CRAIG FOSTER (FOZZY) NAMED AUSTRALIAN FATHER OF THE YEAR

Kicking Goals for Fathering this Father's Day



Australian sporting personality Craig Foster (Fozzy) was announced as the Australian Father of the Year honouring his role as a father, sporting figure, youth mentor, coach and a father figure to vulnerable refugees.

The awards held in Sydney at the TAG Foundation Grandstand, shone a light on the critical role of fathering in the lead-up to Father's Day by honouring "fathers" who have contributed to family, community and youth. Presented by The Fathering Project, a not-for-profit organisation focused on giving a child the best life possible through better fathering, the awards compered by Adam Liaw included a keynote address by Maggie Dent, well-known Australian parenting author. educator and podcaster who has worked for over 40 years in schools and communities, and commentary by Maurice Newman AC, chair of the Australian Father's Day Council.

Award recipient Craig Foster (Fozzy) said, "As our First Nations say, taking care of a child is 'everyone's business' and together we all impact children and youth around us across all cultural or other boundaries through the power of our words and actions. Male role models, whether fathers, teachers, sport coaches or mentors have a deep responsibility to care for

and protect young people over who they exert such power. Together we can raise respectful males, young Australians who reject racism and love our cultural diversity, and young women capable of smashing gender barriers.

Parenting presents a vast number of challenges for all of us, and The Fathering Project provides a space for males to be present in their child's life, develop deeper relationships and support their children's growth. It also provides tools to break negative behavioural cycles and build stronger relationships that have such a profound impact on young people. Heading into Father's Day 2022, my message to all fathers and males positively impacting young lives".

This year, the Australian Father of the Year awards also included three new categories nominated by community members which included: Australian Community Father of the Year, Rick Pekan from Western Australia, Australian Sporting Father of the Year was Isaac Thomas from Western Australia, and Australia's Best Workplace for Fathers was KPMG.

Charles Youmans story



My brother-in-law, Charles Youmans (Chuck), died at his home in Chicago on 24th July after a lengthy illness. For decades. Chuck was a dedicated member of the Chicago theatre community, including serving as house manager for 30 years at Lyric Opera and six years at the Shubert Theatre. He was also on the administrative team of the British American Drama Academy (BADA). Chuck was loved for his winning smile and renowned for his ability to hold listeners spellbound with repertoire of stories garnered during his career. I would like to share some of those stories with you.

As house manager, Chuck was responsible for the safety and operation of the auditorium side of the theatre, just as the stage manager presides over the stage and backstage areas. At Lyric Opera, the theatre seats 3500 people, and with that many people, just about anything can happen, and sometimes did. At one performance, a woman approached Chuck and said, "I'm a doctor. My husband, sitting in the seat beside me, has just died. I'll sit there with him until the end of the performance so we don't upset and disturb people, and then we can call 911 when they've left."

When Lyric purchased the opera house in 1993, Chuck was running a British American Drama Academy program at Stanford University. Lyric called Chuck to advise him of the news, which would also entail extensive renovations. Chuck was away from the office so, one of the instructors on the programme answered the phone and said, "This is Richard Dreyfuss, can I take a message for him?"

During the extended run of *CATS* at the Shubert Theatre in Chicago, the entire cast went home with Chuck one night after the show to celebrate his birthday with food, drink, and birthday cake My sister, Susan, recalls that, "As we lit the candles on the cake, around midnight, the cast of *CATS* sang 'Happy Birthday' in full voice. We threw open the balcony door to share it with our neighbours and despite the hour, there was great appreciation from folks on the surrounding balconies. Not one complaint was received."

When Katherine Hepburn was appearing in West Side Waltz, also at the Shubert, she was determined to have fresh air in the stuffy dressing room, and Chuck went to her aid. He called the engineer, who also couldn't open the window and pronounced it painted shut and immovable. Katherine Hepburn asked him for a hammer. The engineer fetched one - which he gave her with a sceptical look. She took the hammer, thanked him, and threw it through the window. "Ah, now we have fresh air," she declared. In her note of thanks to Chuck, she wrote, "Needless to say, we've had a fine time here. And thank you for making my dressing room so comfortable. I do think you should try to have them quiet down the house air conditioning...."

During the Shubert run of *Private Lives* with Elizabeth Taylor and Richard Burton, the atmosphere was

tense since Richard Burton had recently married Sally Hay, and Elizabeth Taylor wanted to be isolated from him and his new wife. Chuck managed to create and maintain a gracious working relationship with each of them while still honouring Elizabeth Taylor's request. At the conclusion of the run, Richard Burton declared that Chuck was "the best front-of-house man I have ever worked with."

When Chuck left Lyric Opera, he still wanted to be in the theatre with people, not sitting around at home, so he applied to Broadway in Chicago as an usher. They welcomed him with open arms, and immediately wanted to make him a manager. "No thanks," Chuck said. "I've had enough insults and champagne thrown at me during my career. I just want to be in the theatre as an usher." Of course, since the entire ushering staff knew of his impressive background, he often ended up performing management tasks anyway.

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
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Have your say to help create a safer region

Council is taking the next step in enhancing community safety across the Tamworth region with the release of a Community Safety Survey. The survey will provide critical information for Council as it develops the upcoming Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plan.

The Plan outlines the role Council and the community have to play when it comes to community safety and aims to ensure the current quality of life for residents of the Tamworth region continues, while proactively addressing crime and safety issues.

Whilst it is recognised that Police are the principal law enforcement agency, community safety and crime prevention is a shared responsibility of each and every one of us —by working together, we will continue to enhance the safety of our community.

Council is committed to working closely with all sections of our community and across the region, to ensure the plan directly reflects the concerns of our residents.

We all have a role to play as "eyes on the street" in reporting crime and identifying other community safety issues. With this information, Police and other stakeholders can better identify areas of concern and put in place preventative measures and programs. With the community's help, we can also identify people at risk, and through education and tailored programs, their level of risk and vulnerability is able to be reduced.

Chair of the Tamworth Regional Community Safety Working Group, Councillor Mark Rodda said everyone should feel safe where they live, work or play.

"The successful implementation of this plan requires collaboration between both government and a wide range of groups and organisations. We are very fortunate to have a committed Community Safety Working Group to provide advice on issues relating to crime prevention and safety", said Councillor Rodda.

We are calling on the local community to get involved by telling us how you feel at home or when you are out and about in the community. As part of this an online survey via the MyTRC Online Community will be open until Sunday 18 September and an online community workshop is being arranged.

History Rotes

Another busy week has passed with an even busier one coming leading up to the markets this Saturday.

Finally, we have tracked down a photo of F.W. Ridley for a book being written in Bingara. Mr Ridley was a bank manager in Bingara, he was also a relative of A. A. Adams of Barraba station and later Gineroi. As most people would know Mr Adams was an early arrival in New South Wales who supported himself by taking jobs around the Hunter in the early 1840's. He made friends with a number of well-known settlers in the area who visited and later settled in the north of New South Wales.

He purchased Barraba Station and lived there for some years before his partner in Gineroi died and the Adams family moved north to Gineroi. Mr Adams' sister married a Mr Cheesman in England and after the death of her husband brought her family out to Australia to live in northern New South Wales. One of her daughters married a Mr Ridley and the Bingara bank manager was a son of that marriage. He married a Miss Capel, from Piedmont, and thus we have the Barraba connection.

Returning to Trevor Wearne's memoirs he mentions the Bingara Road over the Devil's Elbow near the property Hill Top. Trevor's mother was a Miss Capel, daughter of John Capel of Piedmont Woolshed, on the northern end of Piedmont. John and Maria lived there for most of their married life, only moving to Rocky Creek two years before John died in 1909.

The Capel extended family enjoyed their family Christmas together before the Wearne family departed for Bingara in a sulky with some of the older children riding their horses. However, it was not long before young Ernie Charters arrived at Piedmont Woolshed with the news that there had been as accident on the Devil's Elbow.

Apparently, the pony had bolted, left the road, and went into a gully, tipping the passengers out of the sulky and ended up upside down in the gully with the sulky on top of them. Fortunately, everyone including the pony survived the accident with a few scratches, but the pony was never used in a sulky again.

I hope we see a crowd at the markets this weekend — the society stall is going in for socks and calendars this month so come along and have a look and perhaps make an order. Both items are well worth a look.

\$252,500 SECURED TO REPLACE GWYDIR SHIRE'S LAST TIMBER BRIDGE AT GULF CREEK

THE last timber bridge in the Gwydir Shire – the Gulf Creek Road Bridge – will soon be no more, thanks to a State Government **grant of \$252,500**, announced today by Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall.

Mr Marshall said the funding, provided to council under round two of the government's Fixing Country Bridges program, would enable the full removal and replacement of the ageing dual-lane timber structure with a new and modern concrete equivalent. "I'm delighted Gwydir Shire Council has secured this funding to rid the district of its last remaining timber bridge and replace it with a stronger and safer concrete structure," Mr Marshall said. "Gulf Creek Road may not be one of the busiest in the region, but the local residents and farmers are entitled to good quality roads and bridges and the assurance that they can continue to safely move freight in and out of the district. This funding will not only see the dilapidated timber structure replaced with a modern concrete version, but the approaches to the bridge will also be bitumen sealed, making the section of gravel road even more safe and reduce long-term maintenance costs for ratepayers."

Mr Marshall said that with the completion of this project, Gwydir Shire Council would be joining its neighbours Inverell Shire in replacing all of its timber bridges. "This is a tremendous achievement for any council, but for one of the smallest councils in our region, it's an outstanding milestone," Mr Marshall said. "I'm so proud this funding has allowed the council to bring forward this project many years, also bringing forward the benefits to the local residents."

FREE RATS FOR SENIORS EXPANDED TO SERVICE NSW

Pensioners and other concession card holders in the Tamworth electorate can now pick up free rapid antigen tests (RATs) from any Service NSW Centre or Mobile Service Centre.

Member for Tamworth said seniors could now access up to 10 free RATs through Service NSW Centres as well as through Tamworth Family Support Services, Gunnedah Family Support Inc., and Gunnedah Family and Children's Services Inc.



The program will run until the end of October 2022. Eligible Commonwealth Concession Card holders in NSW include:

- Pensioner Concession card
- Commonwealth Seniors
 Health Care card
- Health Care Card (including Low Income Health Care card)
- Department of Veterans' Affairs Gold, White or Orange cards.

MORE JUNIOR DOCTORS AND NURSE PRACTITIONERS HEADING TO REGIONAL NSW

The NSW Government has announced further incentives to bring junior doctors and nurse practitioners to the bush, benefitting communities in the Tamworth electorate.

Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson has welcomed the announcement from Minister for Regional Health Bronnie Taylor which would see an expansion in the Rural Resident Medical Cadetship Program. bringing the total cadetships on offer in NSW to 50, up from 18.

"We need to do everything we can to bring medical students to the bush, giving them experiences in our close knit rural and regional communities while learning from some of our experienced medical professionals," Mr Anderson said. "Bringing junior medical students to our region will also provide essential respite for our dedicated healthcare workers while giving them an opportunity to explore working and living in the bush and enticing them to stay."

The NSW Government announced the largest workforce boost in the nation's history in the 2022-23 Budget with a \$4.5 billion investment over four years to recruit 10,148 full-time equivalent staff to hospitals and health services across NSW, with 3,800 of those positions in rural and regional areas.

BOOK UP CHECK UP THIS WOMEN'S HEALTH WEEK

Women are being reminded to book important health check-ups to take care of their physical and mental health during Women's Health Week (5-11 September).

Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson said "We know that the pandemic put women, in particular, under greater stress with increased pressure on their work, home and social lives taking a toll on their mental and physical health. Routine check-ups may have been missed so it's important to use this year's women's health week to get back into the doctor's office for a routine check-up."

BreastScreen NSW recommends mammograms for women aged 50-74. You can book an appointment by calling 13 20 50 or visiting the website. Women aged under 40 who have a family history of breast cancer should talk to their GP.

Heart Foundation helping families eat healthy despite rising cost of groceries

The Heart Foundation is releasing a free recipe book to help families cook affordable and healthy versions of popular takeaway meals despite rising grocery prices.

The *Budget Family Recipe Book* features cheap, easy and healthy versions of popular meals such as tacos, pizza, souvlaki and pasta.

It comes as the Heart Foundation is concerned that some families may view less healthy options such as take-away meals as a more affordable and convenient option, owing to rising grocery prices and low availability of some produce.

Each meal is jam-packed full of hearthealthy nutrients and flavour, without the high salt and saturated fat contents of many take-away food options.

Best of all, many of the key ingredients can be substituted for fresh, frozen or canned varieties, allowing families to take advantage of supermarket specials without compromising nutritional value.

The recipes are designed keep you fuller longer, also slashing costs on snacks and reducing the risk of overeating.

Heart Foundation senior dietitian Jemma O'Hanlon said junk food and pre-prepared meals might appear cheaper, but often aren't.

"They cost more in two ways: first, to your hip pocket, and second to your heart health," she said.

"This is because processed meals are usually packed with sodium and saturated fats, which can raise your blood pressure and levels of bad cholesterol.

"You are also unlikely to feel fuller longer eating processed foods – you'll be likely to crave more food sooner which will only see your spend on snacks increase."

Ms O'Hanlon urged families to download the Budget Family Recipe Book for inspiration on how to quickly prepare and eat their own tasty tacos, stir fries, pizzas and souvlakis.

"Best of all — you'll create and maintain healthy eating habits for you and your loved ones, reducing the risk of a heart attack or stroke in the future."

JOBS SUMMIT –TWO OF THE LARGEST FAITH-BASED AGED CARE NETWORKS PUSH FOR PERSONAL CARE WORKERS TO BE ADDED TO MIGRATION LIST

Catholic Health Australia, Uniting NSW.ACT and UnitingCare Australia used the second day of the Jobs & Skills Summit to call for the addition of personal care workers to the skilled migration occupation list as an immediate way of plugging the gap in the aged care workforce.

A CHA study found there was almost 60,000 vacancies in the aged care sector alone, of which 45,000 are qualified aged care workers.

Peak advocacy body CHA represents Catholic not for profit aged care providers while Uniting NSW.ACT is one of the largest providers of aged care in the country and are both attending the Jobs & Skills summit. Uniting NSW.ACT is part of the UnitingCare Network, the largest network of not-for-profit aged care providers nationally.

They are appealing to Immigration Minister Andrew Giles and making the case to delegates at today's Jobs & Skills Summit which they are attending as representatives of the care sector.

CHA CEO Pat Garcia said: "Adding personal care workers to the skilled migration list could really help plug the gap in the aged care workforce. When there are almost 60,000 vacancies in aged care right now this is something that Government can do and do it quickly. There is no doubt that we have more work to do to attract and retain our domestic aged care workers but bringing in workers from countries that have an existing relationship with Australia will help alleviate what is a workforce crisis."

Uniting NSW.ACT Director of Seniors Services, Saviour Buhagiar, said: "Skilled migration of personal care workers must sit alongside fully funded increases to pay and improvement in training, plus fast tracking of nurse migration to address the immediate crisis.

The workforce crisis in aged care is very real. We have 10% vacancy rates across our operations, about 1000 of them in aged care. After the work our people have done during the pandemic to keep seniors safe, we cannot keep asking them to work double shifts and struggle to fill rosters. We need the boost to our workforce that including personal care workers in the migration list will deliver".




Figure 4 - COVID-19 deaths in Australia, reported from surveillance systems*
