



### History Notes

The family project to research and publish the Adams/Witten family has now concluded and most of the interested family members have a copy of the books. However, I still hear questions re Wittens living at Barraba Station - not Adams - so it seems a bit of early history is needed.

Alfred Augustus Adams arrived in Australia in July, 1839, aboard the "Strathfieldsaye". Some of his fellow passengers were George and Walter Galley, Dr. Adams (no relation), the Sinden family with their child, William, and Henry Parkes.

Alfred found employment with James King of "Illawong" and Captain Caswell of "Trilba" while his father's estate was wound up in England. He met his future wife working at "Thilba" and they married in 1844.

Barraba Station appears in the 1848 Government Gazette as well as other government records - 45 square miles on the Manilla River and owned/leased by Armitage J.T. and C. who were in charge there in 1840. It is known that A. A. Adams had visited the area several times before he bought the station.

Alfred and Jane moved to Barraba in July, 1845 - she and Mrs. Mckid were the only white women in this area at that time. Sadly, Jane's sister died in the late 1840's and Jane went to the Hunter Valley to collect the two orphaned daughters with just a teenage boy to drive the cart. They arrived safely back in Barraba and settled into the Adams family. Jane's first two children were born in 1850 and 1852 in the old slab hut which was their first home in Barraba.

Thoughts about a new home had to be put aside for some years as A. A. Adams partner, who managed Gineroi, was killed in a horse accident just north of Bingara in 1854. A. A. Adams bought George Galley's share in Gineroi and moved his family to live at Gineroi. The new house at Barraba was built a few years later and was used by the managers and their families until Arthur Witten married Mary Jesser Adams and her father settled them on Barraba Station in the mid 1870's. Thus, there were Adams from about 1845 until 1854 and then Wittens. A. A. Adams came back to live at Barraba Station with his daughter and her family for a few years before he died in 1907.

#### THE FACTS: OLD VELODROME SITE

We're aware of community concerns regarding the presence of asbestos at the former velodrome site in Tamworth, currently being developed by Council in partnership with UNE. Here are the facts:

### The Facts

#### Old Velodrome Site - Tamworth

- · Council was unaware of the asbestos prior to works commencing.
- The asbestos predates the velodrome, which was built in the mid-1990s
- Demolition and earthworks were managed by Council's Civil Construction Division, with a contracted dozer operator completing most of the earthworks.
- Suspicious material was found near the Murray Street end as earthworks neared completion.
- Upon confirmation of asbestos, further testing was conducted by specialist geotechnical consultants to confirm the extent of the contamination which informed the development of a Remediation Action Plan (RAP).
- The asbestos is bonded asbestos contained within pieces of fibre sheeting buried in soil, which while remaining insitu and undisturbed, poses no risk to workers or the public.
- Council will continue remediation of the site to ensure the site is suitable and fit for purpose for the UNE development.
- Remediation costs, including velodrome removal, were already budgeted for by Council, with all additional works expected to stay within budget.





### Step closer to aquatics facility construction start

A key step towards

construction starting on Tamworth's proposed Aquatic, Education and Health Centre of Excellence will be taken at next Tuesday's Ordinary Meeting.

A report to Councillors in the closed part of the meeting will seek to commit working with a specialist construction company for an Early Contractor Involvement contract for stage 1 of the facility, which has a total budget of \$45 million. It is funded through \$15 million from the NSW Government, \$9 million from the Australian Government and a \$21 million Council contribution.

The facility's first stage will be built at the Tamworth Sports and Entertainment Precinct on Jack Smyth Drive opposite the Sports Dome. Tamworth Region Mayor Russell Webb said using an Early Contractor Involvement project delivery approach will minimise Council's financial risk for the project. "It is a proven method in getting a high degree of confidence in project affordability as the engaged contractor is required to work with Council and other engaged consultants to finalise the project scope before committing to a Design and Construct Contract," he said.

"Council will be able to provide its funding partners with important construction industry insights to assure them the project is guided by experts with understanding of current market conditions. The contractor will provide technical advice about buildability, construction methods, cost planning and value engineering to ensure the design is practical, efficient and aligns with the budget as well as the expectations of Council, stakeholders and the local community. These are all critical factors for successful project delivery."

The Mayor said five years of solid planning and design work has already gone into the facility to bring this proposal to reality for the community. "Council's project team has undertaken extensive work to investigate best industry practice to limit the construction cost while maximising the functionality and use of the available budget," he said.

While Council will not break ground on the construction until early next year, the project is already an award winner – it won the Strategic and Master Planning Category at the NSW/ACT Parks and Leisure Australia Awards. It is now in the running for a national award in November.

Construction of the facility is scheduled to be completed in mid-2027 to align with the funding agreements with the NSW Government and the Australian Government.



## SPORTS GRANT AVAILABLE

The region's sporting

clubs will be lining up to take advantage of the NSW Office of Sport's Local Sport Grant Program.

Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson said the grant invested in the essentials for local sporting clubs, boosting participation and keeping people active. "Sport is one of the great Australian pastimes enjoyed at all levels on weekends, weeknights and recreationally," Mr Anderson said. "We love our sport and we love out sporting club volunteers who provide opportunities for local families to keep active and live healthy lifestyles. This program helps boost participation in sport by offering grants that allow grassroots clubs to grow their presence and offer opportunities to budding local sporting stars."

The Office of Sport's Local Sport Grant Program offers grants of between \$2,000 and \$20,000 to support grassroots sporting clubs to increase participation, host events, improve access and enhance sport and recreation facilities. Every electorate in NSW is allocated \$50,000 to share between sporting clubs and organisations.

"This is a fund that guarantees investment in our region and has been successful in boosting participation in sport across our community. A range of projects could be eligible, and the program has funded a diverse range of projects in the past including training events, sporting equipment, upgrades to accessibility and more. Any local club interested in applying should do so as soon as possible."

# SLASH THE COST OF LIVING WITH SERVICE NSW

Residents across the region are encouraged to take advantage of more than 70 rebates and vouchers designed to help reduce the cost of living. Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson said vouchers and rebates from Service NSW could go a long way to helping household budgets.

"I know many in our community are under pressure this winter with the cost of living affecting many of our local families," Mr Anderson said. "Every dollar counts, which is why the Service NSW Savings finder is a useful tool to see if you're eligible to save a bundle. Whether it's energy relief for low-income households and families, council rate rebates for pensioners, the Housing Pathways program for renters, or the Revenue NSW Unclaimed money service, there may be money to be saved for everyone."

The Service NSW Savings Finder Tool works by asking a few tailored questions to help individuals find rebates and vouchers they may be eligible for. "It's disappointing that cost-of-living measures that would have made a real difference to our communities like the Regional Seniors Travel Card, energy rebates, energy efficient appliance rebates, and First Lap swim vouchers have been cut by the Labor Government," Mr Anderson added. "Despite these cuts, there are still more than 70 rebates and concessions available, and I am encouraging everyone to jump online to the Service NSW Savings Finder and check their eligibility.

#### JOB CUTS A THREAT TO LOCAL COMMUNITY


So, think of this as you prepare your tax return. You are filling up the Budget bus with your money. At the very least when they toss it out the window can they give you some credit for where it came from.



#### **GWYDIR SHIRE COUNCIL – Message from the Mayor**

Council is continuing its work to improve telecommunications across the Shire and wants to provide the community with a current update on where things stand.

Gwydir Shire Council now has a formal Connectivity Plan in place, developed in collaboration with Telstra, to guide long-term improvements to telecommunications across the region. The plan prioritises addressing mobile coverage issues, congestion, and known blackspots across the Shire. It also focuses on enhancing network resilience through upgraded infrastructure and improved backup power systems. In addition, the plan explores a diverse mix of connectivity solutions — including mobile, NBN, satellite, and emerging technologies — to ensure reliable service across different communities. A strong emphasis is also placed on supporting digital inclusion and strengthening disaster readiness, so that all residents can stay connected and informed when it matters most.

We are still awaiting confirmed upgrade timelines for towers that are yet to be upgraded to the 5g network. Specifically on the Bingara tower, a fault with the power backup system at the Bingara tower has been identified. This site is now being treated as a priority by Telstra. Additionally, there is a major 4G/5G upgrade that is expected to commence later this year.

Council continues to actively advocate to all levels of government. Most recently, the Hon. Barnaby Joyce MP confirmed that Telstra's regional team is progressing capacity upgrades for the Bingara site and has acknowledged Council's involvement in the digital planning process. We understand that his office has yet to receive a response from the Minister for Communications, the Hon. Anika Wells MP, in relation to the issues we've raised on behalf of the community.

We remain committed to ensuring every community in our Shire is connected, supported, and digitally included — and we'll continue to keep you updated as this work progresses.

# Kids need to floss too, even their baby teeth. But how do you actually get them to do it?

A survey from the Australian Dental Association out this week shows about three in four children never floss their teeth, or have adults do it for them. Many of the survey respondents thought it wasn't worthwhile for baby teeth.

As anyone who cares for kids knows, it can be hard enough to get them to brush twice daily, let alone floss. So how do you actually get kids to floss? Why do they need to anyway?

#### Do kids really need to floss?

Flossing can reach between the teeth where toothbrushes can't. It removes the soft food debris and biofilm, a slimy layer on teeth that harbours microbes, and so reduces the risk of dental decay and gum disease.

So, flossing is essential as soon as children's teeth erupt and are in contact with the next one. This is typically at the age of six to eight months when the lower front teeth start to emerge through their gums.

#### But they're just baby teeth, right?

You may be thinking flossing is not worth the time or trouble, especially for younger children who'll lose their baby teeth in a few years anyway.

However, baby teeth play a vital role in how children's jaw bones develop and their face appears. And losing baby teeth early – due to the dental decay that can arise from not flossing – can have several effects. As a child, it can change their speech and appearance. These can affect a child's self-esteem and impact their wellbeing, depending on their age.

Losing baby teeth early can also affect them as a teenager or adult. Baby teeth act as a guide to where permanent teeth should erupt so losing them early can lead to crowding of teeth, needing orthodontic treatment (braces). In fact, premature loss of baby teeth can increase the risk of "malocclusion" or problems in the position of permanent teeth by more than 2.5 times.

Cleaning between the teeth is also vital for teens to reduce the risk of gingivitis (inflammation of the gums). This is very common in this age group due to changes in hormone levels.

#### Yes, it can be challenging

Setting up a regular flossing routine may be challenging for many families. It's one more thing to squeeze into the early morning rush to get to school or work. It can be hard to motivate tired children to floss at the end of the day too. The technique itself also needs a level of manual dexterity for the

kids themselves or for the parents who floss younger kids' teeth.

You or your kids may have some form of dental anxiety due to previous negative experiences with dental visits. This may affect dental hygiene, or your likelihood to floss.

All of these factors can lead to lack of motivation or reluctance to floss, and so increases the risk of dental decay and gum disease in children. But there are ways to help you and your kids develop and stick to a flossing regime.

#### OK, you've convinced me. What next?

First, gather your equipment.

Interdental brushes look like mini bottle brushes. These are more effective for larger spaces between adjacent teeth, or if your child has braces.

Floss or floss picks are only effective for areas with smaller or no spaces between adjacent teeth. Kid-friendly designs, such as animal-shaped and colourful floss and floss picks, can be an excellent option to make this routine more enjoyable. Flavoured floss, or floss that smells like fruit or chocolate can be appealing. Involving kids in the choice of floss or floss picks can boost their motivation to floss.

Alternatively, a waterjet flosser can make cleaning between the teeth more engaging. It's as effective as regular dental floss. For toddlers and pre-schoolers, using rewards and positive reinforcements, such as sticker charts or gold stars, can keep kids motivated to floss. So, stock up.

Then choose your timing. Flossing is best done once a day, either in the morning or before bedtime. That's because flossing can effectively remove biofilm between the teeth for 24 hours. You can floss before or after brushing.

Parents will need to brush and floss the teeth of infants and children up to five years old, until the children develop their own manual dexterity.

For infants, it's easier if one adult holds them upright or sits them on their lap while the other does the flossing. For toddlers and pre-schoolers, it may be easier to floss if they are sitting on the toilet, or standing at the basin with their head tilted back.

Last of all, lead by example. Kids with parents who regularly floss tend to pick up the routine quickly.

#### Any more tips?

Flossing is only one part of preventing tooth decay and dental diseases, such as gum disease. It's also important for children to:

- avoid snacking on food with a high sugar content
- choose plain water over fruit juices or fizzy drinks

- avoid falling asleep with a feeding bottle containing milk, fruit juice or sugary liquids
- avoid using a dummy dipped in sugary liquids or honey
- clean their tongue while brushing their teeth
- see a dentist or oral health professional well before their first tooth erupts so they can get used to the idea of a dental appointment.


