COMMUNITY SUPERMARKET BOOMING IN BARRABA

Barraba locals are the beneficiary following Liberty Foodcare establishing a low-cost community supermarket in part of the Old Vic Hotel in Queen Street. Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson said he was pleased the former government had been able to contribute to the shop with a \$12,500 grant from the Community Building Partnerships fund allowing Liberty to purchase fridges.

"Liberty Foodcare have proven to be a lifeline for Barraba since it first opened last year," Mr Anderson said. "The organisation provides low-cost groceries to Barraba locals who are looking to drive down the cost of their weekly shop at a time when the cost of living is so high. With their new fridges, Liberty Foodcare is able to offer a wider range of goods including fresh produce. Around a third of the Barraba community are now registered with Liberty Foodcare, offering them more choice in where to buy their goods in town."

Liberty Pastor James Ardill said the Foodcare shop was easing financial pressure on the local community by providing low-cost groceries.

"The way the dollar is going, and the way petrol prices are going, it's just going to continue to add pressure on people because you can't absorb those increased costs this quickly," Pastor Ardill said. "One of the biggest benefits from our new fridges is that we've been able to provide perishable food items like dairy and meat. In some respects, those items have experienced the greatest increase in costs."

Tamworth Olympic Pool opening plans

Council can confirm the opening of Tamworth Olympic Pool will remain closed for the first few weeks of the 2023-24 swimming season, as has been the practice in previous years. A Council spokesperson said while our region has experienced above average temperatures throughout September, the large volume of water in the pool (over one million litres) has still not naturally reached the 24-degrees Celsius mark key user groups, including Tamworth City Swimming Club, require. With the sharp drop in temperatures forecast for later this week and over the weekend, it is expected this temperature will not be achieved for a few more weeks. As happens most years, there are no bookings for the facility until November.

Tamworth West and South Memorial Pool (Scully) is a heated facility and will open on Monday 9 October as planned. It has been proven in previous years that the heated water at Scully can accommodate all pool usage in this early part of the season.

SHENHUA LAND BACK TO AGRICULTURE

Following the cancellation of Shenhua's plans to mine on the Liverpool Plains, work is underway to regenerate the land for the benefit of the community and the environment. The land formerly owned by Shenhua has been returned to the community. While some land has been sold to farmers, a 6,300ha parcel of land has been kept in public hands and is being managed by Local Land Services under a biodiversity project known as *The Waratah Project.*

Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson said the fight to push the Shenhua coal mine off the Liverpool Plains was hard fought, and ultimately won.

"Local Land Services has set up the Waratah project focusing on improving biodiversity in the area, supporting koala populations, and to investing in Aboriginal Cultural Heritage," Mr Anderson said.

"So far, more than \$2.7 million has been invested into the project, helping install new fencing, plant vegetation, undertake hazard reduction activities, maintain access tracks, and more. There has also been significant engagement local landholders with with 23 landholder agreements signed to ensure weeds and pests are managed around the Waratah Project site. This is good news, because more than 2,578 pest animals have been eradicated on the site with feral pigs, goals, deer, foxes, and cats targeted. Work has been undertaken in consultation with local aboriginal groups and businesses to ensure the cultural heritage of the site is surveyed and any significant sites preserved.

This is an excellent outcome and I congratulate the great work of Local Land Services in setting up the Waratah Project."

SITXFSA005 Food Handling (Level 1) and SITXFSA005 and SITXFSA006 Food Safety Supervisor

Standard 3.2.2A is a new food safety standard for food service, caterer and related retail businesses, becoming enforceable in **December 2023**. It contains requirements for food handler training, a food safety supervisor, and evidence that specific food handling activities are being adequately managed. History Notes

This week marks the start of the Historical Society's busy month

with the markets on Saturday - the usual markets with the usual features. Next week we have the Annual General Meeting and then the special book markets on the following weekend and that will be followed by the street stall.

The historical enquiries have slowed down just a little but the Society has been given a very interesting history of some of our first nations people and we thank the author for all the hard work that he has obviously put into it.

After last week's story of the disastrous fire in Queen Street in 1921 it is time to look into the formation of the local fire brigade. *Some* of this information comes from the '*Back To Barraba 1983*' booklet which was put together by the late Marie Smith.

As we know Barraba suffered a number of fires in the early days and they were more serious than they need to have been because there was no water supply and no fire brigade. Manilla had a fire brigade before Barraba but imagine the time it took for them to travel to Barraba in those days.

In 1935 the Royal Hotel was burnt to the ground for the second time. The Connor's Creek Dam had been completed and water was available in the town but there was still no brigade or equipment in the town.

A fire brigade was established in Barraba on Monday 14th October, 1935 - six months after the hotel fire. The first fire engine, a No.42 Garford Hale with hard tyres, arrived in Barraba by rail and was garaged in a shed behind the Monterey Cafe. It was not long before the brigade was set up in its own station fitted out with a siren and a telephone. The Fire Brigade Inspector interviewed candidates for the Brigade and ten Barraba men became the local fire brigade under the leadership of Wally Flynn.

The fire brigade section of Marie's book is well worth the read for anyone interested and there is a photo taken in 1983 of the Brigade taken with their current engine in front of the old station in Maude Street.



For some years the Anglican Diocese of Armidale has been in gospel partnership with the Diocese of North Kigezi in Uganda. This partnership exists to equip, encourage, and support gospel workers in North Kigezi while giving Christians here a way of sharing Christ's mission, support, and care in an organised way.

Each January (except when prevented by Covid) a team has gone from the Armidale Diocese to help train clergy and lay leaders in North Kigezi. In 2024 one member of that team will be Will Blomfield. Please keep him in your prayers.

Our parish also has partnerships with St Anne's, Ryde; James and Steph, serving with the Church Missionary Society in Central Asia; and Laurie and Bec Carleton with Bush Church Aid in Norfolk Island.

The Parish Council meet on Sunday, 15th October and on Saturday, 28th the Youth Centre will once again be the meeting place for clergy and councillors from all over the Diocese. Youth Muster is on, I think in Tamworth, from 10th to 12th November and there will be a Gingerbread House Event on Saturday, 9th December.

This week, think about these words from 1 John, chapter 2, verses 15 to 17: "Do not love the world or anything in the world... For everything in the world – the cravings of sinful man, the lust of his eyes and the boasting of what he has and does – comes not from the Father but from the world. The world and its desires pass away, but the man who does the will of God lives forever."

Fire Trail Upgrades on Crown Lands

The Minns Labor Government is committed to rebuilding our essential services and today has announced the NSW Budget has allocated an additional \$10.6 million to maintain and upgrade fire trails on Crown land.

Crown Lands has joined forces with the Rural Fire Service to launch aerial inspections by helicopter, supported by onthe-ground trail maintenance by the Soil Conservation Service, to ensure firefighters have ready access to fight fires and conduct hazard reduction work.

More than 720 fire trails are being inspected by helicopter covering more than 3,600 kilometres of Crown land as well as areas of national park, state forest and other adjoining land. The aerial inspections will identify areas needing maintenance to ensure the state's fire trails are in good condition leading into summer.

On the ground crews will follow the inspections to complete needed maintenance including removing excess vegetation, erosion repairs, drainage and soil stability work, and constructing vehicle passing and turning bays for fire trucks. Crown Lands maintains about 2,500km of fire trails and 720 hectares of Asset Protection Zones across the state, with helicopters assisting trail inspections in more remote areas. The fire trail network helps protect life and property from bushfires by providing access for firefighting equipment and personnel. Trails can also provide evacuation routes for residents during emergencies by providing a safe and clear path to leave fire prone areas. Other uses include supporting access for infrastructure maintenance, management of invasive species, study of plant and animal and recreational activities such populations, as bushwalking.

Minister for Lands and Property Steve Kamper said: "The Minns Government is committed to restoring essentials services. Fire trails are essential for firefighters to get quick and safe access to fight bushfires and keep our communities, wildlife and properties safe. Helicopter inspections are an efficient way to check remote locations, cutting inspection times from months to weeks while providing an overview of the Crown land fire trail network." Minister for Emergency Services Jihad Dib said: "Fire combat agencies such as the Rural Fire Service rely on properly maintained fire trails to access fires as quickly as possible, and to safely retreat when they become too dangerous. We are facing a potentially dangerous bushfire season, with hot, dry conditions and vegetation growth creating a higher fuel load. We need to ensure our fire trails are properly maintained so our committed firefighting personnel have the best chance possible of containing fires this bushfire season."

Stop the digital criminals with basic cyber hygiene practices

Amid an escalating global cybercrime bill – now estimated at AUD \$12 trillion a year – cybersecurity experts are calling for a new, more transparent, and collective approach to address cyberattacks. While 99% of attempted cyberattacks are thwarted, the 1% that manage to slip through the net are wreaking not only economic damage, but significant reputational, legal, and personal harms. Optus Chair of Cybersecurity and Data Science at the University of South Australia, Associate Professor Mamello Thinyane, says that individuals, companies, and governments must all share the responsibility.

"In the past, organisations have been unwilling to disclose their cyberattack experiences for fear of reputational damage and legal implications. However, it's important we strengthen our collective intelligence and reduce the barriers for companies that have been victims of cyberattacks. By sharing their experiences and lessons learned, we can build trusted networks and become smarter together," Assoc Prof Thinyane says. "At an individual level, we can do so much more to lower the risks of cybercrime. Basic 'cyber hygiene' should be instilled in everyone. This includes protecting our accounts with multifactor authentication, strong passwords, password managers, and being super vigilant around potential phishing attacks and scams."

As cyber threats become more sophisticated and lucrative, and artificial intelligence (AI) exposes the world to more security risks, the challenges are mounting. AI is proving a double-edged sword – helping bad actors to disrupt systems but also allowing authorities to strengthen digital security.

"The genie is out of the bottle. All of us are increasingly using digital technologies and devices with sensors and processing ability, such as wearable computers and smart home systems. While this benefits our lives, it also makes us far more vulnerable to being hacked." Ensuring that we only purchase safe and secure Internet of Things (IoT) devices, protecting them with strong passwords and multi-factor authentication, and keeping them regularly updated is part of basic cyber hygiene, Assoc Prof Thinyane says, but consumers are often lax about digital security.

"Think twice before clicking on that suspicious link or forwarding fake social media posts. Cyber criminals are very clever at exploiting human vulnerabilities and 82% of data breaches are linked to human factors, so we need to be very, very cautious. Digital technologies are here to stay, but for societies to thrive, we need to make our systems and data more secure, and we need to collectively become cyber resilient."

October 2023 is Cybersecurity Awareness Month, carrying the theme 'Be cyber wise – don't compromise'.

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Beyond Blue's top five tips to boost mental health

On World Mental Health Day, Beyond Blue is sharing mental health coaching tips to help people navigate everyday life stresses. NewAccess Mental Health Coach Gemma Danahay supports people using a low intensity CBT (Cognitive Behaviour Therapy coaching program, developed by Beyond Blue.

"More and more people are coming to me due to financial stress, as cost of living pressures escalate. The other main issues are relationship problems, work stresses, and grief and loss and sudden life changes," Ms Danahay, who works with Lives Lived Well in Queensland said. "I have found many people are looking for more than just someone to talk to, they want to walk away with practical suggestions. In mental health coaching, people receive proactive skills and tools to work on the problems affecting their mental health." Here are five practical coaching tips to help relieve stresses that can build up.

• Deal with problems one at a time - breakdown problems into bite-size pieces

• Notice common thinking traps – all or nothing thinking, self-blame, repetitive thinking

• Have realistic goals – make it achievable, it doesn't have to be perfect

• Balance is key - schedule pleasurable activities as well as work/family commitments

• Healthy habits - keep both body and mind healthy

"Part of coaching is also around relapse prevention, so any dips in mood are an opportunity to explore early warning signs and what helps the person feel better so that they know what to do with any future drops on the roller coaster of life," Ms Danahay said.

Beyond Blue's lead clinician Dr Grant Blashki says there are multiple benefits to using low intensity CBT and problem solving to support our mental health.

"These techniques are based on evidence and are shown to improve clinical outcomes for common mental health conditions like depression and anxiety. People who are using the skills are often able to reduce their negative thinking patterns, the severity of their symptoms, and find that they develop new coping skills that they can apply to other problems in their lives," Dr Blashki said.

"A structured approach helps people to stay focused on their goals and people often come away feeling quite empowered that they have some new strategies to manage common stresses in life. An added benefit is these are skills that are useful in relationships, in parenting, and even in a workplace context and help people to be able to zoom out and look at thoughts, feelings and actions in day-to-day situations."

Developed by Beyond Blue in 2013, NewAccess provides support for mild to moderate anxiety, depression, and life stresses, using specially trained and clinically supervised mental health coaches. It's free and doesn't require a GP referral.

"Mental health coaching is a valuable low intensity support option that helps people with every day common stresses and mental health issues before they develop into more severe mental health issues," Dr Blashki said. "When it comes to reforming Australia's mental health system, low intensity options are a critical piece of the puzzle."

Lemon Greek Yogurt Pound Cake

yield: 1 9-INCH LOAF *prep time:* 15 MINUTES *cook time:* 1 HOUR



additional time: 7 MINUTES

The perfect lemon cake every home baker needs in their recipe collection!

Ingredients

- 1¹/₂ cups all-purpose flour (180g)
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 cup (2 sticks) butter, softened at room temperature
- 1 cup sugar, (200g) plus ¹/₃ cup (67 g) for glaze
- zest of two lemons
- 4 eggs- room temperature
- 2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract
- ¼ cup lemon juice for cake (2 oz), plus ¼ cup (2.6 oz) for syrup and 2 tablespoon for glaze
- 1/2 cup greek yogurt (143 g)
- ½ cup powdered sugar (50g)

Instructions

- 1. In a small bowl whisk together the flour, baking powder and salt. Set aside.
- In the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with a paddle attachment (or you can use a hand mixer,) cream the butter, lemon zest and cup of the sugar until smooth.
- 3. Add the eggs one and a time followed by the vanilla. Slowly add the dry ingredients and mix until almost combined. Fold in the lemon juice and yogurt, finish mixing on low until combined. (Batter won't be perfectly smooth but that's Ok.)
- 4. Pour batter into a buttered/floured 9 inch loaf pan. Bake at 325F for 60-70 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean.
- 5. For the Syrup:

Stir together ¼ cup of lemon juice and ¼ cup sugar until sugar has dissolved.

6. For the Glaze:

Gradually add the lemon juice to the powdered sugar until desired drizzling consistency is reached. Add more juice/sugar as needed until it's as thick as you like.

7. To Finish:

Turn the warm cake onto a wire rack and poke all over with a fork or skewer. Brush generously with the lemon syrup. (Do this when the cake is still warm!) Pour the glaze over the top. Serve warm or room temperature.
