



## History Notes

This week, a little early Crowley history. I have found a newspaper cutting commenting on the Eathers of Narrabri.

The Eathers were very early settlers in the Richmond area of N.S.W. and it is known Thomas Eather the 2<sup>nd</sup> had land and stock on the Liverpool Plains in 1829. He had also taken up land in the Wollombi area and built a cottage on it before it was found, in 1833, that all the settlers in the vicinity were on the wrong blocks. This took some time to sort out! In the meantime, Thomas continued to take up new farming blocks until his death in 1886.

Thomas Eather, probably the third Thomas, married Elizabeth (Eliza) Crowley at St Peter's, Richmond, on 25<sup>th</sup> July 1843. Elizabeth was a daughter of John and Charlotte Crowley and sister of William Crowley of Cobbadah station.

There is an old photo of "Pioneers of the Bulga area" taken in the mid 1890s including McAlpine, Eather and Clark family members - it includes Elizabeth and her husband: - a larger version also includes William Crowley and other family members.

Thomas and Eliza lived at 'Henriendi' for some years. but Thomas was not a great manager- he took on more properties and then ran into drought! Their son eventually took over the property and Thomas and Eliza Eather went back to Richmond to retire. Eliza died at Bulga in 1897 aged 74 years.

The whole story of Thomas Eather and all his descendants has been recorded in the Journal of the Society of Australian Genealogists published as Descent. Our society holds most of the early volumes including Volume 40 Part 1 which I have used to get details for readers. This is not the actual number of the volume so you will need to go further back to find the Eathers. Members may be able to read the whole story of Eathers for themselves.


The Barraba Show is on next weekend and there are photos of local rivers and creeks in the past, so go along and have a look.

Clancy will present at the **UNE Centre, 24 Fitzroy St, Tamworth**, sharing insights from his research into Australia's native bees and their relationships with flowering plants. His work combines on-ground ecological field studies with modern science communication, making complex ideas accessible and practical.

Through his social enterprise **Bees and Blossoms**, Clancy works across urban and regional Australia creating native bee habitats, delivering workshops, and advocating for nature-based climate solutions. His research in remote East Arnhem Land focuses on native bee and flowering plant interactions, using techniques such as DNA metabarcoding.

- Practical actions individuals and communities can take to support native bees, birds and biodiversity – wherever they live

Here is an overview of outcomes from the Ordinary Meeting of Tamworth Regional Council held on **Tuesday 24 February 2026:**

- Councillors have agreed to allow Energy Co entry to Council Owned Properties behind Council's Dungowan Dam to carry out preliminary investigations on a proposed route for 2 transmissions lines to service the New England Renewable Energy Zone. Following completion of the investigation phase, Energy Co will present findings to Council, including where they believe the most suitable alignment for the transmission lines may be.
- Councillors decided not to proceed with the construction of the of an Organics Recycling Facility (ORF) due to the high cost to build the facility. At \$69.4M, the cost is considerably higher than Council's budget of \$44.6M and is unaffordable without significant rate increases.
- Councillors have reviewed and approved the variations to the Annual Operational Plan 2025/2026 Budget Variation Report. The report outlined the proposed budget variations for December 2025 and January 2026.
- Councillors noted the outcomes of a legal case brought by a community member (the Applicant) against Council for the construction of the Skywalk. The Court delivered judgement in Council's favour, with final costs determined to be payable by the Applicant.
- Councillors agreed to endorse the Tamworth Regional Council Draft Night Time Economy Strategy for the purpose of public exhibition. The Draft Strategy will go on public exhibition for 28 days for community feedback and consultation. Following this period, Council will receive a further report on feedback received and any amendments to the Strategy for consideration and adoption.
- Councillors tonight approved Cr Marc Sutherland to attend the NSW Closing the Gap Gathering: Yambamanjang this week in Sydney. Cr Sutherland will be a panellist at the gathering, discussing Mara Ngali, Council's partnership with Tamworth Aboriginal Community Controlled Organisations (TACCO). The associated costs will come out of pre-existing funds that are specifically allocated for Councillor's to attend relevant conferences, workshops and events.
- Councillors reviewed the quarterly budget statements to December 2025, noting council is for the current financial year in a sound financial position. The Council report urged Councillors to pay close attention to medium and long term financial plans to ensure future financial stability, asset management and a buffer for unplanned expenditure and timing of income. 

**WASHING MACHINE EXCHANGE PROGRAM**

Subsidising eligible low-income households to upgrade their inefficient top-loading washing machine to a water and energy efficient front-loading model.



**About the program**

The NSW Government's Washing Machine Exchange Program is subsidising eligible low-income households to upgrade their inefficient

top-loading washing machine to a water and energy efficient front-loading model – saving water and easing the cost of living.

A new round of the program is now open and 6,500 machines are available. The last round assisted nearly 5,500 households across NSW upgrade their washing machines with a water savings of approximately 107 million litres annually. This NSW Government initiative targets water savings at the household level. By upgrading, your household can expect to save about \$300 (incl. GST) per year on water, energy and detergent costs with water savings anticipated to be around 20 kilolitres of water per year.

The program round is now open and will close when all washing machines have been allocated for that round. Subsequent rounds will likely take place. Successful applicants will pay \$250 for the front load washing machine, delivery, installation, and a 2-year warranty. Successful applicants will have 21 days to make payment. Please note, delivery may take up to 12 weeks after receipt of payment.

**To be eligible for the program you must:**

- be a resident of NSW
- be more than 18 years old
- hold a valid Pensioner Concession Card, Health Care Card\* or Low Income Card from Centrelink or Department of Veterans' Affairs
- have an existing top-loading washing machine to exchange
- not have participated in the 2022 or 2025 rounds.

**How to apply**

**Go to:** *Washing Machine Exchange Program Website*

The application takes 5 to 10 minutes to complete.

- Make sure you have your valid concession card handy before you apply.
- If successful, your application will be approved instantly, and you will be able to place your order.

**To complete your application, you will need an:**

- Image of your concession card to confirm it is valid and up to date. Please ensure all details entered are an exact match to those on your concession card.



## **THE ESSENTIAL GRANTS PROGRAM IS NOW OPEN**
