More than 1,000 Barraba locals will have their voices heard by the government after Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson lodged a petition on their behalf. The petition calls on the government to address the doctor shortage in Barraba, following the sudden loss of two GPs in August.

"The loss of GP services was deeply distressing for the Barraba community, a town with a population over 1,500," Mr Anderson said. "The town has been without a doctor for some time, and there's been a concerted effort by everybody in the region to try and attract a new permanent doctor to Barraba. It's an ageing population and residents are rightly concerned about a lack of local medical coverage, which is why I recently meet with the community and accepted their petition which calls on the government to fix the situation. I have tabled that petition in parliament, which means the Minister for Health and Regional Health will be required to take note of the community's concerns and respond. It's up to the State Government, the Federal Government, and the Local Health District to work together to find a doctor for Barraba and I expect them to do that. In the meantime, I'll continue to do what I need to do to support the community, keeping them updated on any information as it is made available and supporting their efforts to attract doctors to Barraba."

Mr Anderson also met with the Rural Doctors Network in Parliament this week to discuss the situation in Barraba, and moved a motion in parliament, calling on the Government to immediately address the shortage of doctors in Barraba. 

#### History Notes

A successful Market held on Saturday although a few usual helpers were

unavailable -thank you to those who came and helped out. There will be another market next week based on second hand books - we are hoping with low prices we will be able to clear a lot of volumes. There will be a few other excess items on sale as well. Some of the normal stallholders will also be present with their wares.

A number of our members are busy with medical appointments and working on other projects so the advertised Annual General Meeting has now been moved to Melbourne Cup day to attract more members. The street stall is still on its advertised day.

As far as history goes I have again turned to the newspaper notes that past secretary, Betty Crowley, had collected. There was a blacksmith's shop in the centre of town in the early 1900's. The shop was owned by George Cutmore and was close to his home in the area of today's library.

Mr Muir worked the shop with his staff including Bill Blackall (brother of Harry), and Pat Kelaher who was a brother of Bert and Dan Kelaher. The staff were kept busy with railway workers bringing their draught horses in to be shod. The horses were used to pull small drays which were used for excavating railway hill before building the railway station and sheds. Apparently, the hill was originally part of the travelling stock route before the train arrived!

The blacksmith's shop was also attending to old damaged cart wheels. The old metal tyre had to be removed and then a new one was heated by packing it with bark and lighting the bark. When it was red hot it was handled with big metal pinchers and hammered on to the wooden wheel. The wheel was then spun around in a water trough to cool it off. In dry weather cart wheels would shrink and the metal rim would come loose. Apart from the blacksmith business Mr Cutmore ran a carrying business from Manilla.

This article also mentions Fred Pearce's baker's shop on the northern side of the blacksmith's shop. This shop was destroyed in the 1898 fire and the baker also lost his flour although it had been stacked in the middle of Queen Street for safety. After the fire the baker rebuilt his shop, suffering a broken leg when he fell off a ladder. Finally he got back to work but he appears to have retired by 1908/9 and the shop was pulled down.

This little section of history was printed about 1910 and lists several other businesses of interest. More next week.

#### Pop-up Campdraft

When opportunities present themselves, you just need to grab them with both hands!

A large mob of cattle on the road not far from Barraba with Drover, Brian Glendinning in control, were offered to us to run a campdraft and at the same time, we wanted to help Peter Turner with ongoing medical expenses so we quickly put together a pop up campdraft for 23 and 24 September.

We kicked off Saturday morning with the Novice A Campdraft, where 155 competitors greeted the judge Mr Peter Grills. Local Ned Croll on Elusive Acres and Tamworth lady Dale Lyons on Wicked Time led the field into the final later in the afternoon, both scoring 88.

Novice B Campdraft was next on the card with 158 entrants putting their best foot forward for the judge Mr Steven O'Brien. Upper Horton competitor Hayden Turnbull on Crafty had an impressive round to score 90 to lead the first round.

25 Junior entrants were kept under control by the judge Mr Gavin White. There was some brilliant cattle sense on display with the kids which was enjoyable to watch with all ribbons going to competitors from Upper Horton and Bingara! Alex Thompson on Dilemma stole the blue ribbon with a whopping 92 points from brother Blake Thompson on Hot Mist with a score of 90! Hamish Mason and Heaven came in 3rd on 89 while Alex Thompson also collected 4th on One Moore Chance with 88 points and Fred O'Brien on Lolly wrapped up the lineup on 83 points.

The 41 Juvenile competitors were next up showing their style to judge Mr Steven O'Brien where Arki Shearer and Elegant Playgirl sealed the win with 88 points. Equal 2/3/4 was shared between Corbin Latham on Peaches, Beau Rossiter on Lexie and Arki Shearer on Annie Moore, all scoring 87 while equal 5th was shared between Max Shearer

on Kath and Ruby Turnbull on Hermione both scoring 86 points.

Novice A final had some more brilliant rounds but none better than Tim Hollis from Walcha on Jdee who put together 2 solid rounds giving him an aggregate of 175 points and the win! Equal 2nd was shared between Andrew Chapman on Passion and Adam Pollock on Mistress both scoring 173. 4th place went to our committee man Ned Croll on Elusive Acres scoring 172 while 5th was collected by local Paul Turner on Hawkeye with 166 points.

Novice B final did not disappoint with more great runs, including Andrew Chapman from Tamworth on Playin Smooth scoring 177 points for the win. Joel Mace and Dealmaker came in 2nd with 176, while equal 3rd was split between Colin Mather on Cee Jay and Rick Cruckshank on Coolga both scoring 174. Ian Colwell and Conduct came in 5th with 171 points.

The start of Maiden A saw 40 competitors push through before the sun set on judge Mr Dean Turner. Saturday evening, we geared up for an auction to raise some money for Peter Turner. Thank you to Nicole Gillogly and her team for running a 100 club, a raffle and gathering the items that went under the hammer. A massive thank you to everyone who donated items and those who purchased them. Kolbe Burns did a great job as auctioneer which saw us collect \$34,437 from the auction, plus all the other donations and an extra \$15,000 from our committee enabled to pass on \$56,081.20. A mammoth effort for a wonderful man who we wish all the best during this challenging time.

Sunday morning saw the remaining 80 competitors have their turn before a 3 way runoff was needed to secure the win. Local Phil Main and Connie came up trumps with 176 points, Bindy Spreadborough and Outis scored 175 points for 2nd while Sam Cannington and Fox came in 3rd with 110. Equal 4th was split between Brian Glendinning on Two Strings, Emma Johnston with Playmore Proper Impressive, Peter King on Queen of Chic, Kendal MacTavish on Redleif Double Up, Michael Maytom on Cliffy, Jess Rapley on Peppy's Timekeeper and Scott Sinclair on Dream all scored 87 points.

Maiden B saw Mr Gavin White crack the whip 130 times before Manilla lady Julie Duff on GI's Kitten D'Amour smoked a 92 point run for the win! Ben Maytom and Solar Twiggy were nearby with 91 points while 3rd was shared between Carol Clarke on Connor Mooregregor, Lindsay Duff on Kylandra Spider, Martin Edwards on The Quaker and Rick Cruckshank on Doris Day all scoring 90 points.

The Open Campdraft was the last on the program where Mr Ben Maytom oversaw 107 runs. Ben Rossiter on Georgie took the lead heading into the final with a 91 but with scores of 88 and up in the final, it was anyone's game. Committee man Warren Lavender and Lavender Malabu took the win with 178 points narrowly ahead of Ben Rossiter and Georgie who had 177 points! 3rd went to Peter King and Connie with 175 points while 4th was shared between Tahnika Fuit on Tik Tok On The Clock and Peter Grills with Traveller, both scoring 171 points.

#### Here is an overview of outcomes from Tamworth Regional Councils Ordinary Meeting on Tuesday 10<sup>th</sup> October 2023:

Councillors granted Development Consent to a Development Application (DA) for the Expansion of an Existing Horse Training Facility on Spains Lane in Kingswood. Councillors had previously deferred the determination of this DA to allow for further consultation with the applicant and affected residents. A report on the DA was presented to Councillors which contained an amended list of conditions of consent. Councillors were satisfied that all issues had been addressed in enough detail to warrant removal of condition 8, limiting the initial consent period to five years.

Following community consultation of the draft plans, Councillors adopted the updated Drought Management Plan and Demand Management Plan

The Demand Management Plan focuses on how we can conserve water in the future by continuing water efficiency assessments, water rebates as well as the maturing of the Community Awareness Programs through supporting Water Night, continuing seasonal media campaigns, increasing focus on non-residential water efficiency and improving accuracy of water consumption data through the installation of smart water meters in properties across the LGA. The installation of the meters is supported by the upcoming rollout of the water portal which will enable customers to understand their own water usage.

The Drought Management Plan focuses on managing our water as we head into, and during, drought. It contains the trigger levels where water restrictions will be introduced at each of the centres Council provides reticulated water to and the details of what water can and can't be used for under each level of restriction.

#### Key changes include;

Permanent Water Conservation Measures which were included in the former Drought Management Plan have been replaced with Everyday Waterwise Guidelines now included in the new Demand Management Plan.

#### The new Everyday Waterwise Guidelines are:

Only water the garden before 10 am or after 4 pm.
 This avoids watering during the hottest part of the day, when water wastage and evaporation is high.

- Trigger nozzles to be used on all handheld hoses.
   Trigger nozzles provide more control over water flow and reduce wastage.
- Avoid hosing down hard surfaces, such as concrete, paths and driveways. Use a broom, leaf blower, or if water is required, use a high-pressure cleaner or water efficient nozzle.

Council will no longer supply backwash water, which is a byproduct of the treatment process at the Calala Water Treatment Plant to customers when Tamworth and Moonbi Kootingal move to level 4 or level 5 restrictions. Once these restrictions have been introduced backwash water will be returned to the treatment plant for retreatment. This will offset some demand for raw water and help conserve the raw water supply we have for as long as possible.


With seasonal conditions worsening across the region and many parts of country NSW quickly sliding into drought, Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall has today called on the State Government to immediately initiate drought support measures to assist farmers and rural communities. Mr Marshall said memories of the worst drought in living memory, several years ago, were still raw for the region's primary producers and now was the time for government to assure them they will be supported if the big dry returns.

"Conditions are worsening quickly, some areas are already officially in drought and the outlook looks bleak, but we are still yet to hear anything from the government, nor the Agriculture Minister, about what support will be available to farmers and rural communities," Mr Marshall said.

"During the last drought, more than \$2.4 billion was provided via subsidies and rebates to farmers and rural communities to help them sustain their businesses and keep going. At this time of great stress and worry, government must step up and announce what they will do to provide certainty and comfort to the rural sector, should the bleak forecasts come to reality."

Mr Marshall placed a motion on Parliament's notice paper today acknowledging the worsening conditions across rural and regional NSW and calling on the government to act immediately. "Farmers want some reassurance from their state government that they will be supported if severe drought returns," Mr Marshall said. "They want to see the government immediately reinstate drought transport subsidies, which allows farmers to claim back some of the costs associated with the transport of vital fodder to keep stock alive, as well as the popular water infrastructure rebates. More low-interest loans, via the Farm Innovation Fund, is not the answer when drought bites—the rural sector requires direct rebates and subsidies to help sustain agricultural production.

The time for government to act is right now, not after the whole State has tumbled into another devastating drought and farmers are going out the back door."
