Celebrate World Down syndrome day March 21st

About 1 in 1,100 babies are born Down syndrome in Australia.

Most children with DS go on to lead happy lives attending school and working in their community. Their lives are enriched by the support they receive just by being accepted and nurtured within their peers.

On March 21 World Down syndrome day is celebrated to create awareness among people who are not exposed to or have little knowledge of DS. Wearing blue and yellow or putting on a pair of bright crazy or odd socks is a great way to do this. Why? By doing this it starts a conversation and creates awareness so that DS can be understood by more people. Why socks ... the idea was created because socks are a similar shape to chromosomes and people with DS have a third copy of chromosome 21.

Expectant parents are screened for DS and sadly 90% of pregnancies are terminated in Australia. The main reasons for termination are due to concerns about the quality of life of the child and the siblings due to the extra care needed to raise a child with DS. Mostly terminating is due to misinformed pressure from health professionals given to the expectant parents.

Prenatal information

The Down Syndrome Federation provides support and information for expecting parents. The national 1300 number (1300 881 935) will connect you to your local state or territory Down syndrome organisation. Staff at the organisation can provide you with non-directive information and answer questions. They can also arrange for you to talk to a parent of a child with Down syndrome. www.downsyndrome.org.au

Down syndrome awareness is very close to my heart and our family was very lucky to experience it first hand through our son and brother Guy. I'm not sure how old I was when I realised Guy was different because he was my little brother and I loved him just the way he was.

Guy went to school, he learned to ride a horse, swim, recognise money, write his name he even had a job at the chemist. Guy loved music, footy but mostly he loved family and friends. You only had to say hello and you would be his friend. Although Guy had all these opportunities there were things out of his reach like driving, getting married and starting a family.

Guy was born at a time when DS was considered to be a curse. My parents experienced some very arrogant heartless health professionals who told them to leave him in care and forget about him. It was thought that choosing to raise a DS child was selfish and would burden the family and the other siblings. Not to mention the cost to society. Fortunately, Guy came home and was raised in a loving environment embraced by our community and accepted just the way he was.

I'm sure many of know and will remember Guy and his contribution to the community. He taught us empathy, patience and to never take for granted how lucky you are to live your best life and be free to make your choices.

Thankfully people with DS are not thought of as a burden as much now but health professionals are still putting pressure on parents to terminate.

In memory of my little brother I ask that on March 21 you put on odd socks or wear blue and yellow or even just take a few minutes to educate yourself about DS. There are so many positive stories about families that are blessed living with a loving kind Down syndrome child.

Guy made our family special. We were blessed. He is missed every day. His quirky humour, beautiful smile and kind heart. Guy was so loved by our family and his friends. Thank you to all the people who loved him and accepted him for the person he was.

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History Notes

History notes this week is likely to test the memories of some of our older folk. We have a number of street names honoring people who have contributed to Barraba e.g. Spencer, McDouall, Cambridge to name a few. Weigall Street is probably named after Francis Weigall, his daughter married Ted Garske, and he lived in Barraba for some years but I cannot find out what brought him to Barraba. Perhaps someone can help with some information about him and his wife Anne - they are both buried here.

Last week, one of our society members found a round ruler in the collection and did not know what it was-the only clue being it was with some old station records. I named it, much to her surprise, a ruler for keeping lines straight on plain paper in the last century. The ruler is usually round and the old ones are a shiny black. A quick check of the internet confirmed "a polished ruler" and there are a couple of pages telling the writer how to use it.



I don't remember my father or grandfather using the ruler to make lines for writing but it was always used at the bottom of a column of figures. It would also make a handy weapon as it is quite heavy and very strong.



The Dunnee one is 37 cms long and the Mayvale one about 30 cms although I have not measured it. Hopefully there

may be a photo of the short one with these notes.



Recently the Goldman family notes have been updated and a few dates and names added. A copy of the photo of a grave which is probably on the south side of Mount Kaputar has been added to the folder. The inscription is for a Samuel Goldman born in Hesse, North Germany in 1842 and died on 2ih May, 1898 at Thornfield. Could he have been the origin of the Goldman family in Australia or at least one of them. Andrew Goldman was the young man who 'lost it' when his wife died in childbirth on Mount Lindsay in 1864. Please let someone know if you can help especially with the original family.

QANTAS GRANT TAKES OFF


The region's not-for-profit community groups could climb to new heights thanks to the 2025 Qantas Regional Grants Program. The program, first launched in 2019, has supported 80 organisations across Australia, including organisations that have directly benefitted the Tamworth electorate.

Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson said Qantas was making \$2 million available to community groups across Australia, and he wanted the local community to get their fair share. "I'm always keen to help promote and support any grant that could benefit our regional and rural communities," Mr Anderson said. "We deserve to get our fair share of funding, and the Qantas Regional Grants Program is an opportunity for our community groups and not-for-profits to tap into another stream of funding. Recent recipients of this funding include the Tamworth Local Aboriginal Land Council who received funding in last year's round of the program to run an educational program for local aboriginal students. If any local groups have a project that is worthy of this funding, I encourage them to get their applications in before the deadline of the 10th of May 2025."

Grants can include a combination of cash, marketing support and flights according to the specific needs of each group. ANNUAL DONATIONS PROGRAM

(from the Mayor, Russell Webb)

Some of the major projects Council delivers for our community get considerable attention — and rightly so. However, we do have a range of smaller annual programs which get little notice but make a big positive grassroots impact. One of these is the Annual Donations Program for which the 2024/25 recipients were recently announced with 32 groups sharing \$66,800.25. Eight of them are from Barraba!

There were 44 applications from a diverse range of interest and volunteer groups across the Tamworth region. The Annual Donations Assessment Panel — comprising Councillors Marc Sutherland, Steve Mears and Ryan Brooke — assessed them. Amounts granted this year ranged from \$500 to \$4,000. The Annual Donations Policy also provides recurrent funding to a number of groups totalling \$72,050 as well as providing \$4,620 for 77 schools and pre-schools in our region. I thank all groups who support our community. We advertise when applications open, so please consider seeking a helping hand in the future.

Here is an overview of outcomes from Tamworth Regional Council Ordinary Meeting on Tuesday 11th March 2025:

Councillors tonight approved Councillor Marc Sutherland to attend the Closing the Gap - Partnership Working Group - Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Led Review Assembly as a spokesperson for Tamworth Regional Council. The Assembly will be held in Canberra from 1 – 3 April and aims to unite various Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community leaders, organisations, and experts to create proposals that will promote wider support for the Closing the Gap Agreement. All costs associated with attending the Assembly would be covered by the Coalition of Peaks.

As part of Council's ongoing commitment to Closing the Gap, Councillors tonight resolved to enter into a formal Partnership Agreement (previously named Memorandum of Understanding) with the Tamworth Aboriginal Community Controlled Organisations (TACCO). The partnership is the first of its kind in NSW and while not binding to either party, significantly relies on the ongoing commitments of both parties to work together to deliver Closing the Gap initiatives. To celebrate the significance of the Partnership

Agreement, a formal signing event will be held later this month.

- Eleven recommendations were passed at Council as part of the Local Traffic Committee Meeting minutes. Amongst these are safety improvements to the White and Carthage Street intersection that will be installed as part of the upcoming Carthage Street Rehabilitation Project. These improvements include new line marking and the repositioning of 'No Stopping' signs to improve the sight distance of the area when driving. There will also be a left-turn lane placed on Carthage Street for west bound traffic and as previously endorsed, a right-turn lane along White Street for north bound traffic.
- Tonight, Councillors received and noted the report on the free-entry pool days held across the Tamworth Region this summer. The report outlined that the 24 free entry days (held in total across the pools), saw a 64% increase in patronage in comparison to equivalent paid entry days. Considering additional staffing costs, loss of entry fee income and kiosk income, these days cost Council \$6883 but provided social benefits to the community. As such, a plan will be developed for inclusion of free-entry pool days next summer.
- As part of a multifaceted approach to water security, Council strongly supported a proposal by the NSW Government to temporarily increase the volume of water reserved in Chaffey Dam for Tamworth's use by approximately 7.1 gigalitres. The proposed change will mean a short-term change to the Peel Regulated River Water Source Water Sharing Plan which requires town water to be set aside in Chaffey Dam. Further detail about the proposal is laid out in the Council report, along with other longer term water security measures being considered by the state government.
- Councillors have agreed to continue to support the Curby soft plastics recycling program as it transitions to a permanent program which requires specific bags for easier identification and processing purposes. Council will use existing budgeted funds to pre-purchase 10,000 Curby program bags to aid residents' participation and will re-asses the program once the initial allocation of bags has been exhausted. A trial of the Curby program began in December 2022 and has diverted more than 21.3 tonnes of material from landfill.

BUSINESS NSW DEMANDS INSURANCE REFORM

The state's peak business body warns insurance premiums are spiralling out of control, with nearly 80% of businesses in NSW reporting double-digit increases over the past year. Business NSW's latest quarterly Business Conditions Survey reveals a staggering one in three businesses saw premiums rise by 30% or more — well above the 2.5% inflation rate for the year to January.

Regional Director Diane Gray said businesses in the New England North West are fed up with having the highest-taxed insurance premiums in mainland Australia. "Regional businesses are hurting as the NSW Government collects more through the Emergency Services Levy (ESL) and stamp duty," said Ms Gray. "Businesses are left to foot the bill or simply go without insurance and hope for the best. Many others have been totally rejected by insurance companies." In a separate Business NSW survey 64% respondents said they were not fully insured against catastrophic events. "This trend is very disturbing, leaving businesses exposed and demonstrates the urgent need for reform of the insurance industry." Ms Gray said

Ms Gray said insurance premiums have been the top financial concern for businesses for nearly two years. "The state and federal governments need to step up and do something now. Businesses are struggling because of rising premiums, and it's simply unsustainable. Many New England North West businesses now find themselves either uninsurable or unable to afford the soaring cost of insurance. You can't run a business when your premiums increase by 30% or more in a year. If we don't get this under control, the entire economy will feel the impact."

Other findings from the Business Conditions Survey for NSW and NENW include:

- The Business Confidence Index for NENW rose to 52.0 for the March quarter of 2025.
- 82% of businesses plan to maintain the same headcount or hire additional staff.
- More businesses are investing in technologies like Artificial Intelligence (AI) to boost productivity.
- More businesses now view regulatory requirements as excessive.
- Key factors that would boost business confidence in 2025 include further interest rate cuts, slowing inflation, easier access to skilled workers and stronger sentiment to buy locally.

Caramelised Chilli Pork with Cucumber Salad

From The free Range Butcher



This is a Donna Hay recipe which has been adapted by our friend Trish McPherson. Thanks Trish!

Ingredients:

- 650g Pasture Fed pork fillet, sliced
- 1 tbsp grated ginger
- 2 chilli, finely chopped
- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 2/3 cup brown sugar
- 1 tbsp fish sauce
- 2 tbsp lime juice
- Coriander
- Mint
- Cucumber
- Bean Sprouts
- Boiled rice to serve

Method:

- Make salad of thinly sliced cucumbers and bean sprouts (or whatever you are using) with chopped mint and coriander.
- Pan fry pork fillet until brown and nearly cooked then remove.
- Add soy sauce, fish sauce, lime juice, sugar and ginger to pan and cook until is sugar dissolved and starting to caramelise.
- Return pork to pan and reheat.
- Serve pork and sauce over salad with boiled rice.

Trish's tip: If you don't have bean sprouts you can use snow peas, sugar snaps or asparagus; just lightly steam and then refresh. Serves 6.
