History Notes

While flicking through some old local government magazines I have found a headline "Bluett 1988 – Barraba Strikes Back".

Many 'long term' residents will remember the closure of the asbestos mine at Woodsreef and the departure of many of the mine workers and their families as they searched for employment elsewhere.

The asbestos mine had been worked and closed several times from about 1920 until the final closure in the early 1980s. While the mine was working, Barraba saw a lot of new houses erected particularly at the southern end of town. There were no empty shops, and the population played sports on improved fields, sent their children to the local schools and took part in local organizations. In fact, Barraba was booming.

Several country roads were sealed, particularly the road to Woodsreef which had become a dust bowl with all the miners going to work in their own vehicles. Apart from the mine housing there were more building and shop improvements in town and roads and bridges in the general shire were upgraded.

Then suddenly the mine closes – after all it was asbestos! Not the sort that causes illness! But it closed just the same. A quarter of Barraba's population left the town to find work. The schools lost pupils and clubs lost members. Shopkeepers saw a decrease in both their customers and staff.

The council, under the direction of staff such as Grahame Kellett and Shire President, Rupert Richarson, set to work to save Barraba – setting up the Information Centre and finding other businesses such as a clothing factory to set up in town.

Unfortunately, the Council lost further land rates when parts of the area around the southern Manilla River were removed for the Split Rock Dam. They were hard years, but Council came out in front and received the Bluett Award in 1988 for re-developing the area after the closure of the asbestos mine. I wonder where the Bluett Award is now – it should be on display somewhere in Barraba!




Barraba Potters and Craft Guild "Come and Try Day" Needle Felting

Barraba Potters and Craft Guild are pleased to have special guest instructor Janice Smith from Narrabri attend the "Come and Try Day" on the 27th September to demonstrate Needle Felting technique at the Gallery, 74 Queen Street Barraba. From 1pm to 3pm.

Felting is a textile technique that involves matting, condensing and pressing fibres together using heat, moisture and friction.

There are 2 main types of felting:

- Flat Felting (Wet Felting): Involves using hot water, soap and friction to mat and shrink fibres together.
 This technique can be used to create a wide range of items such as clothing, hats, scarves, slippers, home décor, placemats, wall hangings, purses and jewellery. The process involves layering fibres, applying soap and hot water and then agitating the fibres to matt them together.
- Needle felting (Dry felting): Needle felting uses barbed needles to poke and matt fibres together. Often used for creating detailed designs and patterns. Adding embellishments to fabric and making three dimensional sculptures of figures. The barbed needles catch and tangle the fibres, holding them together.



If you would like to try needle felting, this is your chance to have a "crack" at something new or to refresh your technique. All equipment required will be supplied on the

day. The option of purchasing a barb needle felting kit to take home will be available for \$10 on the day.

Cost for the day is \$10 per person. Bookings and payment requested prior to the day.

A 25-Year Legacy of Serving the New England and North West

The Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service is proud to celebrate 25 years of continuous aeromedical operations across the New England North West, with the milestone anniversary of its Tamworth Base to be officially marked on Monday 25 August 2025.

Since its launch in 2000, the Tamworth Base has grown into a vital regional emergency response hub, supporting the communities of the New England North West region,

delivering a world-class aeromedical and search and rescue capability.

"Twenty-five years of lifesaving and life-changing critical care is a wonderful milestone and testament to the strength and generosity of the New England North West community, whose support has been vital from the very beginning," said Mr Steven Underwood, Chief Executive Officer of the Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service.

The Service officially launched in August 2000 with a singleengine Bell 407 helicopter, operated from hangar space provided by BAE Systems in Tamworth and from the outset, the Service has been strongly supported by local volunteers and regional business from towns across the region. Notably, the efforts of early champions like local MP Tony Windsor, the late Cliff Marsh, and long-time community liaison Barry Walton were instrumental in establishing the Service.

"Throughout droughts, bushfires, floods and tough economic times, the people of this region have been unwavering in their support of the Service and for that we are humbled and deeply grateful," Mr Underwood said.

In 2007, after the original Bell 407 aircraft was retired, the Service transitioned to twin-engine BK117 helicopters, with further fleet upgrades in 2012.

A major boost for the region occurred in 2017 as part of a statewide integration of services under an initial 10-year contract with NSW Ambulance. Local firm Best Practice Constructions led the build of a modern base to support the arrival of the highly capable AW139 emergency medical services helicopter.

Today, the Tamworth Base is an integral part of the broader health network and, in partnership with NSW Health and NSW Ambulance, we collectively provide critical care to the patient at the point of need across the region.

"This milestone is a moment to reflect on how far we've come - but also allows us the opportunity to look to what we can achieve into the future," Mr Underwood said. "We are committed to the delivery of an aeromedical and search and rescue capability that the community can be proud of and of delivering that lifesaving and life-changing critical care in times of need." Mr Underwood concluded.

JOB CUTS A THREAT TO LOCAL COMMUNITY

The Minns Labor Government's planned public sector job cuts will be devastating to hard-working local families and the economy.

Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson said the shocking planned cuts to jobs at TAFE, Transport for NSW, and Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) are deeply concerning for local families. "The Minns Labor Government are planning to slash jobs in regional NSW, devastating hard-working locals who now face an uncertain future," Mr Anderson said. "To grow our local economy, the government must invest in regional jobs and economic development, and instead, the government are ripping jobs away from our regions and relocating them in the city. This is unacceptable, unjustifiable, and further evidence that regional NSW is not a priority for Chris Minns and the Labor Government. This announcement comes as a complete shock to local workers and I'm calling on the government to reverse the cuts. The impacts of this decision will be significant, and I am deeply concerned about the uncertainty and worry the government's cuts are having on our community."

Mr Anderson continued "Farmers that rely on the support and expertise of department staff have already raised concerns about the job losses. The cuts to TAFE come at a time where local businesses are frustrated by the lack of courses offered in the region, which is impacting on their ability to attract and train qualified staff. I've been pushing to bring local control back to TAFE New England, with a local boss who has a strong understanding of our community and the needs of local students and businesses. I'm concerned the Labor Government's cuts to jobs at Transport for NSW will derail our local road network, which is already under significant pressure. We are already waiting far too long for major road projects like Goonoo Goonoo Road to start. The Labor Government must urgently come clean about what jobs will be affected and must not cut jobs for hard working people in our region."

PARKING IN TAMWORTH



From The Conversation

The kettle is a household staple practically everywhere – how else would we make our hot drinks?

But is it okay to re-boil water that's already in the kettle from last time? While bringing water to a boil disinfects it, you may have heard that boiling water more than once will somehow make the water harmful and therefore you should empty the kettle each time.

Such claims are often accompanied by the argument that reboiled water leads to the accumulation of allegedly hazardous substances including metals such as arsenic, or salts such as nitrates and fluoride. This isn't true. To understand why, let's look at what is in our tap water and what really happens when we boil it.

What's in our tap water?

Let's take the example of tap water supplied by Sydney Water, Australia's largest water utility which supplies water to Sydney, the Blue Mountains and the Illawarra region. From the publicly available data for the January to March 2025 quarter for the Illawarra region, these were the average water quality results:

- pH was slightly alkaline
- total dissolved solids were low enough to avoid causing scaling in pipes or appliances
- fluoride content was appropriate to improve dental health, and
- it was "soft" water with a total hardness value below 40mg of calcium carbonate per litre.

The water contained trace amounts of metals such as iron and lead, low enough magnesium levels that it can't be tasted, and sodium levels substantially lower than those in popular soft drinks. These and all other monitored quality parameters were well within the Australian Drinking Water Guidelines during that period. If you were to make tea with this water, re-boiling would not cause a health problem. Here's why.

It's difficult to concentrate such low levels of chemicals

To concentrate substances in the water, you'd need to evaporate some of the liquid while the chemicals stay behind. Water evaporates at any temperature, but the vast majority of evaporation happens at the boiling point – when water turns into steam. During boiling, some volatile organic compounds might escape into the air, but the amount of the inorganic compounds (such as metals and salts) remains unchanged.

While the concentration of inorganic compounds might increase as drinking water evaporates when boiled, evidence shows it doesn't happen to such an extent that it would be hazardous. Let's say you boil one litre of tap water in a kettle in the morning, and your tap water has a fluoride content of 1mg per litre, which is within the limits of Australian guidelines. You make a cup of tea taking 200ml of the boiled water. You then make another cup of tea in the afternoon by re-boiling the remaining water.

On both occasions, if heating was stopped soon after boiling started, the loss of water by evaporation would be small, and the fluoride content in each cup of tea would be similar. But let's assume that when making the second cup, you let the water keep boiling until 100ml of what's in the kettle evaporates. Even then, the amount of fluoride you would consume with the second cup (0.23mg) would not be significantly higher than the fluoride you consumed with the first cup of tea (0.20mg).

The same applies to any other minerals or organics the supplied water may have contained. Let's take lead: the water supplied in the Illawarra region as mentioned above, had a lead concentration of less than 0.0001mg per litre. To reach an unsafe lead concentration (0.01mg per litre, according to Australian guidelines) in a cup of water, you'd

need to boil down roughly 20 litres of tap water to just that cup of 200ml. Practically that is unlikely to happen — most electric kettles are designed to boil briefly before automatically shutting off. As long as the water you're using is within the guidelines for drinking water, you can't really concentrate it to harmful levels within your kettle.

But what about taste?


Whether re-boiled water actually affects the taste of your drinks will depend entirely on the specifics of your local water supply and your personal preferences. The slight change in mineral concentration, or the loss of dissolved oxygen from water during boiling may affect the taste for some people – although there are a lot of other factors that contribute to the taste of your tap water.

The bottom line is that as long as the water in your kettle was originally compliant with guidelines for safe drinking water, it will remain safe and potable even after repeated boiling.
