Barraba SES on the job

On Sunday evening, 22nd June, a call-out was issued to multiple SES units requesting assistance with a land search for a missing person in the area between Pilliga and Wee Waa.

5.30am the following morning saw 4 members from Barraba heading west and arriving just in time for the briefing, along with members from other SES units, as well as RFS and VRA volunteers, the whole being overseen by Police Rescue.

Of particular interest was the new Side by Side vehicle which is currently being trialled, and which proved to be invaluable in this challenging terrain.

We were appointed to one of the three search teams which searched the scrub in line formation, scrambling over and through the undergrowth while looking for clues.

The search was over by 11am, when we were called back in to the search base, after which our 4 tired volunteers were happy to pile back into the vehicle for the long drive home.

The next day we were most gratified to receive an email from the Deputy Zone Commander who heartily congratulated all who participated, saying that this was the largest land search which the North Western Zone has participated in since its inception, and that the sea of orange SES uniforms was impossible to miss. He also said that our dedication, teamwork and professionalism made a real difference and showcased the best of what we can achieve when we work together.

Nandewar Historical Society Inc

History Notes

The notes last week on the Upper Horton village have raised some interest both about the school and the actual village history. We have an enquiry for a copy of the school centenary booklet published 42 years ago. It is a yellow coloured booklet with two photos on the cover - one depicts the early school building and the other a modern 1983 school. If anyone has a copy of this booklet that they no longer need, we have an Upper Horton descendant who would like it, just let the museum know or drop it in on a Friday morning.

The history of the Upper Horton village concerns almost the whole length of the Horton River from Kaputar to where it joins the Gwydir River near Elcombe. The river tends to be well known from where it enters the Horton Valley at the Horton Falls and winds down a widening valley, through miles of fertile slopes and plains to join the Gwydir on its way to the rich lands around Moree and beyond.

As mentioned last week, large areas of the Horton River plains were taken up by the early owners who paid managers to look after the stock. The Government Gazette in 1848 listed Currangandi, Pallal, Deradera, Rocky Creek, Ulumbarella, and Eulourie under names such as Cox, Lethbridge, Ogilvie, Pringle, Parnell but they rarely visited their property. It was in later years that families such as King, McDouall, Comber, Etheridge, Sharpe, Clayton, Carter, Caine, Spence, Goldthorpe and Jeffrey, began to appear in the old records and on the old maps.

These people needed the convenience of a village to supply food, mail etc. The roads out of the valley were very steep and rather dangerous - a trip to Barraba or Bingara in those early days also took many hours! The village started to be settled and there was great enthusiasm when the plan of the village was officially drawn up and a map produced - there were house blocks on both sides of the river and extending well beyond the present-day blocks!

It seems there was no actual cemetery at Upper Horton apart from the three now unmarked graves in a cultivation paddock. However, there are several private plots - the one beside the bridge being the most accessible and another just up the river in very real danger of falling into the river if it has not already done so.

Scammers targeting older Australians, Bendigo Bank warns

Bendigo Bank is issuing a warning that scammers may be targeting older Australians in fake term deposit scams. Head of Customer and Threat Protection at Bendigo Bank, Jason Gordon, says scammers are impersonating legitimate financial services businesses, with criminals offering fake investment opportunities in an attempt to lure would-be investors; and in particular those aged 65 and older; to transfer large sums of money to scammers.

"Term deposits are regarded as conservative and secure investment options. Scammers know this and try to leverage the risk profile of these investments for their own ends with fake investment opportunities that redirect your funds to their own bank account," says Mr Gordon. "Australians lose more to investment scams than any other scam type and retirees and those approaching retirement are often a target for term deposit scams and other kinds of investment scams," he says.

"Scamwatch says that many Australians aged 65 and older have retired and may be seeking investment opportunities, which may explain people in this age group reporting total losses to investment scams of \$66.6 million last year. Australians aged 65 and over had the highest overall reported losses to Scamwatch of \$99.6 million – almost one third of all losses reported last year. This cohort only makes up less than 20% of the population, so these disproportionate losses tell us that this is a targeted demographic, and that those over 65 should be extra cautious."

How are scammers targeting older Australians?

"A common way for scammers to capture contact information is through phony online advertisements promoting fake term deposits. By engaging with these advertisements on social media, through online chat interactions or by processing payments online, scammers can collect your details and make you a target," Mr Gordon says.

"Data breaches impacting companies that hold your personal information are another way your information can fall into the hands of scammers. Once they have your information, you may be contacted directly by the scammers, sometimes repeatedly and over prolonged periods of time, as they set up and execute the scam," he says.

Warning signs of a term deposit scam

Mr Gordon says these scams are often highly sophisticated and can resemble genuine offers from trusted organisations, but here are some signs it may be a scam:

1. Implausibly high returns

Fake term deposit or investment opportunities will often come with implausibly high interest rates, promised returns or guarantees. Always be sceptical if the offer is too good to be true and is markedly different to what reputable and reliable sources are able to offer.

2. Cold outreach or unexpected contact

Phone calls, emails or SMSs claiming to be from a financial services business should be treated with extreme caution – especially if you haven't dealt with them before.

3. A lack of digital footprint

Scammers deliberately impersonate businesses without much of an online presence to limit consumers' ability to compare their 'real' website with the scammers' fake one.

4. Mismatched details of the receiving bank account Any account you are transferring to should be in the same name of the relevant financial services business.

5. Time sensitive offer to 'invest now'

Pressure to act quickly, often using phrases like "last chance" or "exclusive opportunity."

How to stay protected

Mr Gordon says that scams are becoming more sophisticated, but there are ways we can act to protect ourselves and our loved ones. "Never click on links in unsolicited emails or messages about financial products. Bendigo Bank has removed all links from SMS messages, so customers who receive an SMS that includes a link should treat that as suspicious," Mr Gordon says. "We urge Australians to treat all unsolicited contact regarding investment opportunities as suspicious and do your own research or ask a friend or family member to help you look into the opportunity before you act," he says.

Bendigo Bank offers face-to-face education approach to help its customers and the community safely navigate digital banking. The 30-minute, standardised classes for customers and local community groups highlight the benefits and importance of getting digitally connected, staying safe and recognising and preventing scams and fraud. Customers are encouraged to enquire at their local Bendigo Bank.

What to do if you've been scammed

Mr Gordon's advice to customers who may have fallen victim to a term deposit or investment scam is to visit www.bendigobank.com.au/security immediately to report it and get support. "Encouragingly, people aged 65 and over were the most likely to report a scam in 2024, with more than 62,000 reports lodged to Scamwatch. Reporting scams is critical in helping telcos, internet service providers, banks and law enforcement put a stop to criminal activity," Mr Gordon says.

In Barraba - Rural North, 3.6% of the population earned an income of \$2,000 or more per week in 2021.

In Barraba - Rural North, 4.4% of households earned an income of \$3,000 or more per week in 2021.

The major differences between Barraba - Rural North's individual incomes and Tamworth Regional Council's individual incomes were:

- A larger percentage of persons who earned \$400 \$499 (16.6% compared to 9.0%)




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Your Shortcut to... The social media ban for U16 year olds

In less than 6 months, the Albanese Government's ban on social media for children under 16 year olds will come into effect. It's the first law of its kind to be passed in the world, but there are still a lot of questions over how exactly it'll work. So, in this Squiz Shortcut, we'll cover:

- what's in the legislation
- how it's meant to work
- and where the tech is up to

Last November, the federal government passed a law that will ban children under the age of 16yo from having accounts on social media platforms - ones like TikTok, Instagram, X, Snapchat and Facebook, plus a few others.

Why is there a need for this?

The main stated reason for introducing the new law is to protect children's mental health and wellbeing because of the potentially harmful content they're exposed to online.

How will it work?

Top line: you'll have to be 16 or older to use the apps we mentioned. It'll come into effect on 10 December, and it will be up to the companies running the platforms to take reasonable steps to prevent kids from having an account.

So, to be clear - tech companies will bear the legal responsibility?

Yep, and that's an important point to note - the onus will be on the companies that run the apps to block children. So parents and kids won't be fined for breaching the rules if they find ways to get around the law (and, let's face it, there aren't too many kids who won't try)... And the fines are pretty hefty.

How much are we talking about?

They're designed to make the tech giants take the law seriously, so companies could be fined up to \$49.5 million for breaches if they don't demonstrate that they've taken 'reasonable steps' to put in place systems to identify and block underage users.

What are defined as 'reasonable steps'?

It's a bit of a grey area - that's why there's going to be a 12month grace period before penalties for non-compliance come in.

How will the companies identify underage users?

Well, there's going to have to be a way for the age of users to be verified by the tech platforms. The government's on a bit of a steep learning curve with this one - they've commissioned an independent software consultancy firm to carry out an Age Assurance Trial, and part of its remit is to test various types of age detection tech and work out how best to identify the age of users without impinging on their privacy. And it's proving to be tricky...

Why is that?

In practice, it requires anyone who uses social media to prove that they're older than 16yo to log in. A preliminary report from the trial released last week said that age detection tech does work and that it can be integrated into existing platforms and can also "support the safety and rights of children online". But the report didn't include details of what tests were undertaken or any specific results.

When will the full report be available?

It's due to be handed to Communications Minister Anika Wells at the end of next month... In the meantime, there are some other tests of similar tech going on, which have found that face-scanning technology, which is one method being tested, varies in its accuracy.

What were the results?

A recent ABC report about the tech said children aged 15 were misidentified as being in their 20s and 30s, and that it could only guess the age of school students within an 18-month range in 85% of cases...

That's led to some experts raising concerns about whether the tech is up to the job. One of those is Lisa Given, a Professor of Information Sciences at RMIT, who told the ABC she doesn't think the social media ban is viable. She says that 85% accuracy is "quite low" and that "an 18-month range is significant when you're trying to identify a very particular age grouping".

So, the ban could affect all people, not just young people? Yep, under the new law, the apps will likely also require adults to demonstrate their ages before they log in, which opens up a whole lot of questions and concerns over privacy. Concerns have been raised about how much personal information the tech platforms will collect, what's done with it, and how often people would be required to verify their ID... There are also questions around what happens if people's ages are mistaken and children are allowed to access social media, or conversely, if people older than 16yo are blocked.

Has this law come out of the blue?

It might seem that way to teenagers, but as a society, we've been building up to it for years. And to understand the huge push behind it, reports say you need only speak to parents... According to research, many parents say they've been caught in a bind of not wanting their kids to be socially excluded, but also worried about what they might be exposed to online through social media. Our eSafety Commissioner, Julie Inman Grant, says the darker aspects of the online world are coming at our kids whether they're prepared for them or not. And she says taking the decision out of the hands of parents and making it law is a huge weight off their shoulders.

What sort of content is she talking about?

Inman Grant says there's currently next to no protections in place for kids accessing social media, and that 7 in 10 children have encountered content associated with harm, including online bullying, mis and disinformation, misogynistic content, hate speech, pornography and grooming behaviour from adults. And while the technologies to implement the ban may be having some teething problems, Inman Grant says the law is vital to shield kids from that content - and she's also called for YouTube to be included.

Isn't YouTube for videos?

That's what it says. YouTube says 84% of Aussie teachers use it on a monthly basis in class, and that including it in the ban would disadvantage students across the country. But the commissioner has pushed back on that - she says the ban wouldn't get in the way of teaching. And she named YouTube as the most popular and prevalent platform used by children, and "correspondingly, it's where they achieve the most amount of harm".

What about the social aspect of social media for kids?

One thing the government is keen for people to understand is that they 'get' that social media is, by its nature, social for kids and it's a big part of how they've grown up and where they connect with friends. In announcing the law last year, former Communications Minister Michelle Rowland said the government is trying to balance protecting kids while letting them enjoy the social side of being online, like gaming, messaging and building relationships. They've carved gaming and messaging apps out of the ban, so they'll still be accessible, but the social void the ban stands to create is a big concern raised by many youth advocates.

Groups like the Australian Youth Affairs Coalition argue that many young people find representation and community online that they aren't seeing in their local areas or in mainstream media, and just blanket-banning them from accessing it isn't the right way to go.

So, how will a balance be achieved?

Good question... How they'll address the social gap, and how they'll clear the tech hurdles they're facing before the law comes in, remains to be seen. One thing is for sure, though a lot of eyes will be on us.

As we mentioned earlier, the legislation is a world-first, and a number of countries, including New Zealand, the UK, and Norway, are keen to follow suit - so they're watching to see how it goes...



Pat Penna's Ginger Nut Biscuits

Ingredients

4 Tbs butter

2 cups sugar

2 eggs

1 tsp Cream of Tartar

2 tsp Carb Soda

4 Tbs treacle

2 dessertspoons ground ginger

1 tsp lemon essence

3 cups plain flour

Can add 2 Tbs milk if needed

Method

Pat says "My measurements aren't exact and not always level."

Place 1 tsp size mixture on a tray lined with baking paper.

Cook in a moderate oven for 10-15 minutes and cool slightly before removing from the tray.

Makes about 80-100 biscuits
