# Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> August 2024



There will be a Vietnam War display at 111 Queen Street Barraba from today till the 15<sup>th</sup> of September to coincide with the battle of Long Tan (18<sup>th</sup> August). On Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> of August at 3pm at The Playhouse Theatre, there will be two Vietnam War documentaries. The first being *'How Vietnam was Lost'* an American 75 minute documentary with interviews from the Commander of Delta Company and other battle hardened veterans of Delta and what few remaining vets of Alpha. Speaking openly on the monumental blunders and decisions made by colonels and other top brass, resulting in major loss of American lives, in spite of warnings by company commanders that their battle plans were wrong.

The second documentary 'Entertaining Vietnam' is a 52 minute sometimes funny, sometimes sad, sometimes scary but always entertaining look at the mainly Australian performers, bands, singers, GOGO dancers and comedians who entertained the troops. As well interviews with them and news correspondents and nurses. Some couldn't finish a tour, others stayed for years, some were killed there.

Being able to deliver Royal Life Saving courses locally, we find ourselves in a unique position compared to other councils. Jill and I have a wealth of experience we want to impart on the right person. The Barraba Pool is the jewel in the crown of TRC's swimming facilities. It needs somebody who wants to learn its quirky ways, maintain it, grow it to suit the swimmers and most importantly, just love it. In the last two months we've found two young people in Tamworth who are now qualified lifeguards and enrolled in a Certificate IV in Community Recreation. We want the same in our other towns.

Like many of you, I'm over social media. It doesn't put me in touch with the people I need to talk to. A huge thank you to Bronwyn and the Community College for letting me get my message to you. # History Notes

What a wonderful day it was at the markets on Saturday-stalls everywhere and quite a lot of people shopping, listening to Martin's music and chatting to their fellow shoppers. There was a wide variety of stalls including plants for the garden, household goods, jams, honey and of course food just waiting

to be eaten. Our next market day will be at the same time as Frost and there should be a crowd of people around with lots of different things to see and do -a good time to practice a " Back to Barraba" weekend before the clock celebrations in November.


I was interested to read this week about the visit of members of the Fuller family to Barraba recently. Some years ago, one of their descendants visited our town for some reason - possibly to bring something back to Barraba - and I certainly remember meeting her for a chat and chatting about the Fuller family.

At the markets on Saturday I met up with Mr & Mrs Strand. Dennis is a direct descendant of George Thompson, a miner and resident of Woodsreef and is busy tracing this large family. The original George Thompson was born in Cumbria in the United Kingdom. He came to Australia in the early 1830's and a few years later he married Jane Harpur/Harper in the Bateman's Bay ar ea. The young couple soon moved north in search of work, settling on mining in the Barraba/Bingara area. Their first two children were daughters born in the Bundarra/Kingstown area before they moved to the Bingara area. After quite a few years at Top Bingara it seems that they moved to Woodsreef.

An old account book from Piedmont shows that Jane worked at Piedmont for a couple of months and we also know that a member of the Strand family owned the Hotel at Gulf Creek when it was burnt to the ground under suspicious circumstances in the early 1900's. However, the Thompson family have stayed in this broad area of New South Wales and produced dozens of descendants, many living in this area of New South Wales.

Finally, this week I have been asked to look in the Witten Diaries for a reference about the erection of the town clock. There could have been a reference, particularly as Arthur Witten lost a son in World War. However, the diaries are full of farm work, mustering sheep, trapping rabbits and not a mention of the clock, even on the very day the clock was dedicated.

### This National Bullying No Way Week (12-16 August)

Triple P (Positive Parenting Program) is reminding the community how crucial it is to help children stay safer online and stop cyberbullying before it impacts a child's life. Carol Markie-Dadds, Triple P International Country Director, highlighted the urgency of this issue, noting Triple P's largest-ever survey of parents and carers found that 8 out of 10 parents are concerned about keeping their children safe from online dangers like cyberbullying. Of further concern, parents with children aged 6-11 years are the least confident in their ability to know what to do if their child is getting bullied.

"Bullying, whether it's online through text or social media, or in person, has a significant impact on children's emotional and physical health, and puts children at greater risk of mental health concerns, like anxiety or depression," Ms Markie-Dadds said. "This national week of action is a timely reminder that parents and carers play a key role in preventing and helping their children respond to bullying in all its forms. With the increasing prevalence of bullying online, parents can help kids develop the knowledge, skills, and awareness they need to navigate the online world confidently and safely. It takes time and practice for children to learn how to spot potentially unsafe situations, make good decisions, and know when to speak to a trusted adult if something worrying happens. Having honest and regular conversations with our kids makes a big difference in helping children develop these skills at home, in school, and in the wider community."

#### Triple P's Top Three Ways to Talk to Kids about Cyberbullying

#### Start the conversation

You don't always have to have long, serious talks about cyberbullying. Casual, frequent chats work well too. With younger kids, keep it simple and talk about being kind online. With tweens and teens, respect their need for more privacy and show interest in their online activities, encourage them to consider the impact of their messages, to respect others' differences, and to expect the same for themselves.

#### Help kids feel prepared

"What if" scenarios help kids feel prepared to handle tricky situations. For younger children, you could ask them how they would feel if a stranger tried to message them while they were playing a game online. Discuss what they could do, like telling a grown-up about the message. With teens, you could talk about how they would feel if they saw hurtful comments about a classmate on social media and explore ways they could respond. Be open to their opinions and ideas.

#### Create a calm, supportive space

Kids often feel embarrassed or scared to talk to their parents about things happening online, especially if they think they'll get in trouble. Tell them it's okay to feel afraid or worried, and they won't get in trouble for coming to you. Stay calm and let them know you're available to listen and help, no matter what.

"If there are concerns that your child is being bullied online, you can seek help from your school, eSafety (www.esafety.gov.au) or Kids Helpline (www.kidshelpline.com.au). Bullying can seriously impact a child's mental health and wellbeing throughout their school years and well into adulthood," Ms Markie-Dadds says.

"It can be a daunting issue, but it's important that parents can confidently manage and have oversight over what social media and other digital tools their children are accessing. Platforms, including online games, may initially appear innocuous, but could actually be used for bullying. A great first step is to talk with your child about bullying and online safety - It's never too early for schools, parents, carers, kids and the wider community to build their skills and awareness together," she said.

Triple P's free online parenting programs help anyone in a parenting role to confidently handle challenges and raise happy, capable, resilient kids. There's a free online program for raising kids aged 0-12, and another specifically for parents and carers of kids who are frequently anxious.

Delivery of the Triple P – Positive Parenting Program to parents and carers of children in Australia is supported by funding from the Australian Government Department of Health and Aged Care under the Parenting Education and Support Program. Parents and carers can access free, online parenting support 24/7 at triplep-parenting.net.au




### **Golf Notes**


An excellent 32 players enjoyed a glorious winter day of golf on Sunday. David York continues his rich vein of form combining with

The NSW RFS recognises that in many parts of the state our NSW RFS resources are supported by the use of private equipment, including Farm Fire Units (FFUs), to fight and contain fires.

Safety at fires is everyone's responsibility, and the NSW RFS is committed to working with property owners and community members to ensure we can manage fire together in a safe and coordinated way.

#### PREPARE

- Know your local Brigade and how to contact them.
- Have your PPE readily available during fire risk days.
- Ensure your farm fire unit is working, safe and legal.
- Check your pumps, hoses and firefighting equipment.
- Brigades should get to know their local landholders and their firefighting capacity.

#### COMMUNICATE

- If a fire starts, call Emergency Triple Zero (000).
- If safe to do so, assist and keep small fires small.
- Speak to the first arriving fire crew.
- Move to a local UHF channel as agreed, keep contact.

#### INTEGRATE

- Talk to Brigade Officers and share local knowledge. Collaborate on the plan.
- Inform firefighters about what's important to you on your property.
- Follow the plan and direction of firefighters to keep each other safe.
- Don't forget to tell someone if you leave the fireground, go home or go to get water.
- Brigades should keep FFU operators informed on operational and safety issues.
- Brigades and Incident Management Teams should seek input from landholders in the fire management process.



It's everyone's responsibility to keep each other safe on the fireground, including landholders, farmers and firefighters.
