

THE SHITBOX RALLY






Author talk with Fiona McArthur

JOINT PUSH FOR AN ALTERNATIVE PALLIATIVE CARE OPTION

Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson has joined Friends of Nioka (FoN) to explore a new model that could deliver better outcomes for palliative care patients who may not require the high-level care of the Nioka ward.

Mr Anderson invited FoN Vice President Bryan Singh to meet with the Minister for Regional Health Bronnie Taylor on a recent visit to Tamworth to introduce a model that would increase support for patients receiving in-home care.

"Friends of Nioka are a dedicated support team of volunteers and friends who raise funds to enhance palliative care services at home and at Nioka," Mr Anderson said.

"Their work has resulted in real positive outcomes for our community so when they came to me with a proposal to enhance palliative care in our region, I was very keen to work with them to see what more could be done to support patients."

Friends of Nioka Vice President Bryan Singh said the group had been working with the support of local health professionals on fine-tuning a proposal to government that would fill a gap in services currently available. Mr Singh said. "Many palliative patients choose to be cared for in their own homes 24 hours per day by friends and family. There are occasions where the carers need respite from this role, due to health, fatigue, or other commitments. There is currently

nowhere that offers these carers the ability to leave the patients in a comfortable, safe and caring environment. Friends of Nioka has been working in consultation with Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson to investigate provisioning such a facility for Tamworth."

NSW GOVERNMENT LEADING THE WAY AS FAMILY AND DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PROVISIONS ENHANCED FOR ALL NSW PUBLIC SECTOR EMPLOYEES

The NSW Government is doubling family and domestic violence leave provisions for all NSW public sector workers with staff able to access 20 days of paid leave per calendar year from 1 January 2023. The same paid leave provisions will also be provided to casual employees, while access to existing carers leave will be also extended to all employees providing support to a family or household member who is a victimsurvivor of domestic violence.

Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson said this change was so important when it comes to supporting those impacted by domestic and family violence.

"The public sector remains one of the biggest employers in our region and this important change gives workers the support they require when they require it, making safety a priority without having to exhaust other entitlements like sick leave or annual leave," Mr Anderson said. "We are committed to improving women's safety after the pandemic saw an increase in domestic violence cases, particularly in our region."

Some 50 years ago a 1929 Packard car was sold to a Vintage car collector at Dural and the story was printed in the Barraba Gazette in July 1969.




The new owner of the Vintage Car, takes a look at his purchase, just before leaving Barraba.

The history of this vehicle began when it was imported to Australia and purchased by Mr C. P. Wilson of "Mayvale" Barraba. Joe Loveday was working with the firm Hoskins and Hoskins and serviced the vehicle even before he set up his motor business in Barraba in 1935.

Mr Wilson drove the vehicle home from Sydney, accompanied by Mrs Wilson and Miss Knight, spending a night in Murrurundi with relatives on the way. The women were both amazed to find how tired they were on arrival at Murrurundi.

As the years passed the car became 'old fashioned' and a new model was purchased. Mr Wilson then asked Mr Bill Alce (blacksmith) to build a utility tray on the old one. The utility was used on Mayvale and Cairton until after Mr Wilson's death in 1950. Mr Loveday then purchased and cared for the old vehicle until it was sold to Mr Smith of "Doonba" in 1963. The vehicle remained on "Doonba", unregistered but doing all sorts of carrying jobs around the property until a Mr John Andrew of Rose Cottage farm at Dural purchased it in 1969 complete with its original instruction book and tools.

He drove it home to Dural after telling the interested Barraba onlookers that the car would never wear out or rust out. I wonder if it still exists.

Why does my cat wake me up so early, and what can I do about it?

You've got an important meeting in the morning and your cat wakes you at 4am. Why? And what can you do to stop this happening again?

Although cats are evolved for night-time activity, during domestication they have adapted to human lifestyles.

Domestic cats tend to be most active early in the morning and at dusk, not in the middle of the night. They also change their activity cycles to fit in with their human housemates. This means if you sleep at night, your cat should also be resting. And a lot of people do sleep with their cat. In a survey of women in the US, around 30% slept with at least one cat.

So why do some cats want to play in the wee hours?

The reason why your cat is waking you up will often help you understand how to stop them. Here are three reasons your cat might be waking you up and how to address the issue.

1. They're hungry

This is among the most common reasons. Unfortunately, one of the first things a sleepy person will do is feed their cat. This rewards the behaviour and makes the cat more likely to repeat it. To start addressing this problem, make sure your cat is getting enough to eat throughout the day. You can feed them a meal or a satisfying snack right before you go to bed.

If you usually feed your cat in the morning, you need to make sure your cat is not associating wake up time with breakfast time. Leave a gap between when you get out of bed and when you feed kitty breakfast – aim for at least half an hour. You can also train your cat to associate something else with getting fed, such as saying "breakfast time!".

2. They don't have a routine

Cats love predictability. Keeping a regular routine has even been associated with reduced stress levels in cats.

To maintain a routine, keep mealtimes, play times and any grooming close to the same time each day.

Empty litter at regular, predictable intervals (dirty or disturbed litter may also be a reason your cat is waking you up). Try not to move litter trays, bowls or scratch posts around unless needed.

If something changes in their environment – you go on holiday, move furniture or have a new house guest or pet – your cat may return to early morning wake up calls. This is typical for cats. Keep the routine as consistent as you can and eventually your cat will settle in to the new normal.

3. They're not using up their energy throughout the day

It's common knowledge cats love to sleep, but they also love to play and move their bodies just like us. It's important to give your cat access to a variety of toys and resources around the house to interact with, especially if you're not home often.

Scratch posts offer cats a place to climb and stretch. Balls, soft and motorised toys give them an opportunity to play and exercise. When you are home, engage your cat with an interactive toy (like a cat wand) or play a game of chase around the house. You can even try making up a game your cat will enjoy.

Cats get bored easily. Keep variety in your play times. And don't play with your cat in the hour before you want to go to bed. Ideally, a play session before you go out and once you get home should help to keep your kitty quiet overnight.





Help! I've made these changes and my cat still woke me up!

Your cat might still wake you up for some time. This behaviour may even get worse in the short term as your cat adjusts. The key is to ignore your cat's behaviour at night or in the early morning. Don't get up and, if you can, don't interact with your cat when they wake you.

If you've tried everything and your cat still wakes you up, it's time to go to see your veterinarian. There might be a health reason causing the behaviour.

Hopefully, you and your cat can come to an agreement about when it's sleep time and when it's wake-up time. It is definitely possible to love your cat and still get your sleep.

17,500-year-old kangaroo in the Kimberley is Australia's oldest Aboriginal rock painting

In Western Australia's northeast Kimberley region, on Balanggarra Country, a two-metre-long painting of a kangaroo spans the sloping ceiling of a rock shelter above the Drysdale River.

In a paper published today in Nature Human Behaviour, we date the artwork as being between 17,500 and 17,100 years old — making it Australia's oldest known in-situ rock painting.

We used a pioneering radiocarbon dating technique on 27 mud wasp nests underlying and overlying 16 different paintings from 8 rock shelters. We found paintings of this style were produced between 17,000 and 13,000 years ago. Our work is part of Australia's largest rock art dating initiative. The project is based in the Kimberley, one of the world's premier rock art regions. Here, rock shelters have preserved galleries of paintings, often with generations of younger artwork painted over older work.

By studying the stylistic features of the paintings and the order in which they were painted when they overlap, a stylistic sequence has been developed by earlier researchers based on observations at thousands of Kimberley rock art sites.

They identified five main stylistic periods, of which the most recent is the familiar Wanjina period.

Styles in rock art

The oldest style, which includes the kangaroo painting we recently dated, often features life-sized animals in outline form, infilled with irregular dashes. Paintings in this style are said to belong to the "Naturalistic" stylistic period.

The ochre used is an iron oxide in a red-mulberry colour. Unfortunately, no current scientific dating method can determine when this paint was applied to the rock surface. A different approach is to date fossilised insect nests or mineral accretions on the rock surfaces that happen to be overlying or underlying rock art pigment. These dates provide a maximum (underlying) or minimum (overlying) age range for the painting.

Our dating suggests the main period for Naturalistic paintings in the Kimberley spanned from at least 17,000 to 13,000 years ago.

The oldest known Australian rock painting

Very rarely, we'll find mud wasp nests both overlying and underlying a single painting. This was the case with the painting of the kangaroo, made on the low ceiling of a wellprotected Drysdale River rock shelter.

We were able to date three wasp nests underlying the painting and three nests built on top of it. With these ages, we determined confidently the painting is between 17,500 and 17,100 years old; most likely close to 17,300 years old.

Our quantitative ages support the proposed stylistic sequence that suggests the oldest Naturalistic style was followed by the Gwion style. This style featured paintings of decorated human figures, often with headdresses and holding boomerangs.

From animals and plants to people

Research we published last year shows Gwion paintings flourished about 12,000 years ago — some 1,000-5,000 years after the Naturalistic period. With these dates, we can also partially reconstruct the environment in which the artists lived 600 generations ago. For example, much of the Naturalistic period coincided with the end of the last ice age when the environment was cooler and drier than now. During the Naturalistic period, 17,000 years ago, sea levels were a staggering 106 metres below today's and the Kimberley coastline was about 300 kilometres further away, more than half the distance to Timor.

Aboriginal artists at this time often chose to depict kangaroos, fish, birds, reptiles, echidnas and plants (particularly yams). As the climate warmed, ice caps melted, the monsoon was re-established, rainfall increased and sea levels rose, sometimes rapidly.

By the Gwion period around 12,000 years ago, sea levels had risen to 55m below today's. This would undoubtedly have prompted long-term adjustment to territories and social relations. This is when Aboriginal painters depicted highly decorated human figures, bearing a striking resemblance to early 20th-century photographs of Aboriginal ceremonial dress. While plants and animals were still painted, human figures were clearly the most popular subject.

Reaching into the past

While we now have age estimates for more paintings than ever before, more work is continuing to find out, more accurately, when each art period began and ended.

For example, one minimum age on a Gwion painting suggests it may be more than 16,000 years old. If so, Gwion art would have overlapped with the Naturalistic period but further dates are required to be more certain.

Moreover, it's highly unlikely the oldest known Naturalistic painting we dated is the oldest surviving one. Future research will almost certainly locate even older works. For now, however, the 17,300-year-old kangaroo is a sight to marvel at.

Things to think about:
