## **History Notes**

This week I have been searching for the Upper Horton School's year of closure without success at this stage but it is amazing just what else can be found in a heap of paper cuttings.

Recently we have tried to assist with the Giddens family history and today I have found that Mrs. H. Giddens owned the Barraba newspaper during the First World War. Harry Newling bought the paper from her at the end of the war.

The list of owners of the Barraba newspapers through the years has been printed some years back but I had not noticed the Giddens name in there.

Looking through some other cuttings from the papers it seems that cars ran into bulls on the roads every now and again in the later part of last century, causing considerable damage and the paper plane managed to collapse its landing wheel while landing at Barraba - we do not have the luxury of an evening paper these days!

I notice that Council Amalgamation was in the news in 1974- it included all the local councils that have now been amalgamated in spite of all the objections that were put forward at the time - six local councils eventually were united in 2004.

Barraba has had several rather severe storms over the years - a windstorm removed the roof from the Victoria Hotel in 1977 and another storm in 1985 removed the grandstand roof and damaged several other buildings around the town including the school.

In 1968 the Commonwealth Bank built its new branch where the Post Office is now. This block of ground was the site of the Royal Hotel and had been vacant since the hotel was destroyed by fire in the 1930's. There is also a note in the 1972 paper referring to some misinformation about our town clock which will have to be found before November.

In July 1970, Barraba residents suffered from a flu epidemic- at one stage there were 36 people in hospital - I wonder how we would cope if that happened again.

Finally, perhaps I should mention that Rupert Richardson, President of the Barraba Shire for quite a few years decided to retire from the council in 1992 and, concentrate on his painting. Rupert was a good president and most amusing especially when he had to make a speech at the art show or some other function. He mostly began with a search of his pockets to find his notes but did not use them anyway!

## **2024-2025 ANNUAL DONATIONS PROGRAM**

**GUIDELINES** Tamworth Regional Council provides an opportunity once each year, for local charities, not-for-profit organisations and community groups to seek a contribution from Council to assist in the provision of their services to the Tamworth Regional Community. Council's priority is to provide assistance to projects and activities within the Tamworth Regional Council local government area. There is a total of approximately \$70,000 available funding.

**PROGRAM OBJECTIVES** The Annual Donations Program aims to:

- Support charities and volunteer organisations as well as community projects, events and activities which occur within the Tamworth Regional Council area (LGA), and are of benefit to the regional community;
- Foster or support new services, initiatives and resources which address the needs of the Tamworth regional community;
- Improve awareness, use and sustainability of community organisations and volunteer resources within the Tamworth LGA;
- Encourage increased participation in local community activities within the Tamworth LGA; and
- Ensure that community organisations that represent regional towns and villages are supported by Tamworth Regional Council.

**WHO CAN APPLY?** Applications are invited from not-for-profit organisations, charities, community groups and organisations located within the Tamworth Regional Council local government area, that provide a service to the Tamworth regional community which may be of a unique nature. Recipients of donation funding in previous years are welcome to reapply.

Organisations are eligible to apply for only one (1) donation per financial year, which is 1 July to 30 June.

Donations will not be made to individuals or organisations which operate on a for-profit (commercial) basis, or to branches of charities which fundraise for projects and activities outside Council's area of jurisdiction.

**SELECTION CRITERIA** To be considered for a contribution from the Annual Donations Program, applications should meet at least one of the Program Objectives outlined above. Applications should:

- Describe the project clearly;
- Show how the project will deliver a direct benefit to the Tamworth regional community;

- Demonstrate that the project is able to be managed and/or completed using the funding or part funding which may be provided; and
- For applicants who received a donation in 2020-2021, 2021-2022, 2022-2023 or 2023-2024 a completed Acquittal Form must be received, acquitting previous donations.

### **WHAT CAN DONATIONS FUNDING BE USED FOR?**

Examples of applications which have been supported, either in part or full, in the past include:

- Purchase of specific equipment and furniture;
- Funding for local activities and events, such as assistance with advertising, printing etc;
- Reimbursement of expenditure on Council fees, such as Development Applications, rates (excluding service charges), hire fees for use of Council facilities, including halls, parks and public buildings, banner fees;
- Hire of transport services, such as buses, for community activities; and
- Purchase of resources for use in community training programs and fundraising events.

### **SUBMISSIONS WHICH ARE UNLIKELY TO BE FUNDED**

It is unlikely that applications seeking support for the following type of projects will be supported:

- Requests for assistance with ongoing operational costs;
- Contributions to charitable activities on a state, national or international level; and
- Reimbursement of Council service charges, such as water, sewerage and garbage services.

**PLEASE NOTE:** Council does not guarantee funding for any application or to the full amount requested.

### **HOW TO APPLY FOR AN ANNUAL DONATION**

1. Visit 2024-2025 Annual Donations Program - Application Form;
2. Read the Guidelines carefully;
3. Complete the Application Form;
4. Ensure that copies of all required support documents are attached; and
5. Submit the completed Application Form and supporting documents to Council by the closing date.

**CLOSING DATE** Applications must be received at Tamworth Regional Council by 5:00pm on Monday, 30 September 2024. Late applications will not be considered.

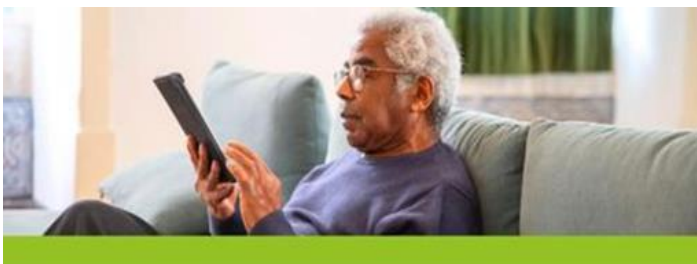

Saturday on Queen Street (7 Sept) will be busy with markets, stalls and live music. There are also satellite shows in venues along the way. There is plenty to do for children.

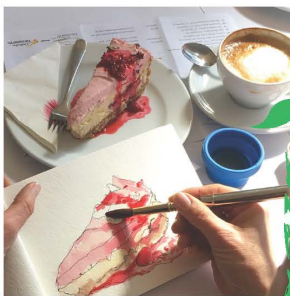
### Pipe Organ Concert

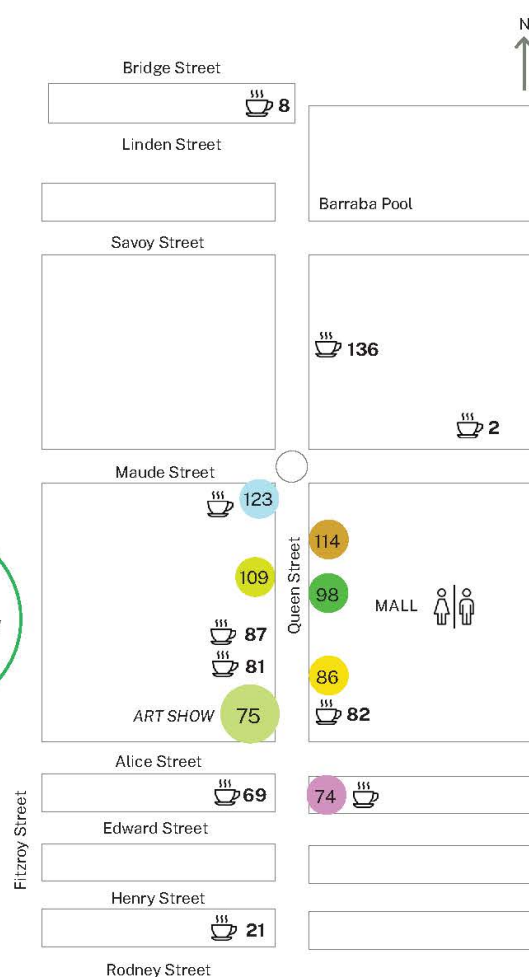
