Closure Notice - Barraba Medical Centre

Dear Community

It is with regret that we must inform you of the permanent closure of Barraba Medical Centre, effective August 31, 2023. The decision has been reached due to the unfortunate financial non-viability and the scarcity of medical practitioners. Over the past two years, the clinic has incurred consistent financial losses, rendering its continuation unsustainable. The departure of doctors attributed to stress and burnout has further exacerbated our challenges. Despite our best endeavours, the ongoing national shortage of qualified medical professionals has hindered our efforts to secure suitable replacements.

Our collaborative initiatives with PHN and HNE aimed at formulating a viable strategy have regrettably yielded no substantial results.

Arrangements have been made to facilitate the seamless transfer of medical records to your respective new healthcare providers. An equitable fee, intended to defray administrative expenses, will be applicable. Should you require this service, kindly initiate the process through your new doctor's office, utilising the practice fax or telephone contact information.

History Notes

We had a well attended

meeting last week, lots of discussion especially about a few changes to the Dean Room. The storage boxes have mostly been sorted and some items have been found after being lost for some years.

On Wednesday we had a visit from a Rumsby descendant who found quite a bit of history in our files. We just have to find and play Henry Rumsby's tape as it might reveal some more stories!

This week we are having our September market a week early to coincide with the Art Exhibition. Last month's market was quite a successful day with a couple of extra stalls and this one is looking to be good as well. Watch out for the advertisements, both in the News and around town and come along and check them out- no charge to have a look!

While searching through the papers and books from storage, various interesting items have appeared including a list of building applications for our town. A few examples include the pottery room which was built by J.F.Myers in 1929 as a butcher shop for H.White Ltd on¼ acre.

Another interesting application in 1929 was to build a waiting room for the Golf Committee on the Barraba Common. It was built by John F.Myers using wood and iron on brick piers and was to be 28 feet by 18 feet. The beginning of the present-day golf club although I think it was moved in the ensuing years.

Finally, there are two articles re early Barraba. C. G. Williams, auctioneer, had lived in the district all his life and told the reporter "at first there was a bush public house and a rough store. Part of that old building still remains - Mrs Finkernagel's shop being built into it and rough slabs plainly visible at one end of the building"

The other article by an old resident, also an auctioneer, Frank Cheesbrough, who was running Walroodah Dairying Company and sending carts to supply the town with milk and butter. He remembered when his father bought Tareela Station in 1863. There were two small public houses built of wood, one store and no school.

These two articles are obviously from an old newspaper and copied out by Betty Crowley in her early history notes in the sixties and seventies. There are a few more including the Open Air Theatre and a Tea room for W.Pringle which has me puzzled as I thought he was a dentist. More next week.

Car parking shifts into gear with new survey

Residents are being asked to give their feedback as Tamworth Regional Council starts work on updating its car parking strategy for the region.

The Regional Parking Strategy is an update to the Tamworth CBD Parking Strategy 2020-2030, which was released prior to the adoption of Blueprint 100.

The updated parking strategy will not only cover the Tamworth CBD, but also towns and villages across the region including Nundle, Barraba, Manilla and Kootingal, in addition to high traffic areas such as the Sports and Entertainment Precinct in South Tamworth and Bridge Street Precinct in West Tamworth.

"It was always the intent to review the strategy at least every 3-4 years to ensure the plan still aligned with Council's strategic direction, which is exactly what we are doing," said Manager Strategy, Assets & Design Graeme McKenzie.

As part of the review of the strategy, a community survey has been developed to determine the needs of the community and identify areas of improvement and/or concern. "As the community grows the needs of our community evolve too, including emerging trends such as electric vehicles and people looking to walk and cycle more, so we really want the community to complete the survey so we can capture any changes in how the community approaches car parking," said Mr McKenzie.

Frost Over Barraba opens this Thursday 31 August at 10am. The Art Show is in the Treloar's Building on the corner of Alice and Queen Streets. The Art Show will be open 10am -4pm on Thursday, Friday and Saturday. On Sunday the Art Show opens at 10am and closes at 1pm.

Under the experienced direction of Mandy Cabot, the Treloar's Building has now been transformed into a beautiful gallery space where the almost 200 entries have been hung. The artworks will be judged on Wednesday by painter Michelle Hungerford and photographer Paul Matthews.

Michelle Hungerford is a full-time practising artist who lives and works in Tamworth. Landscapes are her preferred genre. Paul is a Walkley and Protea award winning photojournalist who worked for the Sydney Morning Herald, the Northern Daily Leader and the Newcastle Herald. Paul has now retired to Gunnedah.

The Art Show will be open on Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday from 10am each day. There are lots of other creative shows open in Barraba including at the Fuller Gallery.

Tickets are selling well to the Friday night function called the 'Arty Party' on 1 September. This event replaces the usual Thursday evening opening night. The Arty Party is being catered by Laura Swan. There will be a bar operated by parents from Barraba Pre-School. Live music will be provided by cellist Emily Bishop.

Saturday is the day organisers expect the most visitors. Tamworth singers Hester Fraser and Brookie Gillett along with Sydney's Ash Morse will be entertaining crowds from the front of the Victoria Hotel. Facepainting and balloons will be on Queen Street. Bec Capel is running a "Garden of Creativity" with craft for children at Barraba Library on Saturday too.

The local Museum will be open on Saturday and Sunday with a chance to see the excellent collection. Ron Hiscock is also opening his "Shed of Knowledge". The Fuller Gallery will be open for Frost with a special show featuring the artworks of Barraba's Martin Unwin, Mike Simpson and Lew Koopman. They are also offering their popular morning teas and lunches over the weekend. The Motorbike "Show n Shine" at the Commercial Hotel will attract lots of riders and aficionados of motorcycles on Saturday. Willo will be providing live music and a smorgasbord lunch is also on offer.

Sunday is a quieter day to enjoy the Art Show but lots of business will be open for the occasion, including the new Opportunity Knocks Op-Shop. The Fuller Gallery will be open and its members will be offering their excellent morning teas and lunches.

Here is an overview of outcomes from the Ordinary Meeting of Tamworth Regional Council Tuesday 22 Aug 23

- > Council has taken a step towards improving the region's public art offering by allocating an additional one off \$75,000 towards public art projects. The extra budget will address the inflationary pressure to enable the purchase of new public art and the maintenance of existing artworks. The Public Art Engagement Strategy is currently being drafted and once finalised will provide guidance and recommendations on permanent budgets. Public Art which includes sculptures, statues, monuments, memorials, street furniture, landscaping and murals, plays a critical role in place making and adds to the cultural tourism of the region; it directly works toward focus area eight of the Blueprint 100 Strategic Plan, 'A strong and vibrant identity'.
- Councillors tonight unanimously agreed to defer a development application for the expansion of an existing horse training facility on Spains Lane for 28 days. Councillors considered that it would be beneficial to defer the item to allow additional consultation to occur regarding the recommended conditions of approval, both with the applicant and those residents affected by the development who had lodged submissions.
 - Through a motion moved by Councillor Mark Rodda, Councillors agreed to investigate the financial impact to Council should one or more of the buildings at 218 Peel Street, Tamworth be transferred to the Tamworth Power Station Museum and a time line for the transfer of buildings to enable and expedite the expansion of the Power Station footprint into the adjoining buildings.
 - Following comprehensive community consultation, Councillors tonight adopted the update to the Engineering Design Minimum Standards which detail Council's standard drawings and construction specifications. The request for a review of the standards was originally requested in an Ordinary Council Meeting in March 2019; moving forward Councillors also agreed that a full review of the standards should be conducted in two years' time.

- Councillors resolved to place the draft Urban Stormwater Management Plans for Barraba, Manilla, Moonbi/Kootingal and Tamworth on public exhibition for a period of 28 days. These plans are intended to identify areas where Council's stormwater management can be improved. This includes improving the quality of water discharged to the environment and reducing risks associated with excess stormwater runoff.
- In an effort to cool and green the region, ongoing tree planting operations are being carried out at a number of locations; Councillors learned during tonight's meeting. The plantings will take place in a number of locations, including the Australian Equine Livestock and Events Centre (AELEC), King George V Avenue, George Street Dog Leash Free Park, New Winton Business Park, and CBD areas along Brisbane Street between Kable Avenue and Marius Street. The report provided by the Urban Street Tree Management Plan Advisory Group also noted donation of funds from the Tamworth Regional Wellness Network to contribute towards the region's tree planting efforts.
- Council has reaffirmed its commitment to road and pedestrian safety with Councillors approving a number of new safety measures at various locations across the region. Measures include line marking, additional or relocated signage, kerb blisters, pedestrian fencing, pavement markers and pedestrian refuges which will benefit a number of schools, a childcare centre and the general public. These works come as recommendations from the Tamworth Regional Local Traffic Committee with a majority of the measures being funded by the Australian State Government under the School Zone Infrastructure Program.
- Councillors noted minutes from the Tamworth Region Arts Advisory Committee which amongst other items requested that local artists be considered, where possible, to design the totems that are included in the recently adopted Entrance Strategy. Council also approved the installation of the 'Women, Life, Freedom' mural on the outer wall of the Library/Gallery which will include more lighting and a storyboard at the front entrance.

Cheesy potato and garlic pull-a-parts

Double carbs, plus cheese, have never looked so good. Potato bread makes for serious carb-loading, but it's so good. By all means add some herbs here, particularly rosemary. It can also be left as a loaf and cut into slices after baking.

INGREDIENTS

- 500 gm floury potatoes (such as desiree), quartered
- 50 ml olive oil
- 2 heads of garlic
- 500 gm (3⅓ cups) bread flour
- 2 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp dried yeast
- 160 gm coarsely grated Tilsit or Gruyère

METHOD

1 Preheat oven to 180C. Spread potatoes in a roasting pan, season to taste with sea salt, drizzle with a little olive oil and roast until tender (50 minutes to 1 hour). Remove and set aside to cool.

2 Meanwhile, place garlic on an oven tray and roast until soft (8-10 minutes). Cool, then peel cloves carefully and set aside.

3 Combine flour, salt and yeast and 360ml lukewarm water in an electric mixer fitted with a dough hook and knead until smooth and elastic (4-5 minutes, or you can knead by hand which will take 8-10 minutes). Place dough in a lightly oiled bowl and cover with a tea towel. Set aside in a warm place until doubled in size (1 hour).

4 Preheat oven to 200C. On a lightly floured work surface roll out dough to a 25cm x 40cm rectangle. Scatter cheese, potatoes and garlic cloves over then, from the longest side, roll up into a cylinder and cut into 4cm-5cm pieces. Stand cut side up and press together on an oven tray lined with baking paper. Cover with a tea towel and set aside in a warm place until doubled in size (about 1 hour). Bake until golden brown (35-40 minutes). Serve warm.

Rugby Report

The Barraba Rams travelled to Moree on Saturday to meet Narrabri Blue Boars in the minor semi-final and came home with a solid win in a tense, hard fought game. They now have to wait a week to see who they meet in the final.

The Rams started with pressure on the Boars which resulted in a Ram penalty in an easy position, but the attempt was flagged away, an early opportunity missed early in the game. A good strong run by Jack Mallise put the pressure back on Narrabri and from good work by the forwards and ball to the backs in attack getting close to the line for Connor Rogers to gather slice through the defence and Clarke's conversion opened the score for the rams to lead 7-0. Narrabri lifted and put plenty of pressure on the Rams defence on the try line but solid and determined defence held them out and a relieving penalty defused the situation for a good clear kick. The Rams were having trouble in the lineouts as N. Sweeney was on the bench after an injury last week so the throws were being picked off by the Narrabri jumpers.

A team change saw N. Sweeney replace Jamal for the lineout throws for some improvement for this part of the game. With 10 minutes of the first half to go the Boars mounted plenty of pressure on the Ram defence and held them out and a free kick allowed McKenna to clear from the line. A high tackle on a Barraba player saw the Boars player shown a yellow card and 10 minutes in the sin-bin and from the ensuring play the Rams backs attacked but were unable to breach the defence and at half time Barraba led 12-0 with two tries and two conversions.

Barraba started the second half with a deep kick off into Narrabri corner and from the ensuring play the forwards saw N. Sweeney score and Clarke convert for a 17-0 lead. This stirred up the Boars who were still dominating the lineouts, to spend some time in the Rams quarter but a penalty relieved the threat for the moment, but they were not going to be denied and finally they opened their score with a try in the corner which was not converted. 17-5 to the Rams. Play went down the field for a while with both teams looking dangerous, until Barraba received a penalty and Clarke converted for a 20-5 scoreboard.

Narrabri then put all their effort into scoring but solid defence held them out. At least six or seven penalties for rushing off the line in defence could have received a couple of yellow cards. The Rams held on and got a penalty to relieve pressure to get down the other end of the field and get a penalty, McKenna Failed, final score 20-5.

Barraba will have to wait the result of the Pirates/Moree game, as they will play the final against the winner on the 9th September for a place in the Grand Final on the 16th September.

The boys may be thinking of a training run next Saturday to tidy up a few problems they had during the game, especially the lineouts and the number of penalties they gave away. First Grade saw Moree dominate the Narrabri side to the tune of 34-12, and the ladies result saw Pirates run over Scone in similar fashion 31-12.
