Toys on the naughty list this Christmas

Doctors at The Royal Children's Hospital (RCH) are warning parents to steer clear of e-scooters and toys containing magnets and button batteries for Christmas. While they may seem like great gifts, trauma surgeons say they can pose a serious safety risk in the hands of little ones.

"No parent wants to spend Christmas Day in the Emergency Department, but not everyone knows just how dangerous these 'toys' can be. On the naughty list this Christmas are button batteries, which are often found in small toys or car keys, and are easily swallowed."

Dr Warwick Teague, Director of Trauma at the RCH says they can cause serious harm in as little as two hours. "A button battery creates a chemical reaction and electrical charge between the walls of a child's oesophagus or swallowing tube, which can fry that tube, causing serious bleeding," Dr Teague explains. "When you're a surgeon having to remove something that's fizzing away in a child's throat, it's a highly stressful moment."

Other small items such as magnetic balls, often found in construction or sensory toys, can also be easily swallowed. "Unfortunately, they're the perfect size and shape for a little one to put in their mouth. If swallowed, sometimes the magnets in these balls stick together inside children, twisting and causing holes or tears in the bowel," Dr Teague says. "They can make children dangerously sick and they're really difficult to remove."

The third item doctors don't want under the Christmas tree are e-scooters. "Every Christmas our teams brace for a spike in serious injuries from children who should not be riding e-scooters," explains Dr Teague. From broken bones to cracked insides, not only are e-scooters illegal for children under 16 in Victoria, but they're also just not worth the risk to your body."

The advice to parents is to make sure any toys they're purchasing meet Australian Safety standards, and to inspect items to make sure they're not broken, brittle or falling apart.

"We should never assume that all toys for sale are safe", says Dr Teague. "If it's sold in a cheap variety store or online, there's a chance your toys aren't going to be safe for your children so make sure you do your homework ahead of the holidays. If you think your child has ingested a button battery or a magnet, call triple zero (000) immediately, or head to your closest Emergency Department. "

During the year we have managed some renovations to give more area for display and provide more cement paths for our senior citizens safety. Unfortunately, we are still waiting for safety rails but no doubt they will come before too long. Hopefully the Horton Valley file will be completed over the next couple of months – several families have proved to be a bit hard to trace but time for research has been the main problem.

There is a lot of history in E.L. Bates memoirs as well as the book published by the Bingara Historical Society to read. Mr Bates virtually grew up in the Valley and wrote about a lot of different people as well as the animals and birds he saw. He was five when he settled in the Valley with his mother and stepfather and grown-up when he moved away. Some of his family were in Bingara but he gradually moved down the Hunter Valley, living at Eccleston near Paterson for quite a while, later moving further down towards Newcastle. Les Bates described an over-loaded truck in one of his letters -"One morning, I think it was 1923/4 a lorry came past Kingsland. They pulled up for a while, to get some water, it was one of Roly Hungerford's, a little yellow/brown Federal, built to carry three and a half tons. It was on its way to Rocky Creek crossing and between cement, timber, iron, wheelbarrows, picks and shovels and all sorts of working gear, plus seven men and their camping and cooking gear, plus a week's tucker and spare clothes!!"

It was probably carrying 7 ½ tons. How did they climb Bells Mountain and how did they get safely down the mountain to Upper Horton village?

To the Editor

To the Editor

I write in reference to the ongoing issue of the untidy state of the old section of the Barraba Cemetery. It would seem that over a number of years numerous people have raised their concerns with TRC yet the problem remains. TRCs position has been outlined with two letters able to be viewed on the Barraba Friends facebook page.

Personally, I am disappointed with the position council has adopted. To tell our community that the Barraba Cemetery currently meets 'Open Space guidelines' with reference to necessary "hierarchy and service priorities" to me is written in a condescending bureaucratic tone that does not respect the issue so important to our town. The old section of the cemetery is constantly untidy.

To suggest that moving palm fronds presents "a serious risk to staff" outlining the need for minimal contact by staff is an insult and I'm certain our ancestors would "turn in their graves" pun intended on how we now assess manual work.

Whilst it may not be possible to get a "sit on" or "zero turn" mower in the old section of the cemetery push mowers and whipper snippers have been used in that area for many years. Is it not possible that TRC Mower Tender contracts be changed to include some manual labour work rather than poisoning everything resulting in a scorched and desolate earth appearance?

Barraba like many communities is faced with the ongoing problem of the breakdown and disrepair of public cemetery headstones. TRC have made it very clear that under NSW legislation they are not permitted to undertake work on headstones after they are installed. With that responsibility falling to families, it's become a big issue that increasingly many older publicly held plots are not maintained. With many rural and small towns losing population as people move for work or education increasingly a lot of plots have no family to care for them.

In some communities it has fallen back to local service clubs or historical groups: however across Australia this support has dwindled.

I have read that increasingly Councils are being forced to apply for specific Cemetery Restoration programs and that is what I think our council should be investigating.

In conclusion I'm asking TRC that they show some respect and take more pride in the 'rest place' of the people who have shaped our beautiful town. This issue won't go away and I call on TRC to elevate the importance of maintaining our town's cemetery.

Yes, we have no teaspoons – and TRI research tells us why...

Researchers at Translational Research Institute (TRI) in Brisbane have used the latest microchipping technology to confirm what office workers have long suspected – that teaspoons disappear from workplace tearooms at a consistent rate.

The TRI researchers found teaspoons are lost at a rate of exactly 2.58 teaspoons per person per 100 teaspoon years in communal tearooms. TRI CEO Professor Maher Gandhi has led the research, with TRI extending the findings from a study at the Burnet Institute and investigating the concept of resistentialism as a potential cause.

Professor Gandhi said the research involved micro-chip implanted 'stealth-spoons', tracked for five years using satellite imaging and outer-space Al-guided inter-galactic rockets. "We threw everything at this because we felt it was important to get to the truth. Yes, we can handle the truth," Professor Gandhi said. "We used correlative exploratory analyses involving spatial transcriptomics, metabolomics, shotgun metagenomics, the microbiome, quality of life, health economics and choose your own adventure multiomics. It's just as well TRI has world-class capabilities and infrastructure, with highly specialised core facility equipment, staff and technologies across microscopy, flow cytometry, histology, preclinical imaging, biological research, gnotobiotics and a human immune model facility."

Professor Gandhi said he would have lost sleep, had the technology not provided the definitive proof of consistent teaspoon loss. "We also ensured consumers were engaged in all aspects of the study design, with a leaning towards those consumers who take tea rather than coffee. It's teaspoons, after all."

The research found irrevocable evidence that the stealth-spoons were being taken against their wishes, to a distant galaxy found in the far reaches of the universe. In reaching this conclusion, the researchers were able to rule out resistentialism, the belief that inanimate objects have a natural antipathy towards humans.

"Whether removal of teaspoons – but notably not research equipment or data – constitutes evidence of 'intelligent' life is debatable," Professor Gandhi said. "It's not something that can be addressed within the limitations of our study design. We encourage further international research projects in this area, preferably involving presentations at overseas conferences in exotic locations."

No TRI staff, spoons or aliens were inconvenienced during the conduct of the research – and researchers went out of their way to be nice to knives and forks for fear of playing favourites. No teaspoon companies were involved in the funding of the study. TRI researchers not only save lives but also have a sense of humour! Happy holidays from TRI.

NEW ENGLAND STATEMENT

The voting public in the Federal Electorate of New England comprehensively backed The Nationals at the 2025 Federal election. The incumbent Nationals Member secured over 65% of the vote. Almost 77,000 people made a contract with the Nationals Member for New England to represent them as part of the Federal Nationals team in Canberra. His decision to break that contract to sit with a small protest party is a great disappointment.

As a team of one, he will achieve nothing on the floor of Parliament. As a member of a team of 15, he could have. In sporting parlance, it's like a single player quitting a team, then thinking he can beat the team on his own. He has chosen to place his own ambitions above those of the team.

The Federal Nationals remain the party that New Englanders elected in May 2025. Our focus will always be standing up for our communities and holding both the Federal and State Labor Governments to account on the cost of living, health and aged care, housing, jobs and the economy, education, roads, and all the other issues that impact everyday life in the regions.

These are what the communities of New England want action on. We are blessed in New England to have three overlapping state seats held by outstanding Nationals local members: Kevin Anderson in Tamworth, Brendan Moylan in Northern Tablelands, and David Layzell in Upper Hunter. All are working hard to hold the NSW Labor Government accountable.

The NSW Nationals have enjoyed very strong growth over the last 12-18 months, with many new members joining, and many re-joining following a period of absence. Reports of mass resignations from the Tamworth Nationals are completely incorrect. There has been, in fact, a substantial increase in membership in Tamworth and across New England.

The NSW Nationals will be doing whatever it takes to return New England to the Federal Nationals team at the 2028 Federal election. A preselection process and timing will be determined over the next few months and I am sure there will be plenty of community interest when this commences.

In the meantime, The Nationals will be represented in New England by Senator Ross Cadell, and the 17 strong Federal Nationals Team will continue to fight for equity across regional NSW and all of regional Australia.

Here is an overview of outcomes from the Ordinary Meeting of Tamworth Regional Council on Tuesday 9th December 2025:

- Floodplain Risk Management Plan. Issues that were identified with the modelling used for the 2023 plan have been rectified in this updated plan, resulting in a reduction in flood levels on some of the minor catchments flowing into the Peel River catchment. The recommended flood management measures from the 2023 plan remain unchanged, and Regional Services will now work with Council's Geospatial Information Services (GIS) team to have the updated models accessible through Council's website.
- Councillors received an update on the planning progress of 2026 Australia Day celebrations and activities being held across the Tamworth Regional Council local government area. Celebrations will be held in Barraba, Bendemeer, Kootingal, Manilla, Nundle, Woolomin and Tamworth with the following councillors to attend the respective events:

Barraba: Cr Brendon North

• Bendemeer: Cr Jeff Budd

Kootingal: Cr Matt Sharpham

Manilla: Cr Charles Impey

Nundle: Cr Charles Impey

• Woolomin: To be determined

 Tamworth: Cr Russell Webb, Cr Matt Sharpham and Cr Mark Rodda

- Several operational items were received by Councillors tonight including the General Policy Register which was adopted after no submissions were made during the public exhibition of the updated documents. Councillors also fixed the dates for 2026 Ordinary Council Meetings, and a new Code of Meeting Practice was adopted tonight after a 42-day public exhibition period yielded two responses, neither of which requires a change to the updated Code of Meeting Practice. Updated documents will be available on Council's website in the coming days.
- Councillors noted and approved the Tamworth Region Arts Advisory Committee meeting minutes that included

a recommendation for a public art sub-committee and acknowledged the successful application of 2-year multi-year funding from Create NSW for both Gallery and Museums.

- Councillors tonight adopted the Graffiti Management Plan 2025 – 2030, after it received no community feedback during its 28-day public exhibition. The Plan aims to reduce graffiti vandalism across the region through a comprehensive framework that includes coordinated strategies focused on engagement, prevention, education, reporting, removal, diversion, and enforcement.
- Residents and ratepayers in Woolbrook will now sit within the Walcha Local Government Area, following a boundary change proclamation by the NSW Governor Margaret Beazley on 14 November 2025. Tamworth Regional Council will work closely with Walcha Council to finalise the transfer of property information and services.

A Christmas Message - 2025. Uniting Church in Australia.

Christmas is rapidly approaching again but somehow this year feels different. We are confronted with a world in chaos,

all points of the globe contain conflict where many innocent people, from the very young to the very old, are being killed, traumatised, damaged, displaced, hungry, sick, and living without hope.

So, what does the Christmas story say to us and all people around the world?

The writer Luke's gospel chapter 2 records where the angels bring a message of hope to the shepherds, people on the fringe, rejected by community. Luke writes –

The hope of Christmas

The other day I saw a poster from a shopping centre explaining the nativity scene they had set up. This is what they said the nativity means for us:

"We can be like Mary and Joseph by helping others and doing the right thing. We can be like the shepherds and wise men by following our own good example. We can be like the angels by sharing the joy of Christmas with others. And we can be like the story of Christmas itself by showing love and care in everything we do".

On the surface these things sound pretty good – helping others, doing right, sharing love and care are all good things.

Except when you think about it a bit harder, this is an explanation of Christmas that brings no hope at all.

The idea that Christmas is about us being a bit better, that we try a bit harder to be 'good' is really a nice bit of nonsense.

Our own ability to do the right thing and be the example we need is actually the opposite of the good news of Jesus!

The bible says in Romans 3:10-12 says:

"There is no one righteous, not even one; there is no one who understands; there is no one who seeks God. All have turned away, they have together become worthless; there is no one who does good, not even one.

If we followed our own examples, we would end up in a world full of selfishness, greed and pride.

You see this poster called Jesus "Saviour", but it doesn't explain who needs saving or what they need saving from.

The reality is everyone needs saving, I need saving, you need saving. We need saving from our sin, from our rebellion of our creator God, from the punishment of death and judgement that we all deserve.

Leaving this reality out of the Christmas story makes it seem more palatable, but really it just makes the whole story meaningless.

The real hope of Christmas is that Jesus came into the world, God with us, to save us from our sin.

As it says in John 3:16-17 – God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him.

Christmas is not about us trying to be better, because we can never be good enough. We are all selfish, sinful people. Christmas is all about God sending his son into the world to save us.

As Jesus grew up, he lived a life of perfect obedience to God, he was never selfish or greedy or proud. He is the only one who did not deserve to die and face God's wrath, and yet he chose to die for you and me.

This is the true hope of Christmas - that it is not about what we do, but about what Jesus has done for us.

I am very grateful that Christmas is not about trying harder to be a bit better, because that would be a miserable existence where I could never meet the standards I wanted too, and I could never know if I had done enough.

Instead, I am very grateful that Christmas is about the God who so loved the world that he gave his only Son.

Luke 2:10-11: I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord.

My prayer this Christmas is that you will truly know the wonderful hope of Jesus and that you would accept him as your saviour.







Using the meters is easy: press the start button, enter your vehicle's number plate, select how long you'd like to stay (within the maximum time period signposted), then tap to pay. Payment methods include debit or credit card, or alternatively using the EasyPark app. For those who prefer cash, prepaid Visa or Mastercard gift cards can be purchased from Australia Post or major supermarkets and used at the meters like a regular credit or debit card.
