This year marks the 107th anniversary of the end of WW1.

The armistice concluded four years of terrible warfare which resulted in an estimated twenty million dead and twenty million wounded.

The young Australian nation contributed 416,809 enlisted men of which over 62,000 were killed and 155,000 wounded. Another 8,000 died of war related injuries.

Unfortunately, many of those that returned never recovered from the mental scares that the war inflicted on them.

History Notes

Last Saturday morning was a day to remember when we welcomed members of the

Smith family to the museum. They were descendants of James Smith who was Mr Dean's partner in the firm Dean & Smith who ran the business for thirty plus years in Barraba from 1900.


The visitors showed lots of interest in the museum as well as the history of James Smith. Several visitors were studying the map to see just where Doonba was in their ancestor's years and lots of questions were asked. Their visit for an hour was over in no time, and they then moved onto the cemetery and lunch before visiting the family's old home.

Not many of our visitors had heard of the company of Barraba businessmen who owned a property in north Queensland. They visited it regularly and on one of the visits, after lunch, Mr Dean was lying on the verandah floor, having a rest before the party moved on. When he stood up there was the pattern of his body in sweat on the verandah – it must have been very hot! Soon after this the group decided to sell out, and it is said that Mr Dean and Mr Smith used their share of the money to build their homes in Barraba.

Members are still having a problem sorting out the Kilgour family who lived in this area in the past. We have a few facts but not enough to help the descendant making the enquiry. They were apparently here in the early 1900's but may be connected to a Barraba family that we do not have in our records.

To change the subject, I wonder if there are Barraba residents enjoying some of the poetry written by past residents. I am presently re-reading one of the Gun-a-roo books — it is still just as entertaining as it was when I purchased my copy at the Champagne Breakfast in 1983. Kennedy's pigs published in the Cobbadah book introduced me to his writings — he was a rather clever writer.





FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is being done about parking in our towns and villages?

Generally, there's plenty of parking in our towns and villages, but it can fill up quickly during events. It's important to review planned events carefully to minimise their impact on parking. The Council values feedback from residents, as it helps identify issues and improve services in our communities.

Long vehicle parking for tourists is also crucial for our towns and villages. We're working on finding suitable long vehicle parking spots near the main business areas to support the local economy.

Why do the types of parking meters being changed to not accept coins or cash?

Card-only and ticketless meters are usually always operational while in contrast, the current coin-operated meters often have problems like ticket jams, coin jams, and software issues while also needing regular coin collection and paper refills for tickets. Switching to a more reliable system should help reduce frustrations for those using our paid parking areas.

What is being done in terms of catering for those drivers or passengers with reduced mobility?

Council is always looking to improve our parking network for those with accessibility challenges, including adding more disabled parking bays as well as footpaths and pram ramps to better connect to destinations. We encourage you to share any ideas for making our parking more user-friendly, such as ideas for new disabled parking bay locations, improvements to pram ramps, and footpath maintenance.

Additionally, the introduction of ticketless parking meters will help reduce the distance a driver may need to cover because they will not need to use a machine and then return to their car to display a ticket.

Why is paid parking being introduced in Peel Street?

Austroads Best Parking Practice suggests that premium parking spots should be short-stay and metered, while areas further away should be long-stay and free. As Peel Street is the most sought-after area for parking, it makes sense for it to have short-stay, metered parking while out all-day parking areas become free. We expect this proposed change, along with more efficient parking enforcement, will help those visiting Peel Street to find parking more easily.

Once we roll out paid parking in Peel Street and remove all-day metered spots, there will be about 200 fewer metered spaces in the CBD. This means workers will have the option to park for free all day in the CBD and surrounding areas.





Council Meeting Update - Tuesday 28 October, 2025

Here is an overview of outcomes from the Ordinary Meeting of Tamworth Regional Council.

- Councillors discussed a Notice of Motion from Cr Ryan Brooke, requesting Council works towards gender parity and other diverse representation. This includes committing to engage with diverse community groups and organisations which would encourage and support minority groups to consider civic leadership roles. It was noted that Tamworth Regional Council is currently the only council within NSW with no elected female representation. The motion was supported with a division recorded 7 for and 2 against.
- Councillors have endorsed the rollout of Microsoft 365 across all Council operations and approved an additional \$633,900 to the Technology Blueprint budget to fund the necessary hardware. Deploying Microsoft 365 is a key strategic initiative within the Technology Blueprint program. As Windows 10 is being phased out, most of Council's existing devices primarily laptops and desktops, have reached the end of their 3 to 5-year useful life. A successful rollout of Microsoft 365 therefore requires a complete refresh of these devices to ensure staff have the technology needed to work efficiently and securely.
- Councillors agreed that the Tamworth Regional Film and Sound Archive will transition from a Section 355 Committee to now sit under Council's museum operations. This will better support the long-term asset management of the collection/archive, simplify legal requirements and the documentation required under the Section 355 Committee. The management under Council's museum operations will be in accordance with the Tamworth Region Museum Strategy and Asset Management plans.

NIOKA PALLIATIVE CARE TO DOUBLE IN SIZE

Palliative care services in Tamworth will be doubled thanks to a major investment in the Nioka Palliative Care unit at Tamworth Base Hospital.

Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson said today a contractor was appointed to build the upgraded unit, marking a major milestone in the campaign to increase local services. "In 2022, I joined with Friends of Nioka led by local advocate Bryan Singh to kickstart the campaign for a bigger, better Nioka Palliative Care Unit in Tamworth," Mr Anderson said. "Today, that campaign took a huge leap forward with a building contractor appointed to the project that will take the Nioka Unit from a 6-bed facility to a 12-bed facility. Local advocates have been pushing for more beds in Nioka for some time, recognising that we have a growing ageing population, and the local palliative care unit is almost always at capacity. Friends of Nioka are also hopeful that the upgrade will provide the opportunity for respite for local families who are full time carers of those in palliative care. I thank the Minister for Health Ryan Park for his commitment to this very important project and ensuring that the funding remained available to upgrade this facility and deliver those services closer to home. Friends of Nioka deserve credit for their tireless efforts for palliative care services in Tamworth. I know it is a deeply personal issue, and I thank Bryan Singh and members for their advocacy. This is another major health infrastructure project for our region that will provide additional healthcare options for our community."

From The Conversation

It took just 60 years for red foxes to colonise Australia from Victoria to the Pilbara

To a newly-arrived red fox, the abundant rolling grasslands and swamps of Wadawurrung Country, around what is now called Port Phillip Bay, must have seemed like a predator's paradise. This landscape was filled with small native marsupials and birds, and free of European wolves or bears that usually kept fox numbers in check.

The first red foxes, (Vulpes vulpes), to arrive in Australia were deliberately released by European colonialists in 1870 in three Victorian locations – Werribee, Corio (near Geelong) and Ballarat. They were introduced for the "noble" sport of fox hunting. Small native animals became easy prey for foxes because they did not evolve with these predators and did not know to avoid them.

Red fox numbers ballooned and they spread rapidly. How fast? Our new research shows it took just 60 years for one of Australia's most devastating invasive predators to colonise the continent. These days, foxes can be found everywhere except the tropical north and Tasmania.

Their rapid spread offers clues to how we might prevent future extinctions of native animals from foxes, and map the infiltration of Australia by other invasive species.

Mapping the spread


To model the arrival and spread of foxes across Australia, we relied on hundreds of historical "first-sighting" records collected from library, local government and state archives. First sightings of foxes were particularly newsworthy at the end of the 19th and beginning of the 20th century in

Australia. This is because of the threats that foxes posed to sheep and poultry.

We ran thousands of model simulations reconstructing the arrival and spread of foxes across Australia. We played out likely scenarios of fox survival, reproduction and dispersal based on what we know about their behaviour today. We then compared these simulated patterns of population growth and expansion against inferences of demographic change from these historical records. Our best models were able to closely reconstruct the timing of arrival of foxes in places and regions as well as their current day population sizes.

Our modelling demonstrated foxes populated Australia at incredible speed. Between 1870 and 1895, they had spread across the south-eastern corner of Australia. Then they spread more slowly to the north and west directions in arid regions. By 1940, however, they had reached the remote northwest.

Flourishing foxes

Foxes mate in winter, with females giving birth to four to five cubs. By autumn, the young foxes are on their own. They can travel up to 300 kilometres in search of new territory. As omnivores, they eat everything from small mammals such as rodents and rabbits to birds, insects and plants. In their native range from Europe to the Middle East foxes have been suppressed by predators like bears and wolves, but in Australia, fox numbers have soared.

Unfortunately, the suppression of dingoes across Australia following European colonisation is at least partly to blame for the explosion in fox numbers because there are not sufficient densities of dingoes control foxes.

Foxes flourish in areas modified by humans. We show that their populations are densest around urban centres, and they do well after land is cleared for agriculture. Population growth rates of foxes in agricultural regions increased notably in the 1950s, as a result of large-scale agricultural expansion following World War II.

This research also showed that in arid areas, population cycles of foxes follow a "boom and bust" cycle, while their numbers seem more stable in agricultural landscapes.

Driving extinction

European red foxes and domestic cats brought to Australia kill about 300 million native animals in Australia every year and remain the major driver of past and current extinctions.

Australia's fox population is about 1.7 million, and the Invasive Species Council estimates as many as 16 mammal species have become extinct mainly or partly because of foxes. This is about 40% of total extinctions since European arrival.

Our new research provides important insights into which native species have been threatened for the longest period of time, identifying areas that were potentially important refuges from foxes. The adaptable simulation models we used to track fox expansion can be used for other invasive species that haven't yet infiltrated all of Australia, such as cane toads. We hope these models will help us map the spread of other invasive species such as cats, and potentially curb Australia's decline in native wildlife.
