<u>"STEPPING ON" - FALLS PREVENTION PROGRAM</u> Free community program for seniors, men and women – enrol now!

This is a fun program for over sixty-fives designed to keep you active, improve your strength and balance and keep you independent as you age. Run by Deb Cunningham from Tamworth Community Health Centre, it runs for just two hours on a Monday morning for seven weeks.

The sessions combine gentle exercise, and really interesting input from a physiotherapist, an occupational therapist, a podiatrist, and a pharmacist.

Tamworth Regional Council Pensioner and Hardship rebate 10 January 2024

As part of our ongoing communication around the special rate variation proposal, we wanted to share more information about our <u>pensioner rebates and hardship</u> <u>policies</u> which were on public exhibition in December and January. These policies were reviewed in response to feedback received during the community consultation period, recognising the need for adequate financial assistance options.

Our Councillors agreed to increase the rebate for ratepayers who receive an Australian Government pension/income support payment. The rebate will be \$50 in addition to the State Government Funded existing rebate in the first year if a Special Rate Variation is approved and enacted, and \$100 in the second year of the Special Variation and continue ongoing.

This has been formalised in our Ratepayers Pensioner Policy, which outlines the additional options for support and flexibility for eligible pensioners with regards to property debt incurred for their principal place of living.

The other document that has been on public exhibition is the <u>Ratepayers</u> <u>Hardship Policy</u>, which is to ensure equity to all ratepayers whilst assisting those experiencing financial hardship, and to ensure property debt is reduced consistently over time.

The intention is to encourage those facing hardship to reach out to our staff so they can try and find flexibility to accommodate individual circumstances.

Now the exhibition period has closed, Councillors will review any feedback and formally adopt the policies at an upcoming meeting.





Simon, dearly loved only son of Diana Simms and stepson of Karl Letzner, died suddenly of heart failure at his home in South Australia 9/11/2023. In the 1980s Simon lived on and off with his parents in the Horton valley. He played cricket for the Upper Horton Cricket Club and was invited as guest singer and guitarist to perform on occasion at the Upper Horton Club. In 1987 – 1988 Simon lived with his father Reno in London. During the day he worked for his father renovating mews cottages and by night he sang and played electric guitar at many London venues with a group of Aussie musicians. When he returned to Australia he formed a classic rock band in Adelaide and named the group of which he was lead singer and electric guitarist 'OLD NO. 7'. In 2010, Simon worked for Diana & Karl at Barraba Rural Traders for 12 months, keeping the customers entertained with his friendly quick wit and keen sense of humour. On returning to Adelaide he was employed for many years as a diesel mechanic and had recently been promoted to workshop manager. Simon was also a skilled online race car and multi gaming competitor. He had a great love of motor bikes, owning 4 or 5 bikes from a very early age, his favourite and most recent being a Triumph Daytona. Simon passed away suddenly after signing off for the night from his online gaming friends. He is survived and sadly missed by Diana, Karl, sister Michelle, Reno, Uncles and Aunt, cousins, his employers and work mates, 'OLD No.7' band members, and his online gaming and Facebook friends.

History Notes

Substituting for Margaret Currell for a week or two, I thought I would do some Barraba "Car Stories". First, I spoke to Ron Hiscock – here's a bit of his story. Thank you, Ron for sharing with us.

Ron, who turned ninety last year, became a mechanic because of a toothache!

In 1955, Ron was working as a farmhand on "The Oaks", the McKid property. "Archie McKid was a hard taskmaster," Ron told me. Ron was allocated a small room at the back of the main house; he was aroused before daylight to bring in and milk the cows and his work day often went to after dark. "My life was made a little easier by Mr McKid's two unmarried sisters," Ron said. They also lived at The Oaks; they would save helpings of dessert and homemade cakes and biscuits for him to eat after work.

One Tuesday evening, after he finished work about 6 pm, Ron decided he would go to the movies (the Empire Theatre was in full swing then) in Barraba. He hopped on his push bike, rode into Barraba, and settled in the theatre with a bag of sweets. "Ouch" – Ron shot out of his canvas chair, the pain in one of his teeth excruciating. He went to spend the night at his parents' house; none of the cures his mother or his uncle tried helped. Next day Ron was up very early to pedal back to work. His mother took one look at his swollen face and said "You can't go to work like that; you must go to the dentist," and walked around to Mr Pringle the dentist's place. Ron was told to front up at 8.15 am, at which point Mr Pringle put his knee on Ron's chest and yanked out the offending tooth.

Ron then hopped on his bike and pedalled back to The Oaks. It was after 9 am when he arrived. Mr McKid was furious – where had he been when there was urgent work to be done? Ron tried to explain, but it was useless. The young Ron had had enough of that job; he went into his quarters, picked up his belongings, strapped them on his bike, and rode off with a "I'm finishing up now" leaving behind a protesting Mr McKid.

When Ron got home, he was filled with dread – he now had no job; what would he tell his father? It was Wednesday – his father would be back on Saturday afternoon. He looked through the pages of the latest Barraba Chronicle – there was an advertisement placed by White's Garage: "Wanted – a Bowser Boy"! Ron fronted up first thing next morning; Scotty White, the Proprietor, asked him his name, surmised he was one of the local Hiscock lads, and told him he could start next day. So, Ron was able to tell his father when he arrived home on Saturday that he had left his employment with the McKids but he now had another job.

Love scrambles the brain and scientists can now tell us why

Love is blind, the saying goes, and thanks to a world-first Australian study, we are now a step closer to understanding why. It is well known that romantic love changes the brain, releasing the so-called love hormone oxytocin, responsible for the euphoria we feel when falling in love.

Now, researchers from the ANU, University of Canberra and University of South Australia have measured how a part of the brain is responsible for putting our loved one on a pedestal in that first flush of romance. In the world's first study investigating the link between the human brain's behavioural activation system (BAS) and romantic love, researchers surveyed 1556 young adults who identified as being "in love". The survey questions focused on the emotional reaction to their partner, their behaviour around them, and the focus they placed on their loved one above all else.

It turns out that when we are in love, our brain reacts differently. It makes the object of our affections the centre of our lives. ANU lead researcher and PhD student Adam Bode says the study – recently published in the journal Behavioural Sciences – sheds light on the mechanisms that cause romantic love. "We actually know very little about the evolution of romantic love," Bode says. As a result, every finding that tells us about romantic love's evolution is an important piece of the puzzle that's just been started. It is thought that romantic love first emerged some five million years ago after we split from our ancestors, the great apes. We know the ancient Greeks philosophized about it a lot, recognising it both as an amazing as well as traumatic experience. The oldest poem ever to be recovered was in fact a love poem dated to around 2000 BC."

University of Canberra academic and UniSA Adjunct Associate Professor, Dr Phil Kavanagh, says the study shows that romantic love is linked to changes in behaviour as well as emotion. "We know the role that oxytocin plays in romantic love, because we get waves of it circulating throughout our nervous system and blood stream when we interact with loved ones," Dr Kavanagh says. "The way that loved ones take on special importance, however, is due to oxytocin combining with dopamine, a chemical that our brain releases during romantic love. Essentially, love activates pathways in the brain associated with positive feelings."

The next stage of the research involves investigating the differences between men and women in their approach to love, and a worldwide survey identifying four different types of romantic lovers.

"For producers, making selection decisions based on the genetic potential of an animal can help accelerate genetic gain and is the cornerstone of profitability and sustainability," Ms Johnston said.

"But understanding how to leverage genetic tools in production can be overwhelming due to the complexity of it. With this podcast, my aim is to remove that barrier and provide listeners with the confidence to explore and utilise these tools effectively, in an easy to follow, conversational style."

New land values published for North West Regional NSW

The NSW Valuer General has published land values for the North West Regional NSW Region. The land values reflect the value of land only, as at 1 July 2023.

Land value is the value of the land only. It does not include the value of a home or other structure. Property sales are the most important factor valuers consider when determining land values.

The new land values will be used by Revenue NSW to calculate land tax for the 2024 land tax year for landowners that are subject to land tax.

Registered land tax clients will receive their land tax assessment from Revenue NSW from January 2024. More information on land tax can be found at <u>revenue.nsw.gov.au</u>.

North West NSW Region local government areas

Gunnedah, Gwydir, Liverpool Plains, Moree Plains, Narrabri, Tamworth Regional and Walgett.

General overview

The total land value for the North-West region increased by 19.7% between 1 July 2022 and 1 July 2023 from approximately \$36 billion to \$43 billion.

Residential land values across the region experienced a moderate increase of 5.4%. The strong increase in Narrabri (22.1%) was attributable to growth in commercial and industrial sectors.

Commercial land values across the region experienced a strong increase of 10.1%. There were strong increases in Narrabri (14.3%) with good demand for local goods and services underpinned by mining and infrastructure projects and a continuing strong rural sector.

Industrial land values across the region experienced a strong increase of 20.8%. The very strong increase in Narrabri (86.9%) was driven by the expanding coal and gas mining industries, the Inland Rail Project which is currently under construction, and strong agricultural sector.

Rural land values across the region experienced a strong increase of 23.8%. The strongest increases in Walgett (61%) and Moree Plains (44.2%) were attributable to stronger demand for cultivation country given the stronger returns for cropping. In addition, a very wet season in late 2022 added to the appeal and presentation of properties in the more marginal rainfall areas across the region.

The January Q3 Waste Vouchers are now available for residents to dispose of up to 2 cubic metres of non-recyclable bulky household waste for FREE (some limits apply).

Residents who are signed up to the digital service should see the voucher in their account automatically.

WHAT DOES A WASTE VOUCHER ALLOW?

Residents are required to PRE-SORT their load into recyclable materials and other waste types. The waste voucher covers the bulky items to be recycled and the remaining landfill items that are within the permitted volumes and/or quantities.

• One voucher allows for you to dispose of up to 2 cubic meters of non-recyclable bulky household waste or listed items below that attract a charge and/or have capped limits.

- Domestic clean construction and demolition materials e.g. brick, tile and concrete (Clean means free of rubbish, soil, grass, wiring, plastic, timber or metal)

- Metal waste
- E-waste
- Community Recycling Centre items
- Green waste

- A maximum of 2 car/4WD/motorcycle tyres will be allowed per voucher. Any additional tyres will be charged the appropriate fee.

- A maximum of 1 mattress will be allowed per voucher (no matter what size). Any additional mattress will be charged the appropriate fee.

- A maximum of 2 solar panels will be allowed per

waste voucher. Any additional solar panels will be charged the appropriate fee.

WHAT DOESN'T A WASTE VOUCHER ALLOW?

- Vouchers CANNOT be used for disposal of Asbestos. A Waste Disposal Permit is required

- Vouchers CANNOT be used for Clean fill. A Waste Disposal Permit is required.

- Waste from a Commercial premises.

- Vouchers CANNOT be used for disposal of residential waste utilising a Skip bin service.

LIFE-SAVING DEFIBRILLATOR GRANT OPEN

The NSW Government's life-saving Local Sport Defibrillator Grant Program has returned, and local sport clubs and organisations are encouraged to apply for grants of up to \$3,000. Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson said it was critically important that local sporting clubs and organisations were prepared for the unlikely scenario that a player, or a spectator goes into cardiac arrest.

"We love our sport, and it's great to travel around the region and see our sporting fields a hive of activity over the summer months," Mr Anderson said. "While we love our sport, we also know that strenuous activity can increase our risk of heart attack, which is why it's important that we are prepared. A defibrillator can be the difference between life and death because medical experts tell us that the first eight minutes following cardiac arrest are critical to saving a life. That's why I've always been a big supporter of the Local Sport Defibrillator Grant Program. In Tamworth, we know how critical these defibrillators can be after a life was saved on a local sporting field in 2016. It can happen to anyone, at any time, which is why I'm keen to see every sporting and recreation grounds have one on hand. If you're a local sporting club or organisation in need of a defibrillator, please get your applications in."

Applications for the Government's Local Sport Defibrillator Grant Program opened on 1 December 2023, and will close on 23 February 2024, or when the \$500,000 allocated to the program is exhausted.

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VETERANS COMPENSATION REFORM: MINISTER FAILS TO MEET ROYAL COMMISSION'S DEADLINE

A major overhaul of veterans' entitlements has hit a roadblock with the Labor Government failing to meet the end-of-year deadline to release draft new laws to harmonise and consolidate compensation claims. The very first recommendation of the Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide had specifically directed the government that "by no later than 22 December 2023, the Australian Government should complete drafting of the legislation".

Former Deputy Prime Minister and Shadow Minister for Veterans' Affairs, Hon. Barnaby Joyce MP, said there were over 347,000 veterans and dependents who had been promised priority action by the government to deliver on the Royal Commission's recommendations. "The 22 December came and went, then the end of the year came and went; and there is still no sign of the draft new laws. The year ended badly and started no better for those who want outcomes from the current government", Mr Joyce said. He said veterans' compensation entitlements were currently contained across three separate Acts often with different levels of assistance and eligibility.

"The former Coalition Government established the Royal Commission as we understood there was an urgent need to build confidence, trust and hope for current and future veterans and their families that they would be properly supported", Mr Joyce said. He said the Labor Government's inaction on their own commitment on veterans' reform was a direct result of veterans losing their voice at the Cabinet table where critical policy and funding decisions are made.

"The very first action of Mr Albanese when he became Prime Minister was to dump the Minister for Veterans Affairs from Cabinet. The position does not sit at the Cabinet table which means the Minister has to sit outside the door hoping someone in Cabinet will listen to him when trying to advocate for veterans", Mr Joyce said.

"We have no reason as to why the draft legislation has not been released and it has been close to a fortnight since it should have been, so I suppose we just have to put it down to incompetence "Mr Joyce said.
