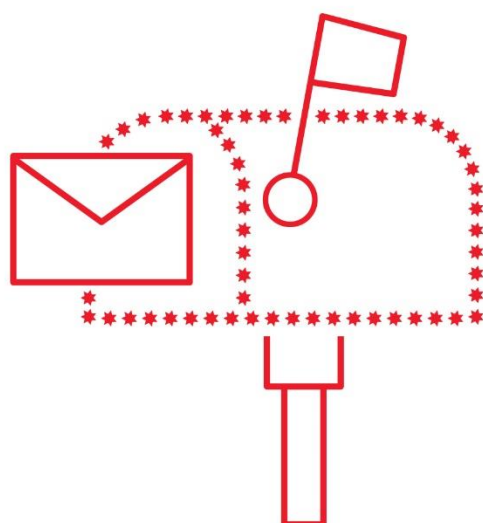

History Notes

Well this week we have Market Day on Saturday. The sign is already out at the Museum and the others will follow as the week progresses - I hope everyone can see the signs this week and come along to hear the music, chat around the barbeque and purchase from the stalls - the stall holders put a lot of hard work into making and planting so that you can enjoy fresh jams, plants and of course the craft that clever people can make.

In reply to last week's letter to the editor re the Jenner family.

Charles Frederick and Amelia Jenner had eleven children. Child 7, Elsie Bertha was born and died in the second half of 1891. Her grave is unmarked in the cemetery. Also listed as unmarked there is her grandmother, Louisa Jenner, daughter of Londis S. ? who died in 1892. The story of Louisa Jenner (nee Hager) as far as we know states that she died on 29th April, 1892 at Deep Creek, to the west of Barraba. I think that it is highly likely that she died in the hospital and was then buried in Barraba Cemetery. Her death certificate should clear that up so long as it was filled in correctly.

The early cemetery on the corner of Queen Street and Edward Street, opposite the Uniting church, was the original burial ground and remained a vacant block for many years before the Post Office decided to build a house on it for the Post Master. The three McKid headstones that were on the block were moved to the present cemetery, probably in the 1870's but no-one knows whether the bodies were removed as well. In any case I would think that Louisa Jenner was buried in the present day cemetery in 1892.

Society members had quite a social morning on their street stall last week - there was lots of cooking, many tasty treats and the person who fed the camp drafters on the tasty treats for morning tea, actually won the raffle. Congratulations Kylie and thank you for your help with the bucket. We also thank all the customers who came along to buy something and have a chat.

Here is an overview of outcomes from the Ordinary Meeting on 28th Feb 2023:

➤ Councillors tonight agreed to approve a fee waiver request for the Tamworth Women's International Rugby Tens Tournament, to be held at the Plain Street Sporting Fields on the Easter long weekend (7-11 April 2023). If the organisers choose to proceed with the booking, it will be the first time the tournament is held in Tamworth. The event would bring over 2000 visitors to Tamworth, with 48 teams travelling to our region.

➤ A requested fee waiver from the NSW Primary School Sports Association and North West Schools Sport Association was also approved. Organisers are currently planning to host a multi-sport state championship week for basketball and hockey at the Tamworth Sports Dome and the Tamworth Regional Hockey Complex. Held for the first time in 2022, the event is set to return to Tamworth on 29 May – 2 June 2023.

➤ Council's sponsorship of the NSW Country Rugby Union Championships over the next three years was also approved, with the event scheduled to be held at Scully Park Regional Sporting Precinct in June 2023. The event consists of approximately 25 teams and 850 players, and is expected to bring over 1000 supporters to Tamworth. Councillors agreed to provide sponsorship of the event to the value of \$16,500 based on the economic return of the event.

➤ Councillors noted and received a report on "CSIRO Wastewater Treatment System Trial Outcomes". The CSIRO are currently researching the potential of an integrated Forward Osmosis (FO), Reverse Osmosis (RO) wastewater treatment process and approached Council in late 2020 to consider installing a pilot treatment plant at Council's Westdale Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP). Council was granted funding from the NSW Government to assist with undertaking the trial in the amount of \$136,800. Following the completion of work by the CSIRO, Beca HunterH2O assessed the CSIRO's trial report and provided a high-level technical and commercial assessment of the technology based on the results achieved during the trial. On the basis of this assessment, FO-RO technology would not be suitable on a commercial scale at this time without further investment in larger scale trials.

➤ Councillors noted and received a report on "Dungowan Dam Catchment – Dungowan Starbush Replanting". The Department of Planning and Environment – Biodiversity and Conservation Division, propose to re-establish a population of the critically endangered and locally extinct Dungowan Starbush on Council owned land upstream of the existing Dungowan Dam. *Asterolasia beckersii*, Dungowan Starbush was initially discovered in the Dungowan Dam Catchment in the mid 1990's. Recent environmental stresses from drought and direct impacts from the 2019/2020 bushfires have led to possible local extinction of these populations. DPE have recently been successful in propagating the species from cuttings and are proposing a translocation program to reintroduce the Dungowan Starbush to the natural environment in March / April 2023 and 2024. The proposed locations being upstream of the existing Dungowan Dam should not impact any works planned for the new Dungowan Dam, should it proceed. The project is fully funded by the DPE, however Council staff will assist with site access and site safety inductions.

➤ Councillors have agreed to approve the following funding allocation to the total of \$31,647.00 as part of the "2022/2023 Facility Improvement Fund Program".

o Bendemeer Town Hall Committee - Secure storage cupboards \$910.00
o Dungowan Hall Trust Committee - Undercover BBQ area with concrete floor \$8,500.00

o Kootingal Recreational Reserve Committee - Kootingal multi-purpose basketball court re-surface \$10,000.00

o Piallamore Recreation Reserve Committee - Tank relocation and Memorial Garden \$10,000.00

o Weabonga Hall and Recreation Reserve Local Committee - Weabonga Recreation Reserve Shed access and pathway \$2,237.00 This program is an opportunity for Section 355 Committees to enhance community facilities by applying for matching funding and/or in-kind contributions from Council for each project.

All five applications received in round one of the program have been supported, totalling \$31,647.00. Council has allocated \$50,000.00 to the 2022/2023 Facility Improvement Fund project, the remainder of which will be made available in a second round of program in March 2023.

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OUR KIDS ARE BACK IN THE CLASSROOM – TIME TO CLAIM UNSPENT VOUCHERS!

Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson is reminding local parents that there is money sitting idle in the NSW Government coffers, ready to be claimed before 30 June.

Mr Anderson said a total of 9,206 \$50 Back to School vouchers remained unclaimed in the Tamworth Electorate, meaning there was still \$460,300 available to local families.

"Back to School vouchers are a great initiative for local families who are struggling in this economy. They can use vouchers for a range of things like shoes, backpacks, uniforms, and stationery," Mr Anderson said. "We recently expanded the vouchers to enable them to be used for school excursions in terms 1 and 2, helping to ensure kids don't miss out on important learning experiences outside of the classroom. I know local businesses have also appreciated the boost that the back-to-school rush brought in January and February, with tills continuing to tick over through the last of the summer months."

In the Tamworth electorate, 40,559 vouchers have been created, but with only 31,358 claimed so far, there is still money to on the table ahead of the 30 June deadline.

"With so many vouchers remaining unclaimed, I'm reminding our local families to take up this opportunity to get their kids kitted up as the term progresses," Mr Anderson added. "We know how tough it is for our families at the moment and with more than 70 vouchers and rebates available through Service NSW, we're here to help. Anyone feeling the pinch can book an appointment to see a savings specialist at their local Service NSW Centre or they can go online to check their eligibility for the range of savings available."

STRONGER EL NIÑO COULD RAISE IRREVERSIBLE MELTING OF ANTARCTICA

New research led by scientists at CSIRO, Australia's national science agency, has shown that future increases in the strength of El Niño may accelerate irreversible melting of ice shelves and ice sheets in Antarctica.

The results, published in *Nature Climate Change*, used climate models to show how an increase in the variability of El Niño Southern Oscillation (ENSO) leads to reduced warming near the surface, but accelerated warming of deeper ocean waters.

ENSO is a key driver of climate variability, as both its warm phase, El Niño, and its colder phase, La Niña, influence weather conditions around the world, including in Australia.

Wenju Cai, lead author of this study and global expert on the relationship between climate change and ENSO, said the research was a critical step in further understanding how Antarctica will be affected by climate change.

"Climate change is expected to increase the magnitude of ENSO, making both El Niño and La Niña stronger," Dr Cai said.

"This new research shows that stronger El Niño may speed up warming of deep waters in the Antarctic shelf, making ice shelves and ice sheets melt faster. Our modelling also revealed that warming around the edges of floating sea ice is slowed during this process, slowing down the melting of sea ice near the surface. Models with increased ENSO variability show a reduced upwelling of deeper, warmer waters, leading to slower warming of the ocean surface," he said.

The associated winds around Antarctica are the mechanism driving this result. When ENSO variability increases, it slows the intensifying westerly winds along the shelf. As a result, the upwelling of warm water around Antarctica is not able to increase as much.

The research team examined 31 climate models that participated in Phase 6 of the Coupled Model Intercomparison Project (CMIP6) under historical forcings and a high-emissions scenario.

Co-author Ariaan Purich from Securing Antarctica's Environmental Future at Monash University said the effects of increasing ENSO variability go beyond extreme weather risks, and affect changes in Antarctic sea ice and ice shelves and sheets.

"This could have broad implications for the global climate system, so continuing to understand how ENSO will respond to climate change is a critical area of climate research," Dr Purich said.

"There is still a lot more we need to understand about processes influencing shelf temperatures, and the finding is an important piece of the puzzle," she said.
