africa: BA.1, BA.2, and BA.3.

The three are genetically different enough that they could have had their own Greek names. But for some reason, this did not happen, and the World Health Organization designated them as subvariants of Omicron.

BA.1 rapidly took over from Delta in Australia in early January this year, forming a massive wave of cases, peaking at more than 100,000 a day.

However, BA.2 is even more transmissible than BA.1, and Australia saw a second wave of cases, this time caused by BA.2. This wave peaked in early April at more than 60,000 cases a day.

## When were BA.4 and BA.5 detected?

BA.4 was first detected in January 2022 in South Africa. BA.5 was also detected in South Africa, in February 2022.

Both appear to be offshoots of BA.2, sharing many identical mutations. They also have many additional mutations likely to impact transmission.

They are talked about together because mutations in their spike protein (the bit that latches on to human cells) are identical. (For brevity, I refer to them as BA.4/5.)

However, they do differ in some of the mutations on the body of the virus.

#### How transmissible are BA.4/5?

We measure how contagious a disease is by the basic reproduction number (R0). This is the average number of people an initial case infects in a population with no immunity (from vaccines or previous infection).

New mutations give the virus an advantage if they can increase transmissibility:

- the original Wuhan strain has an R0 of 3.3
- Delta has an R0 of 5.1
- Omicron BA.1 has an R0 of 9.5
- BA.2, which is the dominant subvariant in Australia at the moment, is 1.4 times more transmissible than BA.1, and so has an R0 of about 13.3
- a pre-print publication from South Africa suggests BA.4/5 has a growth advantage over BA.2 similar to the growth advantage of BA.2 over BA.1. That would give it an R0 of 18.6.

This is similar to measles, which was until now was our most infectious viral disease.

### How likely is reinfection?

BA.4/BA.5 appear to be masters at evading immunity. This increases the chance of reinfection.

Reinfection is defined as a new infection at least 12 weeks after the first. This gap is in place because many infected people still shed virus particles many weeks after recovery.

However, some unfortunate people get a new infection within the 12 weeks, and therefore are not counted.

Likely, there are now tens of thousands of Australians into their second or third infections, and this number will only get bigger with BA.4/5.

#### How high are case numbers likely to rise?

Around Australia, we are starting to see a third wave of cases because of BA.4/5.

The effective reproduction number, or Reff tells us, on average, how many people an infected person will pass it on to, given the immunity in the population. All Australian states and territories now have a Reff greater than 1, meaning that even with the current levels of immunity, we are seeing an exponential growth in case numbers. This will inevitably lead to an increase in hospitalisation and deaths. The second Omicron wave due to BA.2 was not as high as the first one caused by BA.1, probably because there were so many people infected with BA.1, that the ensuing immunity dampened the second wave down.

This third wave may not be as high as the second for the same reason.

### How severe is the disease from BA.4/5?

A recent pre-print publication (a publication that has so far not been peer-reviewed) from a Japanese research group found that in lab-based, cell-culture experiments, BA.4/5 was able to replicate more efficiently in the lungs than BA.2. In hamster experiments, it developed into more serious illness.

However, data from South Africa and the United Kingdom found that their BA.4/5 wave didn't see a major increase in severe disease and death.

This is possibly because of the high rates of immunity due to previous infections. Our high rates of vaccine-induced immunity might have a similar protective effect here.

#### Will BA.4/5 change long COVID?

At this stage, we do not know whether any of the Omicron subvariants differ in their ability to cause long COVID. However, we do know that full vaccination (three doses for most people) does provide some protection against long COVID.

#### How protective are our vaccines against BA.4/5?

Each new subvariant of Omicron has been better able to evade immunity from vaccination than its predecessor. Although current vaccines based on the Wuhan strain will still provide some protection against serious illness and death against BA.4/5, they are unlikely to provide much, if any, protection against infection or symptomatic disease.

#### What about new vaccines?

The good news is second-generation vaccines are in clinical trials. Moderna is trialling a vaccine containing mRNA against the original Wuhan strain and Omicron BA.1.

Early results are very promising, and likely to give much better protection against BA.4/5.

But this third Omicron wave – along with a very severe flu season – will likely see our hospitals struggling even more over the next few weeks.

If things get bad enough, state and territory governments might be forced to reintroduce face mask mandates in many settings – in my opinion, not such a bad thing.

# Old-fashioned Baked Rice Pudding



Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup of long grain rice
- 2 cups of milk
- 1 cup of water
- 1/2 tablespoon of butter
- 1/3 cup of sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon of nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon of salt
- 1/3 cup of raisins

# Directions:

Stir all ingredients (except raisins) together in a buttered 2 litre casserole. Bake in a slow oven (150C) for 1 hour without disturbing the rice.

Reduce temperature to 120C and continue baking for 1-1/2 hours more.

Add raisins 1/2 hour before removing from the oven. You can also sprinkle either cinnamon or more nutmeg over the top just before the pudding finishes baking.
