

Feedback sought on Stormwater Management

Residents are being asked to share their firsthand experience of dangerous or damaging stormwater runoff and to give feedback on Tamworth Regional Council's draft Urban Stormwater Management Plans for the region.

Stormwater is runoff from rainfall. In urban areas, it is captured by a series of pits and then taken underground through pipes and culverts. Stormwater may also travel as surface flow in open drains, roadways, natural channels and overland flow paths. As stormwater travels over the landscape, it can become contaminated with litter and other pollutants.

Council's stormwater management endeavours to protect both people and property from adverse flooding risks, minimise environmental impacts, and recognise stormwater as a valuable resource.

Tamworth Regional Council is responsible for maintaining effective public stormwater systems to drain urban catchments in line with NSW Government Office of Local Government requirements.

Meeting the stormwater management needs of our growing community in a changing climate is critical to achieving the community's vision in Tamworth Regional Blueprint 100 to 'Protect local waterways and minimise stormwater pollution'.

"The plans aim is to identify and prioritise options for improving the management of stormwater quality and reduce impacts of excess runoff during storm events," said Senior Stormwater Engineer Aiden Pugh.

As part of the review of the plans, Council extends an invitation to the community to contribute their feedback on the plans.

"As the community grows the needs of our community evolve too. The Urban Stormwater Management Plans will identify future capital works and recommend specific actions to address some of the objectives set in Blueprint 100 and other Council documents, offering a cohesive, strategic approach to stormwater management in the region," said Mr Pugh.

History Notes

A wonderful weekend for Barraba - even car parking was at a premium on Saturday as numerous visitors arrived to spend the day touring the various venues to view the paintings, the handcrafts, the markets and the music.

It was one of the Society's best markets with crowds of people visiting the stalls and sampling the barbeque - some stalls had lots of customers but I doubt if anyone actually sold out. Thank you to everyone for coming.

Our next market will be held on the usual second Saturday in the month and then there will be another one the next week to co-inside with the motor show in October.

We have a meeting coming up next week with quite a few items to discuss including a date for the Annual General Meeting in October. Memberships are also due now.

There have been two requests this week - the first about Barraba down in the Hunter Valley and the other is the Barraba Hotel in Windsor- how much history of these two can we find and is there a connection to our Barraba?

Returning to history and the early building applications, we find Harry White extending his home in Queen Street. J. T. Bridges was to be the builder, adding a verandah, laundry and bathroom to the house which appears to have been about where Russell's Garage is today. The cost of the additions was estimated to be 52 pounds - just over 100 dollars in today's currency.

Negotiations were being undertaken in October, 1929, at Clifton Hall for an Open Air Theatre at the back of the building. As we know there was an Open Air Theatre at The Empire Theatre for a short while before it closed and films were shown inside the building.

The unusual building application in January, 1930, was for a Tea Room for W. Pringle, in the centre of the block opposite Clifton's garage. There was to be one room 45 X 13 feet and another 17 x 13 feet and a bathroom 6 x 6 feet. The walls were to be brick with an iron roof. Was this Andy's Backpackers? The Sofis family had their cafe here before they built on the other side of the street.

Hopefully I will find out for next week's notes.



THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK - IN FOCUS

No longer is a persons' phone just for conversations. The modern phone has wider implications. It is not only for hearing, but its other features include the ability to take photos. It might therefore be classed as a Camera.

And photos are always "in focus"., something that you could not be assured of in many older cameras. Many years ago, black and white photos were about the extent of personal family photos. The advancement for the colour buff, came largely through the development of the colour slide.

Positive and negative features existed. A negative feature might go like this. You are invited to a friend or

acquaintances place to see the collection of their latest 35mm colour slide often poorly composed, out of focus and seen on a make do screen hung on the wall. Once you're in and seated there's no escape!! You're there for the night! Your host is in his element, as he proceeds to show slides of a recent trip to some obscure place that you've never heard of, or a blurred action shot of an important sporting event or a seemingly never ending, unedited out of focus photos of a new baby, that is your hosts pride and joy, but of whom you know nothing.

The slide night does nothing for you and when the evening is over you, with tongue in cheek, express your thanks to your host, for "A lovely evening". However, you depart for home lamenting a wasted night out. The colour slides camera, had manual features that enabled you to get the focus. Correct, sharp and clear. Unlike a modern phone/camera that requires no setting for focus.

As with photography, so it is with life. We need a focus that is sharp and clear. Some people focus on fame and fortune, others on sporting success. How 'dad jokes' may prepare your kids for a lifetime of embarrassment, according to psychology

This Father's Day you may be rolling out your best "dad jokes" and watching your children laugh (or groan). Maybe you'll hear your own father, partner or friend crack a dad joke or two. You know the ones:

What is the most condescending animal? A pan-DUH! Why don't scientists trust atoms? Because they make up everything!

Yes, dad jokes can be fun. They play an important role in how we interact with our kids. But dad jokes may also help prepare them to handle embarrassment later in life.

What are dad jokes?

Dad jokes are a distinct style of humour consisting of puns that are simple, wholesome and often involve a cheesy delivery. These jokes usually feature obvious wordplay and a straightforward punchline that leaves listeners either chuckling or emitting an exaggerated groan. This corny brand of humour is popular. There are hundreds of websites, YouTube videos and TikToks dedicated to them. You can even play around with dad joke generators if you need some inspiration.

Why are dad jokes so popular?

People seem to love dad jokes, partly because of the puns. A study published earlier this year found people enjoy puns more than most other types of jokes. The authors also suggested that if you groan in response to a pun, this can be a sign you enjoy the joke, rather than find it displeasing. Other research shows dad jokes work on at least three levels:

1. As tame puns

Humour typically violates a kind of boundary. At the most basic level, dad jokes only violate a language norm. They require specific knowledge of the language to "get" them, in a way a fart joke does not.

What do you call a knight made entirely out of fine china? Sir Ramic.

The fact that dad jokes are wholesome and inoffensive means dads can tell them around their children. But this also potentially makes them tame, which other people might call unfunny.

2. As anti-humour

Telling someone a pun that's too tame to deserve being told out loud is itself a violation of the norms of joke-telling. That violation can in turn make a dad joke funny. In other words, a dad joke can be so unfunny this makes it funny – a type of anti-humour.

3. As weaponised anti-humour

Sometimes, the purpose of a dad joke is not to make people laugh but to make them groan and roll their eyes. When people tell dad jokes to teasingly annoy someone else for fun, dad jokes work as a kind of weaponised anti-humour. The stereotypical scenario associated with dad jokes is exactly this: a dad telling a pun and then his kids rolling their eyes out of annoyance or cringing from embarrassment.

Dad jokes help dads be dads

Dad jokes are part of a father's toolkit for engaging with his loved ones, a way to connect through laughter. But as children grow older, the way they receive puns change. Children at around six years old enjoy hearing and telling puns. These are generally innocent ones such as:

Why is six afraid of seven? Because seven ate nine!

As children age and their language and reasoning abilities develop, their understanding of humour becomes more complex. In adolescence, they may start to view puns as unfunny. This, however, doesn't stop their fathers from telling them. Instead, fathers can revel in the embarrassment their dad jokes can produce around their image-conscious and sensitive adolescent children.

In fact, in a study, one of us (Marc) suggests the playful teasing that comes with dad jokes may be partly why they are such a widespread cultural phenomenon. This playful and safe teasing serves a dual role in father-child bonding in adolescence. Not only is it playful and fun, it can also be used to help educate the young person how to handle feeling embarrassed.

Helping children learn how to deal with embarrassment is no laughing matter. Getting better at this is a very important part of learning how to regulate emotions and develop resilience. Modelling the use of humour also has benefits. Jokes can be a useful coping strategy during awkward situations — for instance, after someone says something awkward or to make someone laugh who has become upset.

Dad jokes are more than punchlines

So, the next time you hear your father unleash a cringe-worthy dad joke, remember it's not just about the punchline. It's about creating connections and lightening the mood. So, go ahead, let out that groan, and share a smile with the one who proudly delivers the dad jokes. It's all part of the fun.
